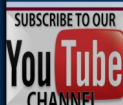

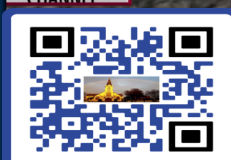

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The two disciples had every reason and opportunity to see that it was Jesus walking beside them. They knew that the tomb was empty and the women who had discovered it had relayed what the angel had told them: Jesus was alive. It had only been three days since he had died. Yet, even as he was in their midst, the two disciples' eyes were prevented from recognizing it was Jesus. Only when he broke bread with them did they perceive and understand. Jesus walks beside us as well, but perhaps our eyes, like those of the two disciples, are prevented from recognizing him. What clouds our vision? It could be fear, doubt, despair, as on that road to Emmaus. Or maybe it is pride or hardness of heart. Like the early disciples, we must speak to Jesus, and tell him our story. Jesus comes to meet us, and we in turn have an opportunity to encounter him in many ways, most particularly in the breaking of the bread - the Eucharist. No matter how frantic or chaotic our lives may have become, attending Mass serves as an anchor, and a reminder of Jesus' presence with us every day.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It took them a minute to "get it," but once the disciples recognized Jesus they didn't hesitate. They made a hasty return to Jerusalem to share the news with the other disciples: "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Having encountered Jesus in the breaking of the bread, they felt compelled to share the Good News of his resurrection with others. As Catholics, we can ask the Lord for eyes to see Jesus in our daily lives and especially at Mass. Nourished by the Eucharist, we can share our love for Jesus and our hope in the resurrection with others we encounter. Wherever we are and whatever we do, we can rest assured that Jesus walks alongside us.

PRAY Pray with the psalmist: "Lord, you will show us the path of life."

3rd Sunday of Easter

Today's Gospel reading brings us the wonderful story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus on the first day of the week after Jesus' crucifixion. We hear how Jesus joins these two disciples who are dejected and crestfallen after their rabbi, Jesus of Nazareth died on the cross on Friday and now some women from their group were at the tomb this morning and related how an angel had told them that Jesus had risen. They are totally confused and don't know what to believe – after all, they had expected the Messiah to lead an army against Rome.

The story continues when this stranger who they don't recognize joins them and begins to explain how the Christ had to suffer and die and be raised again – how all of sacred scripture related to this – taking them from the story of Moses and the prophets. And when they arrived at their destination and invited this stranger to stay with them, how at dinner when he said the blessing and broke the bread they recognized him as Jesus and he immediately disappeared.

The Church is reminding us today on this second Sunday of Easter that we are called to experience the risen Jesus alive and present in our everyday life. We see this at various times in the Old and New Testament – when Abram at Mamre was visited by three “angels” and saw them at God's presence with him. Moses saw the burning bush which was not consumed by the fire and heard God's voice. Isaiah saw the Lord high and lifted up in the Temple. Saul of Tarsus met Jesus on the road to Damascus and was knocked to the ground by him. Jesus' self-disclosure of Himself to the disciples at Emmaus was unexpected but no different from these other encounters.

We encounter Jesus daily especially if we read and study the Bible and in this year of Eucharistic Renewal which the Church is actively asking us to participate, we have an extra opportunity to interact with the real presence of Jesus. Every time we receive Jesus in the Eucharist we join ourselves with Jesus and encounter the risen Jesus again.

Luke's story of the Road to Emmaus teaches us: 1) that we need to recall that Jesus death and resurrection fulfill God's plan as revealed in sacred scripture. 2) that the risen Jesus is present in the Word of God and especially in the breaking of the Bread in the Eucharist. 3) suffering was necessary for the Messiah to enter into his glory. And 4) we have the risen Savior; the One who personally walks with us in our daily lives, talks with us through His Word and Whom we can talk to through prayer. He is the One Who opens our minds to understand and respond to His Word.

As followers of Jesus, the message of today's scripture readings encourage us to maintain contact with the risen Jesus through prayer, the Eucharist, and frequent study of the Bible. These readings also remind us that our belief in Jesus' presence in the consecrated Bread and Wine should help us to better understand his presence in the Bible and in the community of believers around us in this parish of St. Ignatius of Loyola. We are called as believers to act as spokespersons for Jesus – to bring others into the Catholic Church.

