### SACRIFICIAL GIVING

This weekend's Gospel reading is packed with drama. It has all the elements of a play or an action movie. There are two main actors: Jesus and the apostle Peter. The director is St. Matthew, the Evangelist. There are different acts

The First Act: Jesus on the Mountain. As I said in the last week's column, in Biblical understanding, mountain is the privileged place of divine-human encounter. I imagine Jesus on the top of the mountain, in the dark of the night, in silence and solitude, in heart-to-heart communion with God. He needed to take time off to be with his beloved Father. He needed to pray for himself in the hour of being tempted to be a triumphant messianic king. He needed to pray for his disciples and his future followers, as is evident from what follows.

The Second Act: The Disciples on the Boat in the Sea. Suddenly the scenario shifts dramatically from the mountain to the sea. The Evangelist Matthew, the dazzling and deft director of the drama of his Gospel, focuses the panning camera on the boat battered and buffeted by the wind and waves. From the time of the apostles, down the centuries, biblical commentators, theologians and writers have seen the boat battling against the heavy sea as a symbol of the Church. Jesus walking on the water has a rich symbolic significance. In the Bible, the sea is a symbol of the powers of evil, with mythical monsters like Leviathan. The tempest is something beyond human power to contain and control. Jesus' action of walking on the water and calming the sea has the primordial theological meaning of divine theophany and power over evil. It is natural for the disciples to take fright. Adding to the terror of the tempest, they are terrified by seeming someone walking on the water and coming towards them.

The Third Act: Peter Walks on the Water. We can easily recognize ourselves in the response and action of the apostle Peter, who almost missed the boat. With a boyish grin and a child's curiosity for adventure, he desires to imitate his Master's action. Impetuous and impulsive as ever, he blurts out, "Lord, command me to come to you on the water." He enjoys so much the adventurous and extraordinary feat of walking on the water, that he forgets the Master who made it possible. In the face of the full force of the flurry, his faith falters and he flounders. His focus shifts from Jesus to himself. He does not have enough faith to match his zest and zeal. In his distraction and doubt, he stumbles and sinks. Jesus is quick to react. He raises him up from the sinking water and says, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?"

Now let us turn the lights and the camera on ourselves. Is this not true in our case as well? Who hasn't impetuously stepped out of the boat of faith only to sink in fear and frustration? We become so engrossed in our enjoyments, our worries, preoccupations and struggles of life, that we lose sight of the presence of God. We start doubting. In the voyage of life, we are sure to encounter tempest and turbulence, wind and waves. When we are rowing against the waves, battling against the odds, when we find ourselves swallowed by the storms of life, all we need to do is to have faith in God. As long as our eyes are focused and fixed on Jesus, we have nothing to fear. As soon as we surrender ourselves in faith to him, the wind will drop, the storm will cease, the sea will become calm and peace will return. In the moment of danger, when we have that sinking feeling, all we need is to cry out 'Lord, save me.' He is always there for us, come what may.



Entonces parece que el suelo bajo nuestros pies se abre, parece que caemos al vacío, el miedo nos invade, queremos pisar firme y no encontramos dónde. ¡Cuánta inseguridad y miedo experimentamos en esos momentos! Y aunque nos esforcemos en demostrar que todo está bien, que somos fuertes, inquebrantables, interiormente sentimos que todo se desmorona.

Es cuando experimentamos las dificultades, la inseguridad, la fragilidad, cuando debemos aprender a mantenernos firmes en la fe. Es entonces cuando hemos de decirle al Señor: "¡Ya que eres tú, mándame ir donde ti sobre las aguas"! Que pueda yo también caminar sobre el mar embravecido de las pruebas que experimento en mi vida. Que pueda, apoyado en ti, sostenido por tu fuerza, caminar con firmeza en medio de todo lo inseguro, de todo lo inestable. Que pueda, hasta llegar a ti definitivamente, afrontar con confianza y sin miedo los vientos más fuertes y las olas más encrespadas de esta vida! Señor, ¡hazme firme en la fe, para que en ti encuentre siempre la seguridad y firmeza que tanto necesito! En los momentos más difíciles de tu vida, eleva tu mirada al Señor. busca en Él tu fortaleza. El Señor incluso en medio del tormento de la Cruz rezaba con el salmista: «¡Dios mío, Dios mío! ¿Por qué me has abandonado?» (Mt 27,46; Sal 22[21],2ss), y también: «Padre, en tus manos pongo mi espíritu» (Lc 23,46; Sal 31 [30],6). Ambos salmos manifiestan en medio de la prueba una profunda confianza en Dios. Así tú también, cuando pases por momentos de prueba y tribulación, cuando te experimentes frágil y débil, pon las palabras del salmista en tu mente y en tu corazón, recitándolos incesantemente con tus labios.
