

Discrimination Against Houses of Worship Continues

A New Jersey court's decision that fixing furnaces or repairing broken plumbing in historic church buildings is "religious," is being appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court. The NJ court said that grants earmarked to repair and preserve historic buildings could not go to religious "activities," and defined these activities as basic repairs. **But the Supreme Court had ruled last year that a church cannot be excluded from programs generally available to the public.**

What do issues of historic preservation, hurricane recovery, and playground safety have in common? They are, or have been, at the center of court cases and arguments around **separation of church and state.**

In 2017, FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) was sued by 3 Texas churches and 2 Florida synagogues damaged by Hurricanes Harvey and Irma because they "explicitly denied equal access to FEMA disaster relief grants for houses of worship solely because of their religious status," said Becket Fund attorneys. **The administration offered support for the churches seeking relief funds, and by January, 2018, the discriminatory policy was reversed.**

May we reflect on these words of Paul to help us in this culture of division, negative politics and selfishness.





Three ways to walk Jesus' path

The magnificence of Heaven is simply beyond our comprehension. Our limited minds can't imagine how amazing it is. Jesus came to tell us about it and show us how to get there. He hoped we'd follow in his footsteps and do what he did.

Serve others with love. Jesus asked us to love one another as he did. Some of the ways he showed love were to treat strangers kindly, tend to the material needs of the needy, lend an attentive ear, help people make good and virtuous decisions that bring them closer to God. Try to show love in these ways daily.

Lighten your load. Not only did

Jesus have few material goods, he sent his disciples out to preach with almost nothing. He didn't want them -or us - to get distracted. Jesus knew that the more we have, the more we'd think about our stuff and the less we'd think about God. Consider shedding what you don't need, and buying only items that replace what is worn out or broken. Give the money you save to charity. Quiet down. Jesus frequently went off to be alone with

God. Take some quiet time each day just to keep company with God. Even spending as few as 15 minutes a day with God in silence will bring you peace.

Bartimaeus was a blind beggar who saw Jesus clearly. When he heard that Jesus was near he cried out,

"Son of David," a title reserved for the Messiah. Although people tried to shush him, Bartimaeus persisted until Jesus noticed him and called him over. Immediately, Bartimaeus threw off his cloak and ran to Jesus' side.

Even the little he had was discarded to get to Jesus.

Bartimaeus stood before Jesus humbly, but he was confident that Jesus had the power to do whatever he asked. The only person in Mark's Gospel to call



Oct. 2 - Feast of the Guardian Angels. All of us have a guardian angel, in charge of protecting us and watching over us day and night. Each angel is unique, and no two are alike. On this feast day, remember to thank the Guardian Angels for the work they do to bring us to Heaven.

Oct. 7 - Our Lady of the Rosary (1571). Pope Pius V created this feast in thanksgiving to Our Lady of Victory who helped the Christians defeat the Ottoman Turks. Since it was believed that they won after praying the Rosary,

the feast was renamed Our Lady of the Rosary by Pope Gregory XIII.

Oct. 9 - St. Denis (250). Originally born in third-century Italy, St. Denis was sent with two companions, Rusticus and Eleutherius, to Christianize Gaul (modern day

France). St. Denis became the first bishop of Paris. The three men were martyred by the pagan authorities for their success in converting souls to Christ. He is a patron saint of France.

Get a Catholic Bible. There are more books in Catholic versions. You don't want to miss important doctrine they contain. Catholic Bibles

will have the words "Imprimatur" and/or "Nihil obstat," meaning that the margin notes are in keeping with Church teaching.

Start deliberately. Pick a book, one of the Gospels, perhaps, and read it each day section by section or chapter by chapter. Give it your full attention while reading. Read the footnotes, and write down any connections it inspires to vour life.

Memorize a verse. Did a line or verse strike you? Write it down and learn it by heart. The more you know of God's Word, the more you know of God.

Look for a take-away: Ask God what he wants you to know from your time with his Word. Then be sure to listen with an open heart.