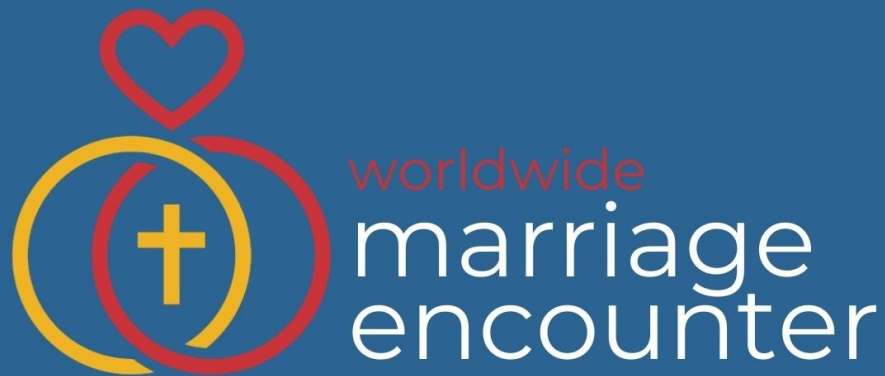

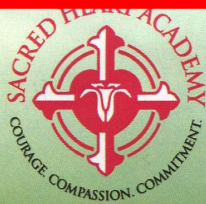

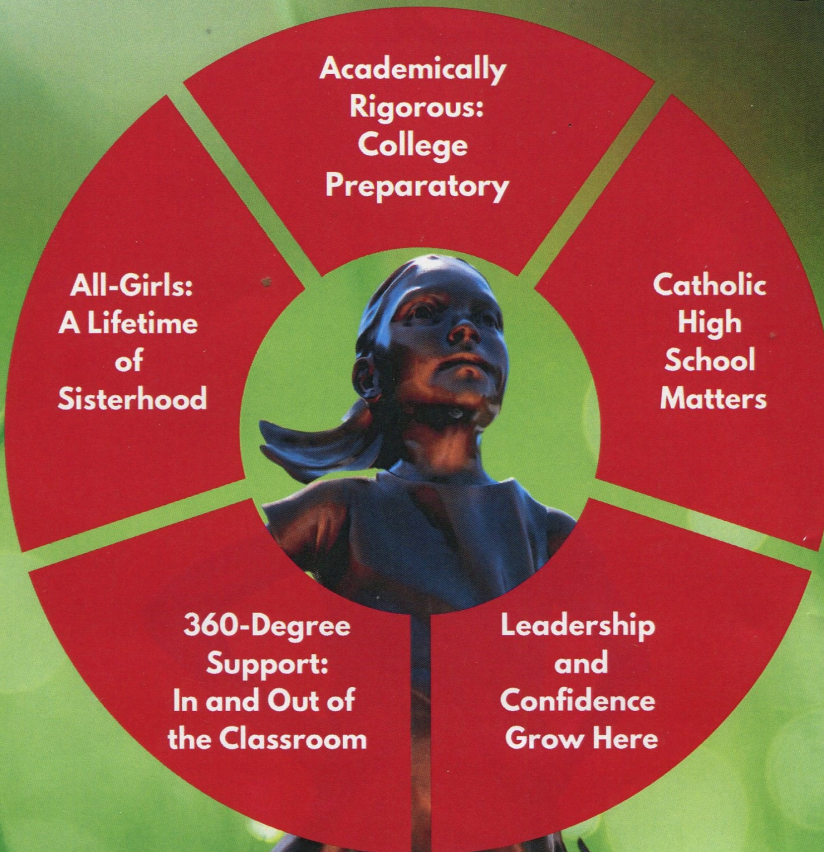

3^{er} domingo de Pascua

El Evangelio de hoy nos trae la maravillosa historia de los discípulos en el camino a Emaús el primer día de la semana después de la crucifixión de Jesús. Escuchamos cómo Jesús se une a estos dos discípulos que están abatidos y cabizbajos después de su rabino, Jesús de Nazaret murió en la cruz el viernes y ahora algunas mujeres de su grupo estaban en la tumba esta mañana y relataron cómo un ángel les había dicho que Jesús había resucitado. Están totalmente confundidos y no saben qué creer; después de todo, esperaban que el Mesías liderara un ejército contra Roma.

La historia continúa cuando este extraño a quien no reconocen se une a ellos y comienza a explicar cómo Cristo tuvo que sufrir, morir y resucitar, cómo todas las sagradas escrituras se relacionan con esto, tomándose de la historia de Moisés y los profetas. Y cuando llegaron a su destino e invitaron a este extraño a quedarse con ellos, cómo en la cena cuando dijo la bendición y partió el pan lo reconocieron como Jesús y de inmediato desapareció.

La Iglesia nos recuerda hoy en este segundo domingo de Pascua que estamos llamados a experimentar a Jesús resucitado vivo y presente en nuestra vida cotidiana. Vemos esto en varios momentos en el Antiguo y Nuevo Testamento, cuando Abram en Mamre fue visitado por tres "ángeles" y los vio en la presencia de Dios con él. Moisés vio la zarza ardiente que no fue consumida por el fuego y escuchó la voz de Dios. Isaías vio al Señor alto y sublime en el Templo. Saulo de Tarso se encontró con Jesús en el camino a Damasco y fue derribado por él. La revelación de sí mismo de Jesús a los discípulos de Emaús fue inesperada pero no diferente de estos otros encuentros.

Nos encontramos con Jesús a diario, especialmente si leemos y estudiamos la Biblia y en este año de Renovación Eucarística en el que la Iglesia nos pide activamente que participemos, tenemos una oportunidad adicional de interactuar con la presencia real de Jesús. Cada vez que recibimos a Jesús en la Eucaristía nos unimos a Jesús y nos encontramos de nuevo con Jesús resucitado.

