ST. IGNATIUS LOYOLA GOLF CLASSIC EARLY BIRD RAFFLE WINNERS



14TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2 Corinthians 12:7-10 Mark 6:1-6

DESPITE YOUR WEEKNESS-MY GRACE IS ENOUGH FOR YOU THE ISSUE OF SUICIDE

St. Paul is one of the greatest preachers and teachers the Church ever had. We hold him in such high esteem that we give him his own feast day on January 25th and he shares a Solemnity Feast Day with St. Peter, our first Pope on July 29th. St. Paul is known as the Apostle to the Gentiles. Since Sunday June 10th, we have been listening to his second letter to the people of Corinth (Modern day Greece). Paul writes his letters, like myself or any pastor of a parish in the bulletin, to explain to his people what is happening in the church. He often explains or clarifies a church teaching, corrects abuses or anything that goes against the Church's practices and beliefs. Paul also, to his credit, writes about his personal life whether it be his triumphs or his struggles. The most interesting thing to note is that he sees any of his experiences, good or bad, through the lens of the life of Jesus Christ. He did always believe that for him "life is Christ."

Paul wrote many letters to the Corinthians. The Second Letter is a combination of multiple letters, not just one. In 2 Corinthians, we discover that St. Paul struggled with 2 types of crisis. One, an outside crisis, where a certain group known as the Super Apostles challenged his very identity of being an Apostle. They claimed he was not a real follower of Jesus and was a fraud. What made it difficult for Paul is that many of the Corinthians followed them.

Secondly, St. Paul struggled with an inner, personal crisis. We hear about this today when St. Paul writes about his "thorn in the flesh." We are not sure what exactly this situation is all about. It could be mental illness, anger, depression, or a physical ailment. St. Paul could have looked at this challenge as a road block to his mission for Christ. Instead he looked at his problem not as a challenge, but as an opportunity to grow closer to Jesus in faith. Even though we probably will never know what this "thorn in the flesh" might be, St. Paul makes it clear that there is no problem that Jesus cannot overcome. When he felt overwhelmed, Paul took it as an opportunity to develop a greater reliance on God. The struggle was itself an opportunity to cooperate with Christ and through it find a path to deeper faith and richer grace. Even with the first problem, Paul relied on others like Titius and Timothy to help him along the way. He recognized that he was not alone.

St. Paul's experience can be used to help any of us or people we know, who struggle with any type of mental illness or distress in life that is so traumatizing that can lead to committing suicide. Recently, the issue of suicide came to the forefront with the deaths of 2 celebrities the designer Kate Spade and the celebrity chef Anthony Bourdain. In 2016 approximately 45,000 people took their lives through the act of suicide, causing it to be the 10th leading cause of death in our nation. Obviously, suicide and mental illness is a problem that needs to be looked at on many levels so that we can help those who are in pain and in desperate need of help.

While in the past, suicide was looked upon as a pathway to hell, the Church now looks upon it in a more wholesome way. While the Church teaches in the Catholic Catechism that suicide contradicts the natural inclination to preserving and perpetuating life, she looks at it as an illness. She teaches that grave psychological disturbances, anguish, or grave fear of hardship, suffering or torture can diminish the responsibility of the one committing suicide (CCC 2282). The Church tells us that we should not despair of the eternal salvation of persons who have taken their own life. For those of us who have lost loved ones to suicide, we can entrust their souls to an all merciful and loving God. As a society, we still have not fully embraced that mental illness can happen to anyone and can be treated. Often, we are afraid to talk about it to others, about ourselves or other family members because we think we will be isolated or shunned away. There is a stigma to it. Unfortunately, this is what happened to Kate Spade. While I don't know her whole situation, my prayer is that she will

teach each of us a lesson and that is, we cannot go it alone. We need others to support us. Let us not forget that we have a God whom St Paul relied on, who gives us the grace to know that each of us are his special gifts and that we can reach out to him in prayer. God also sends people into our midst to listen and to help us along the way.

In an Opinion column entitled "My Mom's Suicide Was Preventable", in the Wall Street Journal, Karl Rove, former Advisor of Pres. George W. Bush, writes about his own mom's taking of her life and the pain it left him and his family. He writes that survivors and loved ones often blame themselves for the person's death. But, suicide is the most "personal, solitary decision a person can make. They are driven by depression, anxiety, drug addiction, broken relationships and other disorders. Rove goes on however, to state that there are measures we can take to do our best to prevent it. We need to no longer look at mental illness as a stigma or character flaw. It is an illness just like cancer or heart disease. We can reach out for help, listen to others and encourage them to seek help. All of us need to remember that we are all beloved by God no matter what we face in life.

Last year, I took a course entitled safeTalk which was set to help train people to be aware of the signs of a person who is suicidal.

Here are the four (4) items I learned that want I share with you:

- **TALK** People with thoughts of suicide should not be afraid to share—look for a trusted teacher, family member or friend.
- **ASK** If you notice someone is showing signs of taking their life, be direct with them, Ask are you thinking about suicide?

LISTEN-Tell the person, this is important, let's talk about this I am listening.

KEEP SAFE-Tell the person, we need extra help, I want to connect you with someone who can help keep you safe. One thing we should never do is DISMISS. Listen to your gut, your conscience.

Please do not hesitate to talk with any of us priests or our staff if you or a loved one is plagued by mental illness or thoughts of suicide. We are here for you!

