

What I say to you in the darkness, speak in the light, what you hear whispered, proclaim on the housetops. (Matthew 10:27)

My brothers and sisters of St. Ignatius Loyola:

It is hard to believe but another Summer season has gone by. I pray that you have had some time to do something special and different with your family and your friends. I had the opportunity to travel with my mom up to the great state of Alaska. It is truly God's country. I could see how God has been the great artist of creation by seeing beautiful mountains, landscapes, bears and glaciers.

All was great until we were preparing to arrive home when the Pennsylvania Grand Jury came out with its report on August 14, 2018 outlining the cases of child sexual abuse perpetrated against innocent children over a period of seventy years. What really hit close to home is that some of the priests I knew from my home Diocese of Scranton. One of them I served with and in a parish, whom I knew very well and respected. Words cannot describe the sadness and how disheartened I felt after I read his story and the more horrific stories that happened across the state. It reminded me of the series American Horror on the FX channel, only this was very real.

There can be no excuses or rationalization for the disordered and sinful actions by priests, religious or any lay person in the Church. Sexual abuse is an illness and a crime and it must be stated so. What makes this even worse is the attempt to cover up these crimes. Quoting Msgr. Jim Pereda, of St. Paul's Jericho, "these acts of violence by our priests are a violation of their sacred vows and violation of the sanctity of the ordained state". "Like all sin, it serves as a poison, harming many others for generations to come". It is the Devil's best diabolical way to undermine and divide the Church's work.

Like me, you may feel frustrated, depressed and/ or helpless. But, please do not despair. Our faith tells us that through the darkness of life, the light of Christ shall always come forth. Like Mary, our Mother and the Beloved Disciple John at the Cross of Jesus, we need to look for the greater good. Look at all the possible good that can come from this evil situation and how Christ is purifying our Church.

The best thing we can do now is pray, ask for forgiveness, fast and abstain. Pray particularly for the victims who were abused and are still feeling effects of the abuse. Pray for our Pope, Bishops and Priests to remain faithful to their promises and vows of chastity, obedience and for some, poverty. Pray for the good priests who are doing their best to keep the ship afloat. Pray for a conversion of heart so that the Church, under the guidance of our Holy Father, Pope Francis, will right the wrongs done by our brothers and sisters in Christ and the Cardinals and Bishops who have covered it up so that we can look anew. Also, pray for forgiveness that God's mercy will wash over each of us. I wonder how long God will be patient with these acts of violence without action. If you can, please pray for the priests, and anyone else in the Church who committed these abuses. May God convert their hearts and help them see the pain they have caused for their victims, their families, parishes and themselves.

In light of this, I invite you to JOIN MY BROTHER PRIESTS, DEACONS AND ME for a HOLY HOUR OF PRAYER, HEALING AND RECONCILIATION on Saturday September 15, 2018 at 7:30pm, the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows, here at St. Ignatius Loyola Church.

In conclusion I share with you this beautiful poem written by one of our former catechists. This gives us all hope and is used with her permission.

HOW TO SURIVIVE A SCANDAL

How do you console a devout, kindly priest.
Whose heart has been broken by news of abuse?
How do you comfort him with purpose at least,
Who thinks his years spent have been of no use?
How do you manage all that bad news:
There are no more chances or reviews?
Don't you recall that warned we have been?
The trouble and sorrow we would be in?
The addictions eat up every hope of change:
The result can be that we become deranged.



One Minute Meditations

St. John Chrysostom

St. John received his name "Chrysostom"

("goldenmouthed") for his eloquent homilies.

Born in Antioch around 349 A.D. and raised by a devoutly Christian mother, he wanted to be a monk, but was ordained a priest instead. He later became Bishop of Constantinople. His calls for reform of the wealthy and his criticism of the powerful and corrupt earned him exile. He was known for his personal holiness, faithful teaching of the Gospel, and generosity to the poor.

Take the long view

Our nature urges us toward satisfaction now, but we often learn the necessity of taking the long view. For example, saving means financial security later in life. Our faithfulness to God now will lead us to great reward later.

"For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens" (2 Corinthians 5:1).

Find joy in Church

Worship is God's idea. He intends our connection to him to be joyful and exhilarating. Yet, when our worship in church becomes routine, we can lose the sense of joy. Try these ideas to recapture the fun in faith and worship.

Mass is a celebration when Heaven and Earth meet. Approach each Mass as you would any great occasion. Dress your best. Imagine the other guests who will be there. Anticipate the food you will receive – food no one else can serve. Fast for an hour before to whet your appetite.

"And I commend enjoyment, for man has no good thing under the sun but to

eat and drink and enjoy himself ..." (Ecclesiastes 8:15). Greet your neighbors warmly. Laugh at the priest's jokes during the homily. Smile at the cute altar servers. Sing loudly and with vigor.

Find out who needs you. There are few

better ways to feel loved than to joyfully give love first. Call the parish office to see if anyone needs a ride to Mass, help getting groceries, or just needs prayers.

Why Do Catholics Do That

Why do Catholic Churches have stained glass windows?

In the days of the early Church, most church goers couldn't read, so the images were teaching tools. They told stories of Christ's life or of the saints. Today, these beautiful windows inspire us to reflect on our own faith.



Stained glass windows also remind us that we are in no ordinary building. Here, "the truth and the harmony of the signs ... should show Christ to be present and active in this place" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1181).

Giving from a grateful heart

In Old Testament times, a faithful farmer gave the first of his harvest to the temple for God's use. He understood that it was through God's blessing that he had a harvest at all. We, too, can give to God from our grateful hearts.

Give God the first, best moments. Many of us rush through our day from the moment we open our eyes. We forget that it is by God's grace that we are even able to see a new day. Instead, give the first moments of the day to God in prayer.

