

September marks the start of the school year for students. Before it becomes "back to work and back to school," many would like to end the summer vacation on a high note. As we come almost to the end of the season, we thank God for being part of our lives and for accompanying us in our summer journey. We praise God for the seasons of nature and seasons of the heart; for the sights and sounds, food and fun we enjoy in summer; for the increased daytime we have to be with family and friends; for the rest and renewal we experience. Let us not forget to say a prayer for those getting back to school, and for those at the receiving end of the hurricane Harvey.

The Labor Day—the day we honor all workers—invites us to have a faith-reflection on the deeper meaning and redemptive value of work. Honest work has an important place in our Catholic Scripture, Tradition, faith, life and spirituality. Labor is participating in God's creative activity sustaining creation. Good work is good worship. Remember the motto of Saint Ignatius of Loyola: *A d maiorem Dei gloriam inque hominum salutem (for the greater glory of God and the salvation of humanity). We bless God for the labor the ancestors of our family tree did; for the work we do, the money we make and the good things we enjoy in life. We remember and pray for the millions who work with their hands, heads and hearts to sustain this country. We ask him to bless all workers with a spiritual sense of serving the common good. Labor is a blessing for us, a gift from God.*

This weekend's Gospel contains one of the most daunting and demanding lessons taught by Jesus. "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." Jesus' words are addressed to each of us individually. "Whoever wishes to...." You are absolutely free. If you decide to do so, this is what is in store for you. To choose Jesus means to choose the cross. There is no Christianity without Christ. There is no Christ without the cross. Without the cross there is no salvation. There is no Christian life without self-emptying and renunciation. We are not alone in the way of the cross of life. Jesus is our suffering companion, who goes in front of us carrying his cross, beckoning us to take up our daily cross and follow him. The cross is the price to be paid for living a genuine life of love. Self-denial is not selfannihilation but life-enhancement. Self-donation is not self-destruction but a fuller blooming of life. The cross is only a pre-runner and prelude to the resurrection. St. Theresa of Avilla, a great mystic and teacher of spiritual life, warned: "Those who are not willing to deny themselves, can give up striving after holiness."

"For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." What a paradox! Who can understand and accept this? But this is true, hard as it is to embrace. This is the logic of the Gospel, logic of the cross. Our natural instinct and inclination is to save our lives. Who wants to lose life? We try hard to preserve and perpetuate life. But Jesus says, 'lose your life for my sake and for the sake of the kingdom, and you will gain real life, abundance of life.' This is for real. *What does it mean to lose one's life? Does it mean to die? By no means! It means to let go and let God. On a practical note, it means to surrender one's life to God and hand over the reins to him. It means to live by the Gospel values and demands of the Kingdom, and not to be carried away by the standards of the world. To remain honest in business even when the rule of the jungle rules the roost in the world around you. To take the side of the oppressed and the marginalized. To speak up for the voiceless. To stand up for the weak. To serve the needy. For a Christian, life is to be given, emptied, and donated.*

Lord, I want to follow you. Make me walk in the way you lived and died. Enable me to renounce myself, to deny myself. Empower me to carry the cross of my work-a-day life with its burdens, responsibilities, boredom, monotony, fatigue, problems, difficulties, worries, pain and suffering. Help my weakness. Strengthen and support me to follow you willingly and joyfully. Enlighten me to understand and embrace the paradoxical truth of your invaluable teaching. Grant me the vision and wisdom to see things from your perspective, particularly when they are not according to my taste. *Lord, that I may lose my life to find more abundant life in you and through you Amen. Fr. Peter Poonoly*

Free to Speak

Religious freedoms in our country protect, in law, the rights of children to live their faith among their peers in many appropriate school situations each day. Learning these religious liberties will clarify to students, parents and teachers that schools are not God-free zones.

The following guidelines are quoted from the U.S. Department of Education's document on students' and teachers' civil liberties.