One Minute Meditations

Bl. Pier Giorgio Frassati

Pier Giorgio was born in 1901, in Turin, Italy. From a young age, he had a deep love for the Holy



Eucharist and the Blessed Virgin and had a rich spiritual life. Pier used what resources he had to help the poor. He was devoted to serving the sick, caring for orphans and helping the servicemen returning from war. He studied engineering to better serve Christ among the miners, but died before completing his degree.

Forgive yourself first

Forgiveness can be a gift we easily offer to others but deny ourselves. Yet, learning to forgive ourselves is a critical ingredient in the ability to forgive others. Consider offering yourself the loving gift of forgiveness:

Release the emotion. A well-formed conscience feels guilt for sin. A mistake triggers sadness and regret. Holding on to these negative feelings makes them patterns that become part of who we are. Instead, attack the emotion associated with the transgression and release it. Go to Confession, perform acts of kindness,

Clarify morals. The reason most of us feel ashamed of our wrongdoings is because they are out of line with our

faith and morals. Fortunately, examining our actions can actually clue us into what we really feel is important. Bringing our actions in line with our beliefs is a positive outcome from transgressions. Growth makes forgiveness possible.

Give yourself a do over. Refusing to forgive ourselves means we are locked in the past. Instead, the goal is to learn from the experience to avoid repetition. To help, write down how you would act differently if you had the

chance to do it again. You will see the skills you have acquired as a result and be able to move on to a better future.

Why do Catholics pray?

We pray to bond with God, whether to praise him, to ask forgiveness for our sins, to thank him, or to ask him for help. Prayer is our connection to God, who created us and wants to have a relationship with us.

Our prayer is always a response to God's invitation: "Whether we realize it or not, prayer is the encounter of God's thirst with ours. God thirsts that we may thirst for him" (Catechism of

the Catholic Church, #2560).

Use the Bible well

There's an old saying, "Bibles that are falling apart usually belong to people who aren't." Try these tips to get the most out of your reading:

Choose a Catholic version. The New American Bible is read during Mass but there are other Catholic translations. Most important is having an edition you enjoy that contains all the Catholic books. (Here is a list: usccb.org/bible/approved-translations/index.cfm.)

Use the aids. The Bible contains customs and terms that are foreign to us. Read the introductions and footnotes for helpful explanations.

Focus on passages. The Bible will make more sense if you read the sections that are grouped together rather than sentence by sentence.

Mark it up. Underline and make notes in the margins as you read to make your book more useful.

Read aloud. The Bible began as an oral tradition. Hearing the passages read may help

them become clearer.

Live it. What you read in the Bible will help you find strength to meet the challenges of life. Don't just read it. Live it.

from Scripture

This Gospel passage records the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and the fishes. The crowds following Jesus were hungry, so Jesus asked Philip where they could get enough food. Dismayed, Philip figured that two hundred days' wages still wouldn't buy enough food for them. Like Philip, we can face problems that seem too big for us and get dismayed.

The apostle Andrew was more industrious; he found a boy with five loaves of barley bread and two fish. The boy willingly offered to Jesus all he had, meager though it was. What a surprise

when Jesus fed the five thousand "as much...as they wanted." Even after they'd had their fill of bread,

there were still twelve wicker baskets left over. God can't be outdone in generosity.

> Being faced with problems that appear beyond our ability to solve can feel overwhelming. It's easy to react like Philip and give up hope. On our own,

we may not have much to offer. By offering what we have to God, meager though it may be, he can accomplish amazing feats through us.





July 3 – St. Thomas (1st Century). Known as "doubting Thomas" for requesting proof of the Resurrection, he made a beautiful profession of faith when he received proof, "My Lord and My God" (John 20:28). Tradition says that Thomas evangelized the Parthians, Medes, and Persians, and ultimately reached India. He was martyred near Mylapore.

July 9 – St. Veronica Giuliani (1727). Born in Italy, in 1660, St. Veronica entered the Capuchin order as soon as she was old enough to marry. Soon after, she began receiving visions of Christ's Passion and, by a special grace, received the marks of Christ's wounds on her body.

July 25 – St. James (1st Century). When Jesus called St. James and his brother, John, to become apostles, they left their father in a fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee. St. James was one of three apostles to witness Jesus' transfiguration, the raising of Jairus' daughter, and

raising of Jairus' daughter, and the agony in Gethsemane. St. James was the first of the apostles to be martyred.

What isexpectedof Catholics?

Make room for love: "You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church." Fasting helps us free our hearts for God's love.



Supreme Court Narrowly Upholds Religious Freedom:

In a 7-2 decision, the U.S. Supreme Court **overturned** Colorado courts and found that **baker Jack Phillips was not guilty of discrimination** when he declined to design a wedding cake for a same-sex couple because of his religious beliefs. **However, the decision is narrow** since the court merely found that CO only exhibited anti-religious bias and it did not resolve the underlying dispute between "non-discrimination" **principles** and freedom of speech and religion.




Religious Persecution - International Report:

Nigeria: In 2014, Boko Haram (meaning 'Western Education is Forbidden') abducted 270 mostly Christian girls from a boarding school in Chibok. Only the Christian girls are allowed to be sold into slavery and prostitution.

By 2018, about 60 of these girls had escaped, others were released after payments made, and about 100 are still in captivity.

To date, Boko Haram has killed over 20,000 people in predominantly Christian southern Nigeria.
