## **THE GOOD SHEPHERD AND HIS SHEEP**

“I am the Good Shepherd,” says the Lord (Jn. 10: 11). The good shepherd image is a very powerful and beautiful metaphor that the ordinary people of Israel could understand and relate to their lives. The picture of the good shepherd is woven into the imagery and the language of the whole Bible. The main part of Judea was much more a pastoral land than an agricultural one. It was, therefore, inevitable the most familiar picture in the land was the shepherd and his flock.

A shepherd’s life was not easy. It was rough and tough; and yet, very intimate and rewarding. His life was challenging. He was never off duty. No sheep is safe without a shepherd. Having little grass to feed on and no walls to protect them, they could easily get lost. More dangerous was the wild animals, especially wolves, impatiently waiting for their meals. Even at night, the shepherds had to keep watch for their sheep, so that no wild animals or thieves could steal them.

In short, constant vigilance, amazing courage, deep affection for his flock were some of the characteristics of a good shepherd. No wonder, the kings were called the shepherds of Israel; Jesus Himself took this title as a symbol of self-sacrifice, love for His people, and the savior of the world.

There is a legend about Moses and how he became the shepherd of the people of Israel. When Moses was feeding the sheep of his father-in-law in the wilderness, a little lamb ran away. Moses followed it until it reached a ravine, where it found a small well to drink from. When Moses found it, he said: “I did not know that you ran away because you were thirsty. Let me carry you home.” He took the lamb on his shoulders and carried it back home. Then God said to Moses: “Because you have shown great pity in leading back one of the sheep, you shall lead my flock of Israel.”

The Old Testament is filled with innumerable references to the good shepherd. The most famous psalm is: “The Lord is my shepherd” (Psalm 23; and also see psalms: 77:20; 79:13; 80:1; 95:7; 100:3). God’s Anointed One, the Messiah, is also pictured as the shepherd of the sheep. “He will feed his flock like a shepherd: he will gather the lambs in his arms, and will carry them in his bosom...” (Isaiah 40: 11). Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of the Lord (Jeremiah 23: 1-4); and woe to the shepherds of Israel who have been feeding themselves (Ezekiel 34).

Jesus is the ultimate Good Shepherd. He is the shepherd who will risk even his life to seek and save the lonely straying sheep (Matthew 18: 12; Luke 15: 4). He has pity upon the people because they are as sheep without a shepherd (Matthew 9: 36; Mark 6: 34). His disciples are His little flock (Luke 12: 32). When He, the shepherd, is smitten the sheep are scattered (Mark 14: 27; Matthew 26: 31). He is the shepherd of the people (I Peter 2: 25), and the great shepherd of the sheep (Hebrews 13: 20). As in the Bible, the leaders of the Church are the shepherds and the people are the flock, It is the duty of the leader to feed the flock of God; it is not for love of money, power or prestige, but to be an example to the flock (1 Peter 5: 2, 3). It is Jesus’ last command to Peter to be a good pastor and feed his sheep (John 21: 15-19). Interestingly, the very word pastor (Ephesians 4: 11) is the Latin word for shepherd.

The word shepherd, thus, paints a picture of the unceasing vigilance, patience, sacrifice and love of God. It reminds us of our duty towards our fellow human beings, especially those who hold any kind of office in the Church or in the world. In a sense, all of us, by virtue of our Holy Baptism and other sacraments, are called to be the good shepherds according to our talent and role in our family and community. Let us be good shepherds.

**GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE**

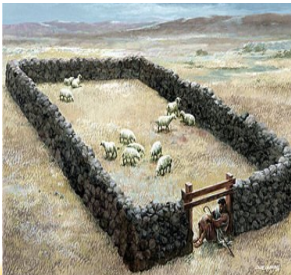
There is much we could ponder in today's Scriptures, but the verses that stood out for me are these: "If you are patient when you suffer for doing what is good, this is a grace before God. For to this you have been called." I have a hard enough time keeping my inner child under wraps when I suffer due to my own sinfulness or incompetence, and Peter is telling me to be patient when I suffer for *doing what is good*? Well, yes - "because Christ also suffered for [us], leaving an example that [we] should follow in his footsteps." And the clarity of this truth hits me smack in the face. Doing what is good means we are loving another, in some way; we are doing good, *for good*. We are engaging in self-sacrifice, and some form of suffering is inherent to that. But here's the thing: it's an oddly joyful kind of suffering because it produces good fruit and directs our thoughts and vision to the one who is present among us as "the shepherd and guardian of [our] souls." Let us pray for the ability to see each moment of suffering for doing good as "a grace before God."

