One Minute Meditations

St. Gemma Galgani

Born in Tuscany to a devout family, St. Gemma was attracted to prayer early on, mystically conversing with Jesus, Mary, and her Guardian Angel. Although she was hard working, kind, and a good student, her ecstasies earned her ridicule. She received the stigmata (wounds of Christ) in her body. She lost half her family to tuberculosis and struggled with poor health herself. Although this prevented her from entering the Passionist Order, she was posthumously accepted by them. .

On the road to Damascus, Jesus told Saul that when he attacked Christians, he attacked Jesus. *"I am Jesus whom you are persecuting"* (Acts 26:15). Our Lord cannot be separated from the members of his Body. We stand united with all who suffer for Christ.

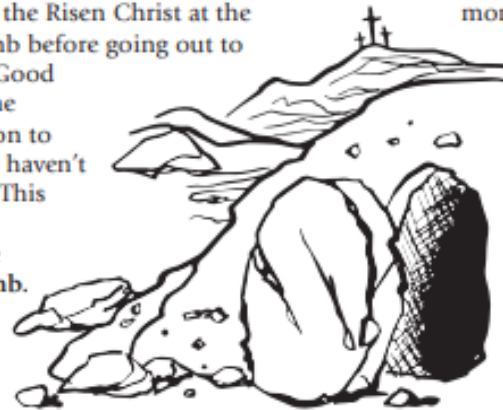

This Easter, meet Christ at the empty tomb

The Resurrection, more than Jesus' other miracles or teachings, shows His divinity and His Lordship over creation, and His victory over death. Every Easter Sunday, we're called to encounter the Risen Christ at the empty tomb before going out to bring the Good News of the Resurrection to those who haven't yet heard. This Easter:

Visit the empty tomb. Scripture is *"living and active"* (Hebrews 4:12), so the events of Jesus' life can still impact us today when we pray with them. During the Easter season, read through John 20:1-18, and picture yourself there. Read with an open heart. No one who meets the Risen Christ remains unchanged.



Renew your commitment to Him. Can you remember a moment when Christ called your name and invited you to follow Him? Renew your commitment to follow Christ more faithfully this Easter.

Commit to daily prayer. Offer your errands for the souls in Purgatory. Resolve to go to Confession more often. Don't let anything get in the way of weekly Mass.

"Go to my brothers and tell them" (John 20:17). Our job is to make more disciples for Jesus

(Matthew 28:19). Invite someone to Mass, pass on inspiring spiritual reading, answer questions about our Faith, be ready to talk about your love for God and your hope for eternity (1 Peter 3:15).

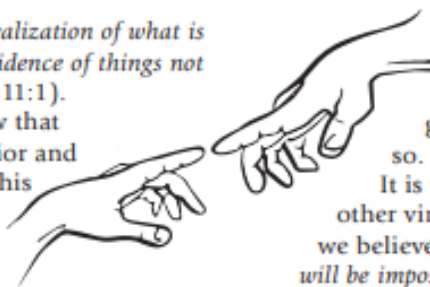
Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics need faith?

"Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). Christians know that Jesus is our Savior and our lives are in his hands. We also know that by virtue of his

suffering, death, and Resurrection, we have hope of sharing in his glory in Heaven. He said so.

It is through faith that all the other virtues flow. Through faith we believe, *"For with God, nothing will be impossible"* (Luke 1:37).



3 Ways to be a better communicator

When people encountered Jesus, they knew they were heard, seen, known, and loved by the Father. A large part of this was how He conversed with them. As Christ's disciples aiming to convey the same message, we can become better communicators with these three skills:

Know which conversation you're having. There are three types of conversations: social, emotional, and practical. Maybe someone offered a solution in which a listening ear was needed or made a corny joke at the wrong time. When in doubt, say something like: "Do you want me to fix this or just listen?"



Ask good questions. Jesus asked questions about people's values, past experiences, and perceptions.

Ask open-ended questions, find out what interests them, ask their opinion on a given topic. Seek to understand them. You don't have to agree.

