## Pilgrims, Thanksgiving, and A Failed Experiment: Part 2

Few Americans realize that New England's first form of government was collectivism (socialism) and practiced what Karl Marx would promote two centuries later as: "each produced according to his ability and each received according to his need." The Pilgrims, a pious and decent people, discovered that even the best men cannot thrive under an incentive-crushing system. Within two years of the First Thanksgiving, the colonists had reaped shortages and starvation.

Writing in the *History of Plymouth Plantation*, Gov. William Bradford said that with the survival of the colony at stake, they contemplated upon "how they might raise as much corn as they could, and obtain a better crop than they had done, that they might not still thus languish in misery." They decided to abandon the collectivist model of government in favor of a more free model. So - they "assigned to each family a parcel of land, according to the proportion of their number, for that end ..."

A happy Gov. Bradford wrote, "This had very good success, for it made all hands very industrious, so as much more corn was planted than otherwise would have been ... The women now went willingly into the field, and took their little ones with them to set corn."

Thus, the Pilgrims now wished to work because they got to keep, and then trade, the benefits of their labor. They discovered that freedom is a much greater stimulus than force.

"Instead of famine, now God gave them plenty," wrote Gov. Bradford, "and the face of things was changed, to the rejoicing of the hearts of many, for which they blessed God ... Any general want or famine hath not been amongst them since to this day." "Posterity - you will never know how much it has cost my generation to preserve your freedom. I hope you will make good use of it." John Quincy Adams

### 34TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRST KING OF THE UNIVERSE JOHN 18:33B-37

#### CHRIST, KING OVER OUR LIVES AND ALL THE WORLD

As we have carved our turkeys and saved some leftovers for Turkey sandwiches, which I like, the Church is looking at the end of the year. Not the calendar year, but the Church year. We always end the year with the Sunday of the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, traditionally known as Christ the King, the last Sunday of the liturgical year. Pope Pius XI instituted this feast on February 25, 1925 in an encyclical entitled Quas Primas, meaning the First applying the title to Christ as our Lord and King.

The Pope is addressing the problems of secularism where God is left out of the lives of human beings and society organizes its life as if God did not exist. Pius XI states that where God is thrown out, chaos erupts and man is on a downfall. Sound familiar? His letter was written just as the Nazi, Communist and other Dictator regimes were growing around the world.

This feast was established to remind us of who it is we worship. We worship Christ who is a king that does not lord his power and authority over others or takes others freedoms away. He is a King that uses love, mercy and forgiveness to draw all men to himself. Instead of a crown of jewels, our Christ receives a crown of thorns. Instead of a throne of gold, his seat is the cross. Is this the King we all acclaim to follow? If so, do we allow Christ to be the King over every aspect of our life? Do we allow him to reign in our hearts? Are we faithful to his word and his actions? Is Christ our King on Sunday while we make up the rest of the rules during the week? If we are his followers, then may his grace up us to come to serve and not be served, to love and not hate, to strive for the truth and not follow or make up stories. There are so many pressures in this life that knock us off track. But, today's feast tells us that we have a God, a King who is all merciful, and always there for us to help us serve and love him better. May we open our hearts now before it is too late.

## COMUNIDAD HISPANA



El último domingo del año litúrgico los católicos celebramos la solemnidad de Cristo, Rey del Universo. Es una forma de decir que en Cristo este mundo llega a su plenitud. Este mundo y nuestra vida, claro.

Así se ve en las lecturas. El hijo del hombre de la primera lectura, tomada del profeta Daniel, se identifica con Jesús resucitado, que ha vencido a la muerte y al que se le ha dado el dominio sobre todo

el universo. Su reino no tendrá fin. La lectura del Apocalipsis da un mensaje parecido. Jesucristo nos ha liberado de nuestros pecados por su sangre, nos ha convertido en un reino y nos ha hecho sacerdotes de Dios, su padre. Le vemos venir en gloria. Es el principio y el final, el todopoderoso. Todas estas afirmaciones

forman parte de nuestra fe. Creemos en Jesús, creemos que ha vencido a la muerte y ha entrado en la nueva vida que le ha ofrecido su Padre. Con él también nosotros hemos vencido a la muerte y con él entraremos en la nueva vida que el Padre nos regala. Ese Reino del que Jesús es el centro es el reino de todos, allá donde no habrá más lágrima ni llanto, donde ni la muerte ni el dolor tendrán ningún poder.

Pero ese Reino no es de este mundo. Ése es el mensaje que nos comunica el Evangelio de Juan. Vemos a Jesús en un momento crucial de su vida. No está predicando tranquilamente a los discípulos por los caminos de Galilea. Tampoco está rodeado de una multitud que lo escucha con agrado. Ha sido detenido y está siendo juzgado por Pilato, el representante del imperio romano. Sabe que su fin más probable es ser ajusticiado. Parte del juicio es el interrogatorio del acusado. Pilato no está preocupado por los reinos celestíales. A él le preocupan los que pretenden ser reyes de este mundo y, por ello, representan una amenaza para el dominio romano. Por eso, le pregunta si cree que es el rey de los judíos. Es sólo una pregunta más del interrogatorio. Pero Jesús da una respuesta que Pilato no logra comprender: "Mi reino no es de este mundo".

Jesús afirma de sí mismo que es rey, pero de una forma diferente. Su reino no lleva a la dominación, a la opresión de los súbditos. Su reino es el reino de la verdad. Allá donde todos nos encontramos con nuestra verdad más intima: que somos hijos de Dios-Padre que quiere nuestro bien, que los demás son nuestros hermanos y hermanas. Esa verdad se desvelará algún día. El día en que seamos capaces de reconocer en nuestros corazones esa profunda verdad, ese día, en ese momento, entraremos a formar parte del Reino de Jesús. Y él, testigo de la verdad, reinará en nuestros corazones, que es el verdadero lugar donde quiere reinar. El día en que todos le reconozcamos, se cumplirán definitivamente las profecías de las dos primeras lecturas.
