



26th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Mark 9:38-48

WE ARE ONE IN THE SPIRIT, WE ARE ONE IN THE LORD

In our Sunday Gospel from Mark, we read that the youngest apostle (John, the brother of James) has the loudest voice. Jesus called these two the "Sons of Thunder" (see Mark 3:17) John seems to be motivated by a holy zeal to stop others who are doing good without the disciples' authorization. John tells Jesus that he came across a man casting out demons in the name of Jesus—but he is "not one of us" and John thinks he should be silenced. Exorcists of this sort were common in antiquity. We see in the Gospel of Luke how James, the other brother, shows a similar intolerance toward a Samaritan who refused the hospitality of Jesus and his disciples. James calls for fire from Heaven to come down upon him. In the Book of Acts of the Apostles, the seven sons of a Jewish priest named Sceva have a rude surprise when they try to cast out demons in the name of "Jesus whom Paul preaches" (Acts 19:11-20).

Jesus does not accept this attitude at all. As their leader, he is certainly aware of the demands on loyal-ty needed to keep his group of Middle Eastern men together. However, Jesus wants to expand the boundaries of loyalty and include those working toward the same goals, like the person working to free another person, from the oppression of the devil. Jesus is telling his disciples that whenever good work is done in service of others, it should not be stopped. This volunteer is on their side and will not be inclined to speak against Jesus and his ministry.

This reminds me of how our Church has changed toward other Christians who worship and serve in our midst. When my parents grew up, you would not even dare to enter into a Protestant church because it was considered sacrilegious.

We felt that the Protestants were on the wrong side of history and were in error in their teachings. The Church has evolved, however, since the Second Vatican Council, where the Church recognizes that Christ is also in the other churches, not only our own. In the Vatican II Decree on Ecumenism, **Unitatis Redintgratio**, the Church recognizes the wounds caused by historic division between other Christians and herself. The documents states that "large communities became separated from the Catholic Church of which both men are to blame." (Catechism of the Catholic Church CCC #187) We cannot blame those who are born today for the problems of today, not of their own making. "Those who are Baptized, no matter in what Church, are incorporated into the Body of Christ. They therefore, have a right to be called Christians and with good reason are accepted as brothers (sisters) in the Lord, by the Children of the Catholic Church" (CCC 818). Many elements of holiness and truth are found outside the Catholic Church such as the Word of God, the life of grace, hope, faith and charity; and the gifts of the Holy Spirit" (CCC 819) All of these gifts lead us to Christ and call of Christian Unity.

To honor our perseverance for unity, Joe Samodulski and I take part in an ecumenical breakfast meeting once a month with the pastors and some of the outreach coordinators of Holy Family, Our Lady of Mercy, Trinity Lutheran, St. Stephen's Lutheran, Holy Trinity Episcopal, Hicksville United Methodist, and the Graffiti Church. We discuss the issues of our community and how best to work together as one body of Christ. We host different Worship Events in Advent, Christian Unity Week and during Lent. Please check the bulletin for announcements and try to come and join us because they are not against us, they are for us! Currently, we are working on a project to have a shelter for the Homeless. More details to come at a later date.

May God bless you and Mary keep you and your families always.

Pennsylvania's Grand Jury Report on Clergy Sexual Abuse By Fr. Thomas Reese, SJ

Even though it is already a month since the release of Pennsylvania Grand jury report, you may have questions and concerns how to read the report and what it means for our Church. Please take time to read the following article as published in the National Catholic Reporter by Fr. Thomas Reese, SJ.

How to read Pennsylvania's grand jury report on clergy sexual abuse Aug 8, 2018 (Written Before the Documents Release) by <u>Thomas Reese</u>, <u>Religion News Service</u>

(AP Photo/Matt Rourke) After a month long challenge by a few of those named in the document, Pennsylvania's Supreme Court has approved the release of a grand jury's report on sexual abuse of minors in six Catholic dioceses across the state. The grand jury, convened in 2016, considered the cases of some 300 priests accused of being predators, as well as bishops accused of covering up the crimes.