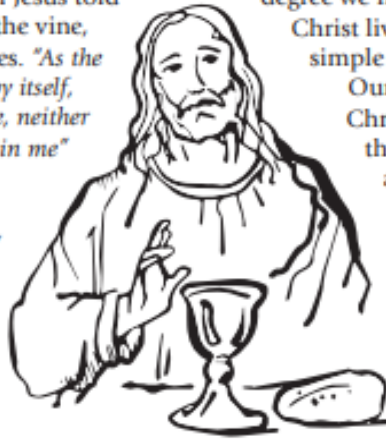
Really listen. Recall the rich young man whom Jesus looked at with love before challenging him to follow Him (Mark 10:21). Avoid checking your phone or thinking about your next response. Give the gift of your full attention.

from Scripture

John 15:1-8, Bearing fruit that will last

This Gospel passage takes us back to the Last Supper, when Jesus told His disciples that He is the vine, and they are the branches. *"As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me"* (John 15:4). This shows the closeness of the friendship and intimacy Christ wants to draw us into.

Yet, this isn't just a luxury for the few, but a vital necessity for all. *"For apart from me you can do nothing"* (15:5). As Jesus is who He says He is (God), then we can only have a truly fulfilling,



meaningful, fruitful life to the degree we live in Christ and Christ lives in us. It really is as simple as that.

Our connection with Christ is nourished through daily prayer and the Eucharist, and is healed in Confession. We are part of the Vine when we humbly obey Christ's commands, carry out our duties and acts of kindness with love, and offer our sufferings to God. Only then will our lives bear lasting fruit.

Q & A What is a Spiritual Communion?

Pandemic lockdowns that prevented us from attending Mass in person prompted the rediscovery of Spiritual Communion, the "ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him" (St. Thomas Aquinas). Thankfully, we have returned to in-person Mass



attendance, but we can still benefit from this devotion. Spiritual Communion keeps us connected to Christ and deepens our awareness of His love throughout the day. Best friends don't only see or speak to each other once a week or when they need something. They stay in contact daily. Certainly, we have no closer friend than God.

The saints encouraged frequent Spiritual Communion because the practice opens us to much-needed graces. St. Alphonsus Liguori encouraged making three Spiritual Communions during Mass – at the beginning, during the consecration, and at the end – even when we receive the Body and Blood.

Spiritual Communion isn't a substitute for Sacramental Communion. Instead, making frequent Spiritual Communion can enrich our experience when we do receive Communion in person.

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Feasts & Celebrations

April 2 – St. Francis of Paola (1507). St. Francis founded the Minim Friars who lived an ascetic life. Known as a miracle-worker, he also had the gift of prophecy. He died in Plessis, in a monastery built for him by the king.

April 8 – The Annunciation of the Lord (1st century). The angel Gabriel visited the Blessed Virgin Mary with the extraordinary news of her role as the mother of God. She had confidence in God's grace and trusted His wisdom.

April 24 – St. Fidelis of Sigmaringen (1622). In his native Prussia, St. Fidelis became a lawyer and championed the poor and oppressed. He joined the Franciscans. During the Protestant Reformation, St. Fidelis worked hard to bring people back to the Catholic faith, until his martyrdom.

April 27 – St. Zita (1271). Born in Monsagrati, Italy, St. Zita became the servant of the wealthy Fatinelli family. Famous for her miracles in helping the sick, the poor, and the imprisoned, she is the patroness of domestic workers.