La historia de Lucas del Camino a Emaús nos enseña: 1) que debemos recordar que la muerte y la resurrección de Jesús cumplen el plan de Dios revelado en las Sagradas Escrituras. 2) que Jesús resucitado está presente en la Palabra de Dios y especialmente en la fracción del Pan en la Eucaristía. 3) el sufrimiento fue necesario para que el Mesías entrará en su gloria. Y 4) temenos al Salvador resucitado; Aquel que personalmente camina con nosotros en nuestra vida diaria, habla con nosotros a través de Su Palabra y con Quien podemos hablar a través de la oración. Él es quien abre nuestra mente para comprender y responder a Su Palabra.

Como seguidores de Jesús, el mensaje de las lecturas bíblicas de hoy nos anima a mantener contacto con Jesús resucitado a través de la oración, la Eucaristía y el estudio frecuente de la Biblia. Estas lecturas también nos recuerdan que nuestra creencia en la presencia de Jesús en el Pan y el Vino consagrados debe ayudarnos a comprender mejor su presencia en la Biblia y en la comunidad de creyentes que nos rodea en esta parroquia de San Ignacio de Loyola. Somos llamados como creyentes para actuar como portavoces de Jesús – para traer a otros a la Iglesia Católica.

Evangelio según San Juan (Jn. 24, 13-35)



AQUEL mismo día (el primero de la semana), dos de los discípulos de Jesús iban caminando a una aldea llamada Emaús, distante de

Jerusalén unos sesenta estadios; iban conversando entre ellos de todo lo que había sucedido. Mientras

conversaban y discutían, Jesús en persona se acercó y se puso a caminar con ellos. Pero sus ojos no eran capaces de reconocerlo. Él les dijo: «¿Qué conversación es esa que traéis mientras vais de camino?». Ellos se detuvieron con aire entristecido, Y uno de ellos, que se llamaba Cleofás, le respondió: «Eres tú el único forastero en Jerusalén que no sabes lo que ha pasado allí estos días?». Él les dijo: «¿Qué?». Ellos le contestaron: «Lo de Jesús el Nazareno, que fue un profeta poderoso en obras y palabras, ante Dios y ante todo el pueblo; cómo lo entregaron los sumos sacerdotes y nuestros jefes para que lo condenaran a muerte, y lo crucificaron. Nosotros esperábamos que él iba a liberar a Israel, pero, con todo esto, ya estamos en el tercer día desde que esto sucedió. Es verdad que algunas mujeres de nuestro grupo nos han sobresaltado, pues habiendo ido muy de mañana al sepulcro, y no habiendo encontrado su cuerpo, vinieron diciendo que incluso habían visto una aparición de ángeles, que dicen que está vivo. Algunos de los nuestros fueron también al sepulcro y lo encontraron como habían dicho las mujeres; pero a él no lo vieron». Entonces él les dijo: «¿Qué necios y torpes sois para creer lo que dijeron los profetas! ¿No era necesario que el Mesías padeciera esto y entrara así en su gloria?».

Y, comenzando por Moisés y siguiendo por todos los profetas, les explicó lo que se refería a él en todas las Escrituras. Llegaron cerca de la aldea adonde iban y él simuló que iba a seguir caminando; pero ellos lo apremiaron, diciendo: «Quédate con nosotros, porque atardece y el día va de caída». Y entró para quedarse con ellos. Sentado a la mesa con ellos, tomó el pan, pronunció la bendición, lo partió y se lo iba dando. A ellos se les abrieron los ojos y lo reconocieron. Pero él desapareció de su vista.

Y se dijeron el uno al otro: «¿No ardía nuestro corazón mientras nos hablaba por el camino y nos explicaba las Escrituras?». Y, levantándose en aquel momento, se volvieron a Jerusalén, donde encontraron reunidos a los Once con sus compañeros, que estaban diciendo: «Era verdad, ha resucitado el Señor y se ha aparecido a Simón». Y ellos contaron lo que les había pasado por el camino y cómo lo habían reconocido al partir el pan.

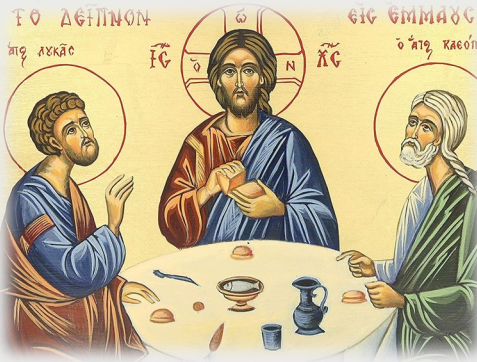

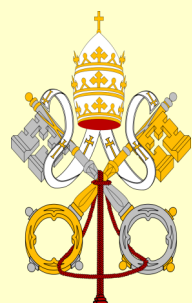