Here are a few things that journalists and other interested parties should look for.

First, did the grand jury find any new prosecutable offenses?

The answer is probably no. The statute of limitations, which has protected many abusive priests from prosecution, has likely expired on many of the crimes detailed in the report. Nor is it likely that any bishops can be prosecuted for not reporting priests to the authorities, because that was not required by law until recently in most states.

Second, did the report find any priests credibly accused of abuse who are still in ministry or any bishop currently in office who kept a bad priest in ministry?

Again, the answer is probably no, thanks to the procedures the church put in place in 2002 for dealing with abusive priests. Accusations are now reported to the police and investigated by the accused's diocese. If an accusation is judged credible, the priest is suspended while an investigation takes place; if it is substantiated, the priest is permanently removed from ministry.

If a bishop was in office before 2002, he might have kept a priest in ministry. Then the question becomes, did this priest abuse again?

Beyond these important questions, understanding the significance of the grand jury report will mean following the timeline. Dates will matter.

We know from the John Jay study of clerical abuse that the number of alleged abuses increased in the 1960s, peaked in the '70s, declined in the '80s and by the '90s had returned to the levels of the 1950s. These statistics are a surprise to most people because the press coverage was much later when the abuse victims came forward. Only the National Catholic Reporter was covering abuse as early as 1985. By the time The Boston Globe discovered it in 2002, the number of abuse cases nationally was way down.

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Dates are also important because we know that most victims of abuse do not report it until years after the abuse took place. Although most of the abuse in the Catholic Church took place from the '60s to the early '80s, most of the reports came in the '90s and later. It is hard to blame a bishop for abuse he did not know about.

Before 1985, bishops, like most Americans, were ignorant when it came to child abuse. The immediate response, when someone you knew was accused, was denial. Accusations were considered dubious even by the police.

In 1985, the first major lawsuit against a diocese took place in Lafayette, Louisiana, and soon insurance companies began telling dioceses that they would no longer cover child abuse. This wake-up call should have alerted bishops to the gravity of the problem, and some did begin to respond, some faster and better than others.

Others continued to move a priest to a new parish after he was accused of abuse. Yet others pulled priests from their parishes but returned them to ministry after "treatment." Some were put into ministries that were supposedly "child-free."

These bishops got bad advice from psychologists who told them the priests were safe to return to ministry. They also got bad advice from their chancery staffs, who were mostly priests, who felt protective of their own and often said, "Give him another chance."

Between 1985 and 1992, the American bishops discussed sexual abuse behind closed doors at their national meetings at least five times. One old bishop told me that he got up at a meeting and pleaded with the bishops, "Don't make the same mistakes I made."

In 1987, the bishops' conference recommended a five-step program for dealing with sexual abuse by clergy or church employees:

- 1.Respond promptly to all allegations where there is reasonable belief that the incident has occurred.
- 2.If the allegation is supported by sufficient evidence, relieve the alleged offender promptly of his ministerial duties and refer him for appropriate medical evaluation and intervention.
- 3. Comply with the obligations of civil law on reporting the incident and cooperating with the investigation.
- 4. Reach out to the victims and their families and communicate our sincere commitment to their spiritual and emotional well-being.
- 5. Within the confines of respect for the privacy of the individuals involved, deal as openly as possible with members of the community about the incident.

Some bishops followed these guidelines. Others, such as Cardinal Bernard Law of Boston, did not. The resulting 2002 Boston scandal led to the bishops adopting, with the approval of Rome, a zero tolerance of abuse — not a guideline, but binding on bishops. No longer would they risk returning a priest to ministry after "treatment."

Any bishop who made mistakes prior to 1985 could plead ignorance; any bishop who did not follow the 1987 guidelines should have been removed from office. Sadly, not enough bishops acknowledged their mistakes, took responsibility and resigned.

