Focus on Religious Freedom

What Does "Religious Freedom" Really Mean? - Freedom of Religion is a fundamental human right and the first among rights guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution. It protects conscience of all people and is the right to think, express and act upon what we deeply believe.

Freedom of Religion as a political principle, strives to forbid government restrictions on peoples' choices or beliefs. It requires that people be free to act upon their beliefs in both private worship and their actions in the public square.

The Bill of Rights is clear that Freedom of Religion is about the freedom to believe, or not believe, a religious doctrine or practice without interference from the government.

Therefore, government must remain neutral in regard to religious beliefs and cannot favor one religion for its beliefs or punish a religion for its beliefs.

What Does "Separation of Church and State" Really Mean?

- Many Americans are surprised to learn that the words, "Separation of Church and State" do not appear anywhere in the Constitution or Bill of Rights. This phrase is from a letter **President** Thomas Jefferson wrote in 1802 to the Danbury Baptist Association of Connecticut in response to their concerns about their Religious Freedom. Jefferson used the metaphor "wall of separation between church and state" to explain restrictions that are only on the government and not on the people. At the heart of his assurance of a "wall of separation" is the guarantee that the government will not interfere with the peoples' rights to worship God as well as to practice their beliefs. Today many choose to reverse the real meaning of Jefferson's words to place restrictions on people instead of on government.



Society makes it acceptable to pursue our own happiness without concern for others. As followers of Christ we know that God holds us responsible for meeting others' needs. When we care for the poor and needy, God will take care of us.

Give it to God

"Never forget that God loves you deeply and cares for you passionately. 'Cast all your worries upon him because he cares for you'"

(1 Peter 5:7).

Make Jesus' Mother your own

Catholics reserve worship for God, but Mary has a special place of honor in our hearts. When we follow

Jesus' request to take his Mother as our own, we are sheltered by her maternal protection, share in the love between Mother and Son, and take a unique route to the heart of Our Lord.

"Behold the handmaid of the Lord" (Luke 1:38). From the first "Yes" to her unique role in God's plan to the final moments at the foot of the Cross, Mary cooperated with faith, hope, and charity in

faith, hope, and charity in her Son's plan to restore supernatural life to us. She is ready to protect our new life and help us grow in love of her Son, if only we ask.

"Woman, behold your son" (John 19:26). Jesus' suffering and

death on the Cross was the ultimate act of love. Out of

love, too, he offered to share his beloved

Mother with all of us as our own Mother.

Heeding Jesus' words, "Behold your mother" (John 19:27), we can take Mary into our hearts and homes.

"Do whatever he tells you" (John 2:5). Mary brought others to Jesus by bringing him into the world and talking about him. Bringing others to

Jesus is our job, too. We can follow her example, ask for her help, and be obedient like her.



Why do Catholics believe the Church is Apostolic?

We call the Church, "Apostolic," because it is founded on the Apostles whom Jesus appointed to carry on his work.

Before he ascended, Jesus commissioned the Apostles to baptize and preach the Gospel in his name (Matthew 28:19-20). The Apostles ordained others to carry on this mission, and they ordained others. The Catholic faith has been preserved and handed down to us from the Apostles through their successors, our bishops, who can trace their

"priestly lineage" back to the Apostles.

Show others the way to God

God has called all of us to follow him but we are also called to lead. Aiding another's spiritual growth in simple ways can lead others to Christ.

Be on the watch. Ask God to reveal to you those who don't know him. Record their names and commit to praying for them daily.

Go to Mass together. Inviting a friend or someone seeking a spiritual home to attend Sunday Mass with you is a great way to spend time together and show commitment to the faith.

Offer prayer cards. Promote prayer and a devotion to the saints by sending an occasional prayer card featuring a saint relevant to his or her life issues.

Build bridges. Spend time with those seeking God. Show them what a life with him looks like. Invite seekers to dinner, go for coffee, listen to their problems. In other words, be a friend.

Share his love. God's love breaks down barriers and removes prejudices. Act with love toward others. A little kindness may open the door for the Gospel.

from Scripture

John 6:60-69, To whom shall we go?

This reading comes at the end of Jesus' Bread of Life Discourse, in which he explained the meaning of the Eucharist. Jesus said that he is the Bread of Life. Unless we eat his flesh and drink his blood, we will not have eternal life. Many of his listeners left, horrified.