Acts 4:32-35 | 1 Jn 5:1-6 | Jn 20:19-31

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

We tend to beat up St. Thomas for his doubt, when what is really most amazing in the scene from today’s Gospel is his understanding, and the first public pronouncement of, Jesus Christ’s divinity. He gets it. And he proclaims it without hesitation: “My Lord and my God.” I think about what Thomas’ face might have looked like at that moment, and I imagine a countenance of conviction alongside humility – joyful tears in the eyes that reflect awe and wonder. The truth behind his realization and understanding is that God is faithful, God is loving, God is merciful. Of course, *knowing* that with our heart and mind needs to be translated into *doing* with our every action. The early Christian communities seemed to have lived this well, happily sharing their possessions and selling what they didn’t need. Not because they had been forced to, but because the “commandments [were] not burdensome” for those who loved God. God loved us first, and by his grace, and his mercy, we are commanded and empowered to love one another.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

God is merciful – Divine Mercy. And that is what we celebrate today, in addition to the second Sunday of Easter. The first Divine Mercy Sunday observance occurred in the year 2000, when St. John Paul II canonized Sister Maria Faustina Kowalska. The Polish sister received private revelations from the Lord about his great mercy in the 1930s, and she outlined these in a diary she kept at the instruction of her confessors. A passage from her diary says: “The graces of my mercy are drawn by means of one vessel only, and that is – trust. The more a soul trusts, the more it will receive.” (1578) The apostles in today’s passage told Thomas that they had *seen the Lord* – the resurrected Lord. They trusted that Jesus’ messages to them were true and that they indeed need not fear. The message of Divine Mercy should likewise comfort us and also provide a model for our actions. In the same way the apostles helped Thomas to trust and come to deep knowledge and understanding, let us strive to be “of one heart and mind” with our fellow disciples and love them as we have been loved by God.

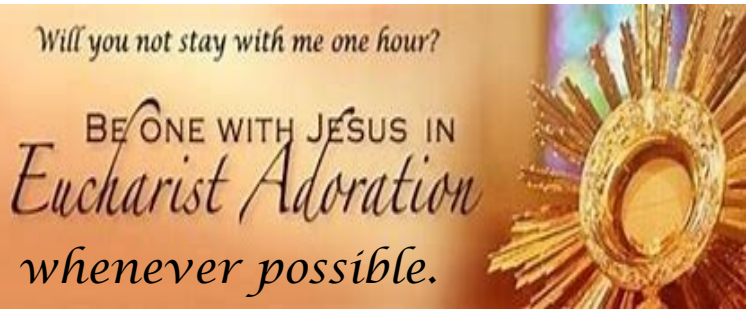
PRAY

The words of St. Faustina’s diary have been used to create the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. This prayer is said using a rosary, but with some differences in the prayers. Once you know the words, the chaplet is a simple prayer to recite, and it is traditionally said at 3 p.m. in remembrance of Jesus’ merciful act of dying on the cross for us. If you have never recited the chaplet, try praying it this week.

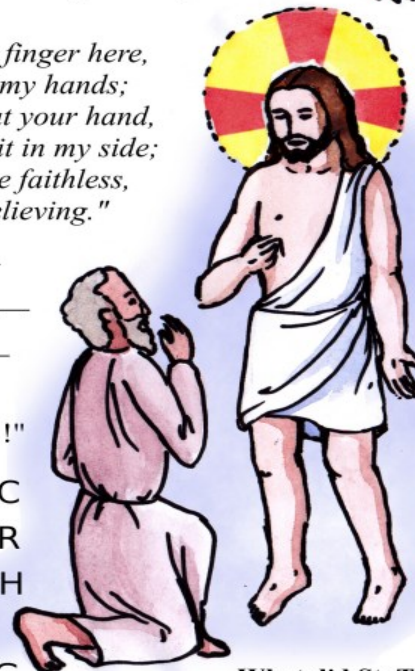

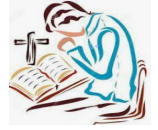

Christ’s Forgiveness and Peace are Offered to All

Jesus knew his apostles well. He knew some felt shame and remorse for having denied and abandoned him. However, His sign of peace let them know that they were forgiven and that He still loved them. Our Divine Savior continues to offer Himself in peace and forgiveness to us all.

How can we find this peace in Christ? What if you have doubts? What if you’re angry? What if life has been challenging, and things don’t seem fair? What if you feel abandoned and God doesn’t seem to be answering your prayers? What if you feel guilty because of sin and mistakes? Christ's peace and unconditional love are offered to all, especially to you.