- 1. You can pray, read your Bible or other religious material, and talk about your faith in school. Students may pray when not engaged in school activities or instruction, subject to the same rules designed to prevent material disruption of the educational program that are applied to other privately initiated expressive activities.
- 2. You can organize prayer groups and religious clubs, and announce your meetings. Students may organize prayer groups, religious clubs, and "See you at the Pole" gatherings before school to the same extent that students are permitted to organize other non-curricular student activities groups.
- **3.** You can express your faith in your class work and homework. Students may express their beliefs about religion in homework, artwork, and other written and oral assignments free from discrimination based on the religious content of their submissions.
- **4.** Your teachers can organize prayer groups with other teachers. When acting in their official capacities as representatives of the state, teachers, school administrators, and other school employees are prohibited by the Establishment Clause from encouraging or discouraging prayer, and from actively participating in such activity with students.
- 5 You may be able to go off campus to have religious studies during school hours. It has long been established that schools have the discretion to dismiss students to off-premises religious instruction, provided that schools do not encourage or discourage participation.
- 6. You can express your faith at a school event.

Student speakers at student assemblies and extracurricular activities such as sporting events may not be selected on a basis that either favors or disfavors religious speech.

7.You can express your faith at your graduation ceremony.

Where students or other private graduation speakers are selected on the basis of genuinely neutral, evenhanded criteria and retain primary control over the content of their expression, however, that expression is not attributable to the school and therefore, may not be restricted because of its religious (or anti-religious) content.







Santa Rosa de Lima

Nacida en el Perú colonial, Rosa trabajaba constantemente para ayudar

> a su pobre familia. Desde muy joven quiso hacerse monja y realizaba severas penitencias. Cuando sus padres intentaron obligarla a que se casara, se desfiguró restregándose la cara con pimienta y se cortó el pelo para disuadir a posibles pretendientes. Se hizo dominica laica, a pesar de su oposición. Preocupada por las condiciones de vida de los nativos americanos y de los esclavos, se dedicó a cuidar en su propia casa a niños sin hogar, ancianos y enfermos.

Sean mansos, no débiles

La mansedumbre se suele malinterpretar como debilidad, pero nada hay más lejos de la verdad. Ser "manso de corazón" supone controlar las emociones en lugar de permitir que las emociones lo controlen a uno. Rece hoy para tener el valor de ser manso de corazón.

El amor puede hacernos santos

Muchos católicos admiran a los santos y piensan que ellos tienen la santidad que nosotros no tenemos. La mayoría

de quienes llegaron a ser santos no hizo grandes cosas, pero sí que tenían un gran amor por Dios y por el prójimo. Si ellos pueden hacerlo, también podemos nosotros.

San Agustín era un vividor. Lo suyo eran las fiestas, el paganismo y un estilo de vida inmoral. Mediante las oraciones de su madre y la guía de san Ambrosio, Agustín llegó a adorar al Dios que descubrió en las

Escrituras. Su amor a Dios lo convirtió en un hombre nuevo.

Santa María Egipciaca vivía una vida de pecado extremo. Era prostituta y se cuenta que viajó a Tierra Santa para ofrecer su comercio ilícito a los peregrinos. Pero tuvo una experiencia religiosa al intentar

entrar en una iglesia y dedicó el resto de su vida a la oración y la penitencia. Sintió un amor especial por Nuestra Santísima Madre.

San Ignacio de Loyola soñaba con una vida en la corte y con hazañas caballerescas. Herido en una pierna durante una batalla con los franceses se vio obligado a convalecer a fin de curarse. Mientras se recuperaba leyó los únicos libros a su disposición: biografías de Jesús y de los santos.

Cautivado por su santidad, Ignacio se sintió atraído a una vida de amor santo. Más tarde fundó la Compañía de Jesús (los Jesuitas), una orden religiosa que sigue progresando hoy.

¿Por qué hacen eso los católicos? Transustanciación?