The Apostles were also shocked. The day before, enthusiastic crowds were ready to make Jesus king. Now they were running away and Jesus let them go. He understood that the truth is more important than popularity.

Jesus turned to the Apostles and asked if they wanted to leave, too. Peter,

speaking for the group, replied,

"Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68). They all recognized Jesus as the source of eternal life. They believed him, even though they didn't fully understand him.

Followers of Christ know that there is always hope even in times that appear hopeless. We remember Peter's words: "Master...you

have the words of eternal life." With God, we all can have hope. He can bring us eternal life.

Q Is it okay& to tell aA "white lie"?

The Eighth commandment directs us to tell the truth always (Exodus 20:16). While a "white lie" told to avoid hurting

someone else's feelings may seem harmless, telling lies is never acceptable. Here are some suggestions to help:

"Does this look good on me?" A dishonest "yes" creates the wrong impression in the wearer's mind. Instead of brutal honesty – "You look fat!" - offer a truthful positive – "It's a great color on you." This is "mental

reservation," and is better than lying.

"That's personal..." Questions about your personal life, family, and financials don't require explanations, if the seeker has no right to know. A simple, "That's personal," should get the message across. This goes for seeking others' personal information as well (CCC #2489).

Tell the truth with love. What is right and wrong is not decided by popular vote. Admonishing the sinner is actually a spiritual act of mercy. "Whoever fears the Lord directs his friendship aright, for as he is, so his neighbor [will be] also" (Sirach 6:17).

Feasts & 🗕 💿 Celebrations

Aug. 7 – St. Cajetan (1547). St. Cajetan worked to reform the Church by founding the Theatines, a religious order modeled on the teachings of the Apostles.

Aug. 11 – St. Clare of Assisi (1253). Born to a noble family in Assisi, Italy, St. Clare followed St. Francis of Assisi into poverty at age eighteen and founded a sister order to the Franciscans called, the "Poor Clares."

Aug. 15 – Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (1950). Declared a dogma of our faith in 1950 by Pope Pius XII, the Assumption celebrates Mary's being taken up into Heaven body and soul at the end of her life.

Aug. 24 - St. Bartholomew (1st Century). One of the Twelve Apostles and the son of Tolomai, Bartholomew is thought by some scholars to be the Apostle, Nathanael, who went with Philip to see Jesus. After Jesus's ascension, he spread Christianity to India and in Armenia, where he was martyred. He is the patron saint of Armenia and Belgium, among other places.

COMUNIDAD HISPANA



Un profesor de medicina contó esta historia del caroteno, el nutriente que da a las zanahorias su color anaranjado. Dijo que una vez le visitó una familia orgullosa que había estado diligente en su consumo de zanahorias. Pensaba el padre de la familia que cuantas más zanahorias come la persona, mayor es el valor nutritivo recibe. Entonces cuando llegaba a la casa del profesor, ¡la familia lucía del color anaranjado! A veces nos hacemos como la comida que consumimos. Esto es ciertamente el caso de la Eucaristía de que Jesús habla en el evangelio de hoy.

El pasaje muestra a los judíos como perplejos acerca de la declaración de Jesús. Dice que va a darles su carne a comer. "¿Cómo...?" responde la gente. Este interrogante ha resonado por veinte siglos en todas partes del mundo. Sin embargo, Jesús no se dirige a la cuestión. Sólo insiste en la eficacia de su carne que ofrece como

comida. Dice: "Si no comen la carne del Hijo del hombre y no beben su sangre, no podrán tener vida en ustedes".

Es su vida que el consumo de su carne produce. Aquellos que la tomen se hacen como él. No se derrotarán por las fuerzas nefarias de la vida actual. Más bien muestran el mismo dominio del yo y empeño por los demás que caracterizan la historia de Jesús.

La segunda lectura de la Carta a los Efesios advierte: "No se embriaguen". Quiere que los lectores eviten todas formas de adicciones por el dominio del yo. Como resultado se siente decepcionada y confundida.

Tomando la carne de Jesús el cristiano hace un pacto con él. Promete seguir sus enseñanzas particularmente el mandamiento de amar a los demás cómo él ha amado. Por su parte Jesús provee las ayudas necesarias, particularmente el discernimiento y la determinación del Espíritu Santo. Aunque sea incomprensible a algunos, este pacto lleva al cristiano a una vida ambas digna y satisfactoria. Produce otro beneficio aún más llamativo.