**GO EVANGELIZE**

**PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT**

At this point in the Easter season, we might think, "Why can't we focus more on the joy of Jesus' resurrection and less on the suffering that preceded it?" Well, we certainly can ... but we would lose a great part of the Paschal Mystery. We don't embrace the cross for the sake of suffering in itself. We come to the crucifixion to pass *through* it. We are an Easter people living in a Good Friday world. There's no avoiding suffering in our lives, but the Good News of Jesus Christ is that he has redeemed that suffering. He has given us victory over death and is - quite literally - the way to eternal life. In the Gospel Jesus says, "Whoever enters through me will be saved ... I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly." He is our shepherd and we know his voice. During this Eastertide we have an extraordinary opportunity to attend to that voice in a particular way, and to think about how we might be hearing it in a new way this year.

**ACT** Is there a charity you have been meaning to call to volunteer your time? Is there a neighbor who might be able to use a helping hand? Is there a friend or family member who has fallen out of favor and you just know it's the right thing to do to get in touch? Act this week. Sacrifice just a bit for the sake of good.

## **EL BUEN PASTOR Y SUS OVEJAS**

“Yo soy el buen pastor”, dice el Señor (Jn 10, 11). La imagen del buen pastor es una metáfora muy poderosa y hermosa que la gente común de Israel podría entender y relacionar con sus vidas. La imagen del buen pastor está entrelazada en las imágenes y el lenguaje de toda la Biblia. La mayor parte del territorio de Judea era más una tierra de pastoreo que agrícola. Por lo tanto, era inevitable que la imagen más familiar para todos fuera la del pastor y su rebaño.

La vida de un pastor no era fácil. Era áspera y dura; y, sin embargo, muy íntima y gratificante. Su vida era desafiante. Nunca estaba sin oficio. Ninguna oveja está segura sin un pastor. Pues al tener poca hierba para alimentarse y no tener paredes para protegerse, podría perderse fácilmente. Su mayor peligro eran los animales salvajes, especialmente los lobos, que esperan impacientes sus comidas. Incluso de noche, los pastores tenían que velar por sus ovejas, para que ningún ladrón o animal salvaje pudiera robarlas.

En resumen, vigilancia constante, valentía asombrosa, afecto profundo por su rebaño eran algunas de las características de un buen pastor. Con razón, los reyes fueron llamados los pastores de Israel. Jesús mismo tomó este título como un símbolo de abnegación, amor por su pueblo y salvador del mundo.

Hay una leyenda sobre Moisés y cómo se convirtió en el pastor del pueblo de Israel. Cuando Moisés estaba apacentando las ovejas de su suegro en el desierto, un corderito se escapó. Moisés lo siguió hasta que llegó a un barranco, donde encontró un pequeño pozo para beber. Cuando Moisés lo encontró, dijo: “No sabía que te escapaste porque tenías sed. Déjame llevarte a casa. Tomó el cordero sobre sus hombros y lo llevó a casa. Entonces Dios le dijo a Moisés: “Por cuanto has tenido gran piedad al hacer volver a una de las ovejas, tú conducirás mi rebaño de Israel”.