Durante la misa, aunque su apariencia no cambie, la sustancia del pan que ofrece el sacerdote se transforma en la sustancia del Cuerpo de Cristo. Lo mismo sucede con el vino: su sustancia se transforma en la Sangre de Cristo. Los católicos creen que las palabras que Cristo dijo en la Última Cena, "Éste es mi cuerpo, ésta es mi sangre", significan que el pan y el vino se convirtieron realmente en su Cuerpo y en su Sangre. Él ordenó que así sea.

Nuestra historia está llena de hombres y mujeres católicos como nosotros que han llevado su fe al mundo e influido en él positivamente. Cuando vivimos una vida católica contribuimos a formar una sociedad mejor y un mundo más pacífico.

Jonás. Porque la carne y la sangre no te ha revelado esto, sino mi padre que está en los cielos" Mateo 16:17.)

> Jesús cambió el nombre de Simón a Pedro que significa "roca". Con este cambio Jesús daba a entender que estaba construyendo su Iglesia sobre unos cimientos sólidos como la roca de acuerdo con la declaración de Pedro sobre la divinidad de Jesús. Esta verdad se ha

transmitido a lo largo de los tiempos, desde los apóstoles a los obispos y a nosotros. El Espíritu Santo llevó a Pedro—y a sus sucesores los papas—a hablar y a actuar en verdad como la cabeza de la Iglesia.

Tabor fue el lugar de la transfiguración durante la cual Cristo se apareció radiante en compañía de Moisés y Elías y se escuchó una voz que decía: *"Éste*

es mi hijo amado, en quien me complazco; escúchenlo" (Mateo 17:5).

En el trabajo. Por razón de nuestra fe, en nuestro trabajo podemos sentirnos presionados a elegir entre valores en contradicción. Tomar opciones católicas significa no sólo evitar el mal sino elegir el bien conscientemente. Significa tener el coraje de honrar siempre nuestras conciencias católicas. En el mundo. "Al que mucho se le da, mucho se le pedirá" (Lucas 12:48). Los católicos especialmente en los Estados Unidos—son llamados a ocuparse de los pobres, proteger a

los vulnerables, acoger al forastero y a tratar a todas las personas con dignidad. Éste es el auténtico estilo católico.



¿Cómo puede ser "verdad" la Sagrada Escritura si no todo es correcto?

El propósito de la Biblia es comunicar verdades sobre Dios. Más que un libro es una biblioteca de documentos escritos por diversos autores en distintas épocas y lugares.



Estas obras han sido compiladas por la Iglesia bajo la guía del Espíritu Santo según criterios específicos. Como cualquier biblioteca, la Biblia contiene una variedad de géneros literarios: poesía, historia, biografía, etc. Saber esto puede determinar cómo la leemos. Por ejemplo, puede que un poema no sea tan exacto en lo relativo a la información como pueda serlo una biografía.

Finalmente, hay formas diferentes de interpretar la Escritura y cada una resalta distintos aspectos de la verdad. Este sentido literal trata de lo que el autor escribió. El sentido alegórico resalta el simbolismo de la gente y los eventos en la historia. El sentido moral nos dice lo que deberíamos hacer en relación con Dios y con nuestro prójimo. Finalmente, el sentido "futuro" se ocupa de lo que ocurrirá al final de los tiempos. Estos distintos sentidos nos dan un entendimiento más pleno de Dios y de su plan hacia nosotros.

Mi alma esta sedienta de ti, Señor, Dios mío.

Pedro y los Apóstoles esperaban encontrar la gloria humana, la fama y el poder al lado del Señor. No querían renunciar a su idea de un Mesías triunfante y glorioso, poderoso rey y caudillo. Confiaban que Él pronto instauraría el Reino de los Cielos en el mundo. Con el favor de Dios, rodeado de huestes angélicas, derrotaría sin esfuerzo a los enemigos de Israel, sometiéndolos definitivamente a su dominio. Cristo debía triunfar, humanamente hablando, y ellos estarían con Él, gozarían de su gloria, participarían de su espectacular triunfo. Mas el Señor les habla de otra cosa, radicalmente opuesta: deben prepararse para el rechazo, para sufrir la ignominia, para afrontar el fracaso humano, para ser perseguidos como unos malhechores y para morir por Cristo y por el Evangelio.