Pay God first. Most of us pay pressing bills first - housing, food, insurance - and give to the Church from what is left. Then we grumble when our parish fundraises to meet its needs. Yet all we have is through God's blessing in the first place. In fact, if we each give to the Sunday collection for God's use a first portion of our income - the Biblical 10%, for example - all our important needs will be met.



Mark 9:38-43, 45, 47-48, The discipline of discipleship

In this Gospel passage, the disciples hear of an unknown man who healed in Jesus' name. In their jealousy, it seemed the disciples were more concerned about losing the spotlight than in healing. Jesus put things into perspective. The man had the same goal as the disciples to build up God's Kingdom. They gained a teammate, not an enemy.

Discipleship means making a change of heart and mind. Jesus was very clear: if we choose to follow him, we can't foster private sins, too. If, through those sins, we lead others into sin, our responsibility is doubled.

Feasts &

These are grim words, but the opposite is great news: "Whoever obeys and teaches these commandments will be called greatest in the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:19).

God rewards us for the good we do to and for others. Our example is powerfully influential.

Being a faithful disciple isn't easy. Rooting out personal sin and setting a good example is difficult, but we're not alone or without grace to do the job. No matter what we sacrifice, the reward is infinitely better.

Sept. 3 - Pope St. Gregory the Great (604). St. Gregory resigned as chief prefect of Rome to become a monk and turned the family estate into the Abbey of St. Andrew. As Pope, he used his political skill to make peace with the invading Lombards,

save Rome from famine, and restore

more than twenty years without children. Mary's birth brought her parents joy, and we are joyful too because Mary brings salvation to all of us with the birth of Jesus.

Sept. 23 - St. Padre Pio (1968). Born to farmers in southern Italy, Padre Pio was an inspiring confessor and counselor. He received the five wounds of Our Lord's Passion (stigmata) eight years after he became a Capuchin Friar. Despite intense personal and physical suffering, he remained dedicated to prayer.

Q What can we & find in every Catholic church?

Each Catholic church is decorated differently, but some elements stay the same. Here are a few items you can find in every Catholic church.



Crucifix: One of the defining features of a Catholic church is the presence of a crucifix - a cross with Christ's body on it. The crucifix reminds us of Christ's

saving sacrifice, made mysteriously present again at Mass, and of God's infinite love for us.

Baptismal fonts: Blessing ourselves with holy water recalls our own baptism, which washed us of Original Sin and made us members of the Church. In blessing ourselves, we renew our baptismal promise.

Statues of Saints: Having statues and images of the saints in church helps us recall their examples of heroic virtue and faithful love for God. In honoring them, we honor God who created them.

Tabernacle: Every Catholic church has a tabernacle - a box that contains the Eucharist (look for the red candle to show it is occupied). Here Jesus, really present in the Eucharist, waits for us to visit him.

Según nuestra propia experiencia, es necesario poder aprender a escuchar antes de poder hablar. Es por eso, que muchos niños con problemas del oído ya sean completamente sordos o no, tienen también dificultad en hablar. En mucho de los casos, cuando un niño experimenta dificultad en hablar, la familia descubre que su hijo/a tiene dificultad en escuchar.

Lo mismo sucede cuando una persona está tratando de aprender otro idioma. El individuo puede pasar horas y horas con los libros, pero no

es hasta que tiene la oportunidad de escuchar a otras personas hablar ese idioma, que el individuo puede finalmente aprenderlo. Hay que escuchar bien, no solamente las palabras, sino

también la entonación, ritmo y énfasis. Posiblemente, conocemos a personas que han vivido años en otro país entre parientes y amigos que hablan su idioma natal, y nunca aprenden otro idioma. Al contrario, los niños en las escuelas y los que trabajan donde tienen que escuchar el nuevo idioma, aprenden rápido.

En el Evangelio, Jesús abrió los oídos de un sordo que hablaba con dificultad. Cuando se le abrieron los oídos, el defecto de la lengua desapareció y el hombre empezó a hablar bien. El pobre no pudo contener su alegría y tuvo que compartir la buena nueva con todos. Se había convertido desde una persona conocida por su enfermedad en un mensajero del poder de Dios en la persona de Jesús, a pesar que era originario de una región de no-judíos.

¿Cómo es con nosotros? ¿Cómo debemos de oír para poder hablar como mensajeros de Dios? Es de suma importancia reflexionar sobre las experiencias de la vida, de lo que hemos visto y vivido. Por ejemplo, debemos preguntarnos: ¿Cuál y cómo ha sido nuestro caminar hasta el día de hoy? Tenemos también que recordar las personas que hemos encontrado en el camino de la vida, los que han sufrido tragedias personales, los que han sacrificado todo para empezar de nuevo en un país extraño, los que sufren de injusticia en su trabajo, los que han sido deportados o visto a un ser querido ser deportado, los que han sido victimas de discriminación, los que han perdido todo en un fracaso económico. Hay que escucharlos bien, y dejar penetrar sus palabras hasta el corazón. Y después, tenemos que hablar de la justicia, de la compasión, de la misericordia de Dios, y tenemos que entrar en la lucha para la creación de un mundo mejor.

Isaías había previsto un tiempo en que "se iluminarán los ojos de los ciegos y los oídos de los sordos se abrirán. Saltará como un venado, el cojo y la lengua del mudo cantará." Esta visión es la voluntad de Dios. Nos toca escuchar bien. Nos toca abrir los oídos para escuchar el dolor de los pobres y después abrir la boca para crear la realidad de tal visión en nuestro tiempo. Precisa que escuchamos los gritos de los oprimidos, los lamentos de los abandonados, y los llantos de los