First, ask the Holy Spirit to open your heart and tell Him in your own words that you need Jesus and want Him to help. “Apart from me, you can’t do anything,” says the Lord (Jn. 15:5). Then, read the Bible, go to Confession, and nourish your soul with Holy Communion.

Prayer is another crucial element in reaching interior peace, as it raises your mind and heart to God in a relationship of love, trust, and peace. God wants to hear from you! He wants to hear about your praise, thankfulness, frustrations, anger, worries, needs, and repentance.

Many people begin with standard memorized prayers and then move into more honest, intimate conversations. Meditative prayer can be fruitful as well, like praying with Scripture, spiritual books, or the rosary.

To hear back from God, we must listen. Begin by letting go of all the busy conversation and spiritual reading and just sit silently in love and total surrender with our Lord. The goal is to bask in His glory, trusting His holy will in all things.

Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta once said, “The fruit of silence is prayer. The fruit of prayer is faith. The fruit of faith is love. The fruit of love is service. The fruit of service is peace.” May the peace of our Lord be with you always.

Questions for Personal Reflection:

What matters are troubling you that you can bring to prayer? As Christ displayed patience with the disciples’ lack of understanding and unbelief, how has he been patient with you? How are you patient with others?

Questions for Community Faith Sharing:

How does the virtue of forgiveness lead to peace? How has Christ’s resurrection made a difference in your life? Since Jesus calls us to do so, how can we share the literal truth of the Resurrection, and how can we witness this in our lives?

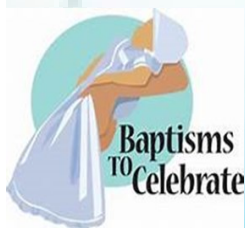

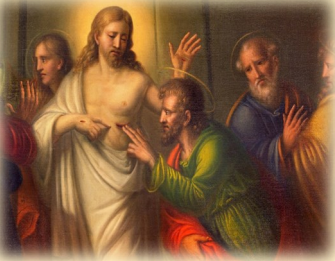

REFLEXION PAPA FRANCISCO-Homilía 19 de Abril 2020

En la vida avanzamos a tientas, como un niño que empieza a caminar, pero se cae; da pocos pasos y vuelve a caer; cae y se cae una y otra vez, y el papá lo levanta de nuevo. La mano que siempre nos levanta es la misericordia. Dios sabe que sin misericordia nos quedamos tirados en el suelo, que para caminar necesitamos que vuelvan a ponernos en pie.

Y tú puedes objetar: "¡Pero yo sigo siempre cayendo!". El Señor lo sabe y siempre está dispuesto a levantarnos. Él no quiere que pensemos continuamente en nuestras caídas, sino que lo miremos a Él, que en nuestras caídas ve a hijos a los que tiene que levantar y en nuestras miserias ve a hijos a los que tiene que amar con misericordia. Hoy, en esta iglesia que se ha convertido en santuario de la misericordia en Roma, en el Domingo que veinte años atrás san Juan Pablo II dedicó a la Divina Misericordia, acojamos con confianza este mensaje. Jesús le dijo a santa Faustina: «Yo soy el amor y la misericordia misma; no existe miseria que pueda medirse con mi misericordia» (Diario, 14 septiembre 1937). En otra ocasión, la santa le dijo a Jesús, con satisfacción, que le había ofrecido toda su vida, todo lo que tenía. Pero la respuesta de Jesús la desconcertó: «Hija mía, no me has ofrecido lo que es realmente tuyo». ¿Qué cosa había retenido para sí aquella santa religiosa? Jesús le dijo amablemente: «Hija, dame tu miseria» (10 octubre 1937). También nosotros podemos preguntarnos: "¿Le he entregado mi miseria al Señor? ¿Le he mostrado mis caídas para que me levante?". ¿O hay algo que todavía me guardo dentro? Un pecado, un remordimiento del pasado, una herida en mi interior, un rencor hacia alguien, una idea sobre una persona determinada... El Señor espera que le presentemos nuestras miserias, para hacernos descubrir su misericordia.