Jesús es el Buen Pastor por excelencia. Él es el pastor que arriesgará hasta su vida para buscar y salvar a la oveja solitaria, descarriada (Mateo 18:12; Lucas 15:4). Se compadece del pueblo porque los veía como ovejas sin pastor (Mateo 9:36; Marcos 6:34). Sus discípulos son su pequeño rebaño (Lc 12, 32). Cuando él, el pastor, es herido, las ovejas se dispersan (Marcos 14:27; Mateo 26:31). Él es el pastor del pueblo (I Pedro 2: 25), y el gran pastor de las ovejas (Hebreos 13:20). Como en la Biblia, los líderes de la Iglesia son los pastores y el pueblo es el rebaño. Es deber del líder apacentar el rebaño de Dios; no por amor al poder, al prestigio o al dinero, sino para ser ejemplo del rebaño (1 Pedro 5:2, 3). El último mandato de Jesús a Pedro es que sea un buen pastor y apaciente a sus ovejas (Juan 21:15-19).

El Antiguo Testamento está lleno de innumerables referencias al buen pastor. El salmo más famoso es: “El Señor es mi pastor” (Salmo 23; y ver también los salmos: 77:20; 79:13; 80:1; 95:7; 100:3). El Ungido de Dios, el Mesías, también es representado como el pastor de las ovejas. “Como pastor apacentará su rebaño en sus brazos, tomará los corderos y en su seno los llevará...” (Isaías 40:11). ¡Ay de los pastores que destruyen y dispersan las ovejas del Señor (Jeremías 23: 1-4); y ¡Ay de los pastores de Israel que se han estado apacentando a sí mismos! (Ezequiel 34).

Jesús es el Buen Pastor por excelencia. Él es el pastor que arriesgará hasta su vida para buscar y salvar a la oveja solitaria, descarriada (Mateo 18:12; Lucas 15:4). Se compadece del pueblo porque los veía como ovejas sin pastor (Mateo 9:36; Marcos 6:34). Sus discípulos son su pequeño rebaño (Lc 12, 32). Cuando él, el pastor, es herido, las ovejas se dispersan (Marcos 14:27; Mateo 26:31). Él es el pastor del pueblo (I Pedro 2: 25), y el gran pastor de las ovejas (Hebreos 13:20). En cierto sentido, todos nosotros, en virtud de nuestro Santo Bautismo y otros sacramentos, estamos llamados a ser buenos pastores de acuerdo con nuestro talento y papel en nuestra familia y comunidad. Seamos buenos pastores.

## Evangelio según San Juan (Jn. 10, 1-10)

EN aquel tiempo, dijo Jesús: «En verdad, en verdad os digo: el que no entra por la puerta en el aprisco de las ovejas, sino que salta por otra parte, ese es ladrón y bandido; pero el que entra por la puerta es pastor de las ovejas. Jesús les puso esta comparación, pero ellos no entendieron de qué les hablaba. Por eso añadió Jesús: «En verdad, en verdad os digo: yo soy la puerta de las ovejas. Todos los que han venido antes de mí son ladrones y bandidos; pero las ovejas no los escucharon. Yo soy la puerta: quien entre por mí se salvará y podrá entrar y salir, y encontrará pastos. El ladrón no entra sino para robar y matar y hacer estragos; yo he venido para que tengan vida y la tengan abundante».

### Palabra del Señor / Gloria a ti Señor Jesús

*Uno de los signos del buen Pastor es la mansedumbre. El buen pastor es manso. Un pastor que no es manso no es un buen pastor. Tiene algo escondido, porque la mansedumbre se muestra tal cual es, sin defenderse. Es más, el pastor es tierno, tiene esa ternura de la cercanía, conoce a las ovejas una a una por su nombre y cuida de cada una como si fuera la única, hasta el punto de que cuando llegan a casa después de una jornada de trabajo, cansado, se da cuenta de que le falta una, sale a trabajar otra vez para buscarla y [encontrarla] la lleva consigo, la lleva sobre sus hombros (cf. Lc 15,4-5). Este es el buen pastor, este es Jesús, este es quien nos acompaña a todos en el camino de la vida. Y esta idea del pastor, esta idea del rebaño y las ovejas, es una idea pascual. La Iglesia en la primera semana de Pascua canta ese hermoso himno para los recién bautizados: "Estos son los corderos recién nacidos", el himno que hemos oído al comienzo de la Misa. Es una idea de comunidad, de ternura, de bondad, de mansedumbre. Es la Iglesia que quiere Jesús, y Él cuida de esta Iglesia.*