The grand jury report will undoubtedly show that the church did a bad job dealing with abuse, especially in the early years, with disastrous results. This should be reported.

But journalists should read the report like they would read any other government document. What has been proved and what is just accusation? Would your editor publish these pages or ask for more information? Since the report is undoubtedly the work of many hands, is the quality of a high standard throughout?

This is especially true when it comes to naming names. Some of those who fought the release of the grand jury report objected because it "unconstitutionally infringes on their right to reputation," as the court order put it. We must ask: Was the person convicted? If not, how many accusations were made? Are the accusations credible? Substantiated? What is the accused's response?

And when it comes to a bishop, we must ask the Watergate questions: What did he know, and when did he know it? And what did he do?

Finally, the grand jury report is a wake-up call to other U.S. dioceses. If they don't want a grand jury poking its nose into their affairs, they had better be more transparent. They should hire someone to do an independent and credible report, make it exhaustive, and publish it. People demand transparency. Either the bishops must provide it or the government will.





COMUNIDAD HISPANA



Los pasajes de las lecturas que leemos hoy nos hablan de las posibilidades que existen en la mente de Dios y la resistencia que ofrecemos cuando el trabajo no va según nuestros planes. En el pasaje de Números, los israelitas estaban quejándose fuerte contra Moisés por la falta de carne y verduras en el desierto. Por fin, Moisés no pudo aguantar más y pidió a Dios la muerte, porque no podía soportar los gritos de la gente. En respuesta, Dios le avisa que busque a 70 hombres para compartir la responsabilidad de gobierno.

Parece que toda anda bien hasta que Josué, el joven ayudante de Moisés, nota que dos de los elegidos habían faltado a la ceremonia, pero estaban hablando en nombre de Dios. Josué quiere que Moisés les prohíba. Pero Moisés responde: "¿Crees que voy a ponerme celoso? Ojalá que todo el pueblo de Dios fuera profeta y descendiera sobre todos ellos el espíritu de Señor."

El asunto es que Dios toma la iniciativa de llevar adelante la obra de Salvación, y los hombres lo oponen cuando el plan no anda según su visión. La misma cosa pasa en el Evangelio. Los discípulos se quejan a Jesús cuando ellos ven que otras personas estaban expulsando demonios en su nombre. Jesús contesta que no. Dice simplemente, "Todo aquel que no está contra nosotros, es a nuestro favor." Para Jesús, es la obra de salvación que cuenta. Los celos de estar encargado o de tener privilegios no le importa. El va aun más adelante, diciendo, "Todo aquel que les dé a beber un vaso de agua por el hecho de que son de Cristo, los aseguro que no se quedará sin recompensa."

Parece que la Iglesia está todavía en la misma discusión. ¿Quienes son elegibles para el ministerio? Hay tantas y tantas voces que discutan sobre el papel de los laicos, de la mujer en la predicación de la Palabra, de los homosexuales para el sacerdocio, de quien puede purificar los cálices en la misa, y un sin número de asuntos más. No vamos a solucionar estas preguntas, pero podemos enfocarnos en el sentido del ministerio.

Las dos lecturas indican que Dios no pone toda la responsabilidad en las manos de una sola persona. El Espíritu está repartido entre muchos para la obra de la salvación. Por medio de nuestro Bautismo, hemos recibido el Espíritu de Dios- dándonos el papel de sacerdote, profeta y rey. Según nuestra vocación, todos somos llamados a proclamar la salvación, el perdón y el misterio del amor libertador de Dios. Lo importante no es ser carismático ni cursillista, ni Caballero ni miembro de la Sociedad de San Vicente. La verdadera medida de nuestra entrega es la obra que producimos. Como dice Jesús, "Todo aquel que les de a beber un vaso de agua por el hecho de que son de Cristo, los aseguro que no se quedara sin recompensa."