Santa Gema Galgani

Nacida en el seno de una devota familia en Toscana, santa Gema rezaba desde muy joven, conversando místicamente con Jesús, María y su Ángel de la Guardia. 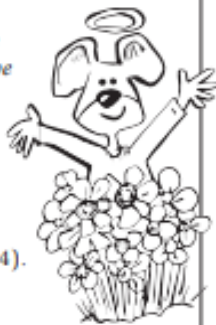


Somos un Cuerpo

En el camino de Damasco, Jesús le dijo a Saúl que cuando él atacaba a los cristianos atacaba a Jesús. *"Soy Jesús, a quien tú persigues"* (Hechos 26:15). Nuestro Señor no puede ser separado de los miembros de su cuerpo. Estamos unidos con todos los que sufren por Cristo.

Esta Pascua, encuéntrense con Cristo ante el sepulcro vacío

La Resurrección, más que los otros milagros o enseñanzas de Jesús, muestra su divinidad y su dominio sobre la creación y su victoria sobre la muerte. "Ve a decir a mis hermanos" (Juan 20:17). Nuestra obligación es hacer más discípulos para Jesús (Mateo 28:19).

Invite a alguien a misa, pásele a alguien una lectura espiritual, conteste preguntas sobre nuestra fe, esté dispuesto a hablar sobre su amor a Dios y su esperanza de eternidad (1 Pedro 3:15).



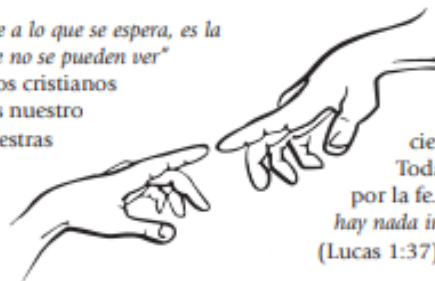
¿Por qué hacen eso los católicos?

¿Por qué necesitan fe los católicos?

"La fe es aferrarse a lo que se espera, es la certeza de cosas que no se pueden ver" (Hebreos 11:1). Los cristianos saben que Jesús es nuestro salvador y que nuestras vidas están en sus manos. También sabemos que por virtud de

su sufrimiento, muerte y resurrección tenemos la esperanza de compartir su gloria en el cielo. Nos lo dijo él.

Todas las demás virtudes fluyen por la fe. Por la fe creemos, *"porque no hay nada imposible para Dios"* (Lucas 1:37).



3 formas de ser mejor comunicador

Cuando la gente se encontraba con Jesús sabían que el Padre los escuchaba, los veía, los conocía y los amaba. En gran medida es así como él conversaba con ellos. Como discípulos de Cristo que intentamos transmitir el mismo mensaje, podemos ser mejores comunicadores con estas tres destrezas:

Reconocer qué tipo de conversación se mantiene: Hay tres tipos de conversaciones: social, emocional y práctica. Quizá alguien ofreció una solución cuando lo que se necesitaba era un oído atento o alguien hizo una broma de mal gusto en el momento equivocado. Cuando dude, diga algo como:



“¿Quieres que arregle esto o que simplemente te escuche?”

Hacer buenas preguntas: Jesús hacía preguntas sobre los valores de la gente, sus experiencias y sus percepciones. Haga preguntas abiertas, averigüe qué interesa a sus interlocutores, pida su opinión sobre un tema dado. Procure entenderlos: no es necesario estar de acuerdo con ellos.