Es verdad que quisiéramos que en la vida cristiana todo fuese cuesta abajo, un "camino de rosas" sin espinas. Pero he aquí que el Señor advierte a quien quiera seguirlo que debe disponerse a transitar un camino sembrado de espinas, a veces muy punzantes: burlas, incomprensión, críticas furiosas, desprecio, rechazo, persecución, incluso la muerte. ¿Por qué? Porque quien quiera vivir como Cristo enseña, se encontrará con la mentalidad de un mundo que no resiste la presencia del Señor, que lo odia, que no admite sus enseñanzas, que no admite que Él pueda poseer y, menos aún, ser La Verdad. Hoy que tanto se invoca la tolerancia para dar la bienvenida incluso a lo que es moralmente aberrante, no se tolera ni a Cristo ni a quienes son sus discípulos de verdad, aquellos que se toman en serio las enseñanzas de Cristo y no se adaptan a los criterios de este mundo, sino que se transforman por la renovación de la mente, para discernir y vivir de acuerdo a «lo que es la voluntad de Dios, lo bueno, lo agradable, lo perfecto» (ver Rom 12,1-2).

Si quieres ser discípulo de Cristo, prepárate para la prueba. Encontrarás en tu camino oposición, resistencia, incluso persecución, abierta o encubierta. Todo ello traerá sin duda una cuota de dolor a tu vida. Pero, ¿qué hacer con esas espinas que encontrarás en el camino? Acéptalas, asume serenamente el dolor que ellas te produzcan, pues quien quiere alcanzar la corona de la vida eterna y la gloria que sólo Cristo puede ofrecer, debe aceptar también la corona del dolor que purifica, que eleva, que hace crecer y madurar hasta alcanzar la misma estatura de Cristo. Por ello, en el fiel seguimiento del Señor, acoge las espinas que encontrarás en el camino. No les temas. No les huyas. Sus heridas son superficiales. Teje con ellas una corona y ciñe con ellas tu corazón, a semejanza del Señor y de tu Madre amada. Esas espinas florecerán con rosas de inmortalidad y de auténtica realización. No son espinas que destruyen, como aquellas que portan las "rosas del mundo" y sus placeres. Esas espinas sí son venenosas. Yacen ocultas detrás de las rosas y traicioneramente te hieren cuando menos lo esperas. ¡Considéralo bien! Las rosas que recoge el mundo para hacerse una corona de gloria se marchitan, se deshojan, y finalmente sólo quedan las espinas que punzarán eternamente. Mas con las espinas que los discípulos de Cristo encontramos en el camino, es al revés. Éstas, aceptadas con paciencia y fortaleza, ocultan las blancas rosas que de botones devienen en armoniosas y bellas flores.



Twenty Second Sunday in Ordinary Time—Sunday, September 10th

<u>Theme:</u> We are called to help one another grow as a community of faith. <u>Breaking Open the Word</u> Suggested text for faith sharing: Gospel Mt 18:15-20

Jesus said to his disciples: If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have won over your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, so that 'every fact may be established on the testimony of two or three witnesses.' If he refuses to listen to them, tell the church. If he refuses to listen even to the church, then treat him as you would a Gentile or a tax collector. Amen, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. Again, amen, I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything for which they are to pray, it shall be granted to them by my heavenly Father. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

Step One: Listen to the Word

When you hear the Gospel proclaimed today, what words or phrases really strike you? What lingers in your memory from this reading?

Step Two: Look into Your Life

Question for Children: What is one thing you would do for someone whom you loved?

<u>**Question for Youth:**</u> Jesus tells us about the importance of community and friendship. When have you helped heal an argument between friends? How did that feel?

Question for Adults: How do you make sure you follow the way of love as described by Paul in today's reading? What steps do you take to eliminate the unloving — grudges, hatred, prejudice, or others.