Escuche de verdad: Recuerde al joven rico a quien Jesús miró con cariño antes de retarlo a que lo siguiera (Marcos 10:21). No mire su teléfono o piense su siguiente respuesta. Dé el regalo de su total atención.

de las **E**scrituras

Juan 15:1-8, Dar frutos duraderos

Este pasaje evangélico nos lleva a la Última Cena cuando Jesús dijo a sus discípulos que él es la viña y ellos son los sarmientos. *“Así como el sarmiento no puede dar fruto si no permanece en la vid, tampoco ustedes, si no permanecen en mí”* (Juan 15 :4). Esto muestra la cercanía de la amistad y la intimidad a la que Cristo quiere atraernos.

Sin embargo, esto no es un lujo para unos cuantos, sino una necesidad vital para todos. *“Porque separados de mí, nada pueden hacer”* (15:5). Como Jesús es quien dice que es (Dios), sólo podemos tener



una vida realmente gratificante, significativa y fructífera si vivimos en Cristo y Cristo vive en nosotros. Es así de sencillo.

Nuestra conexión con Cristo se alimenta con la oración diaria y la Eucaristía y se cura con la confesión.

Somos parte de la viña cuando obedecemos con humildad los mandatos de Cristo, realizamos nuestros deberes y actos de bondad con amor y ofrecemos nuestros sufrimientos a Dios. Sólo entonces darán

nuestras vidas frutos duraderos.

P & R ¿Qué es la comunión espiritual?

Los confinamientos durante la pandemia que no nos permitían ir a misa en persona dieron pie al redescubrimiento de la comunión espiritual, “el deseo ardiente de recibir a Jesús en el Santísimo Sacramento y un abrazo amoroso como si ya lo hubiéramos recibido” (Santo Tomás de Aquino). Por fortuna hemos vuelto a la

asistencia a misa en persona, pero aún podemos beneficiarnos de esta devoción.

La comunión espiritual nos mantiene conectados a Cristo y profundiza a lo largo del día nuestra conciencia de su amor. Los mejores amigos no sólo se ven o se hablan una vez a la semana o cuando necesitan algo. Están en contacto a diario. Está claro que no tenemos amigo más íntimo que Dios.

Los santos fomentaban la comunión espiritual frecuente porque la práctica nos abre a gracias que tanto necesitamos. San Alfonso María de Ligorio animaba a hacer tres comuniones espirituales durante la misa – al principio, durante la consagración y al final – incluso cuando recibimos el Cuerpo y la Sangre.

La comunión espiritual no es un sustituto de la comunión sacramental. Sin embargo, hacer frecuentemente la comunión espiritual puede enriquecer nuestra experiencia cuando recibamos la comunión en persona.



Fiestas y celebraciones

2 de abril – San Francisco de Paula (1507). San Francisco fundó la orden de los Frailes Mínimos los cuales vivían una vida ascética. Conocido por sus milagros, tenía también el don de la profecía. Murió en Plessis, un monasterio construido por el rey para él.

8 de abril – Anunciación del Señor (siglo I). El ángel Gabriel visitó a la Santísima Virgen María con la noticia extraordinaria de su papel como Madre de Dios. Ella confió en la gracia de Dios y confió en su sabiduría.

24 de abril – San Fidel de Sigmaringa (1622). En su Prusia natal, san Fidel se hizo abogado y defendió a los pobres y a los oprimidos. Ingresó en los franciscanos. Durante la Reforma protestante, san Fidel se esforzó por recuperar fieles para la fe católica hasta el día de su martirio.

27 de abril – Santa Zita (1217). Nacida en Monsagrati, Italia, santa Zita fue sirvienta de la rica familia Fatinelli. Famosa por sus milagros para ayudar a los enfermos, los pobres y los encarcelados, es la patrona de las trabajadoras domésticas.



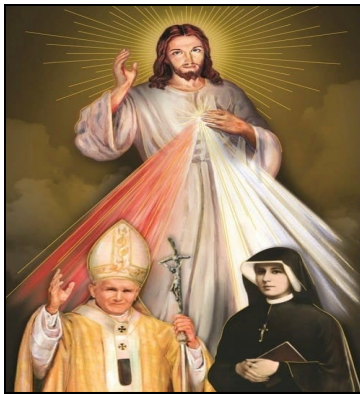
