

On January 22, the 46th anniversary of Roe v. Wade, Governor Cuomo signed into law the dangerous "Abortion Expansion Act". Attached is the official statement just released from the Catholic Bishops of New York State.

A Statement from the Catholic Bishops of New York State

Words are insufficient to describe the profound sadness we feel at the contemplated passage of New York State's new proposed abortion policy. We mourn the unborn infants who will lose their lives, and the many mothers and fathers who will suffer remorse and heartbreak as a result.

The so-called "Reproductive Health Act" will expand our state's already radically permissive law, by empowering more health practitioners to provide abortion and removing all state restrictions on late-term procedures. With an abortion rate that is already double the national average, New York law is moving in the wrong direction.

We renew our pledge to offer the resources and services of our charitable agencies and health services to any woman experiencing an unplanned pregnancy, to support her in bearing her infant, raising her family or placing her child for adoption. There are life-affirming choices available, and we aim to make them more widely known and accessible.

Our Governor and legislative leaders hail this new abortion law as progress. This is not progress. Progress will be achieved when our laws and our culture once again value and respect each unrepeatable gift of human life, from the first moment of creation to natural death. Would that not make us truly the most enlightened and progressive state in the nation?







OMUNIDAD HISPANA



Este domingo entre la primera lectura y el evangelio hay una distancia enorme. La primera lectura relata un momento de la historia de Israel en que el pueblo, una vez vuelto del destierro, escucha de nuevo la proclamación de la ley. Es la ley de Dios. Son las normas que Dios dio a sus padres en el pasado y que deben ser obedecidas en todo momento. A cambio el pueblo tendrá la vida. Si el pueblo fue vencido por sus enemigos y tuvo que ir al destierro, fue precisamente porque no obedeció esas normas como debía.

En el Evangelio nos encontramos con una situación muy distinta. Jesús ha vuelto a su ciudad natal después de un tiempo

fuera. Ya ha comenzado su vida pública y a sus conciudadanos ha llegado su fama. Se siente enviado por Dios para predicar el Reino de Dios. ¿Estamos ante una nueva proclamación de la ley? ¿Va a dar Jesús unas normas nuevas en oposición a las que desde antiguo había recibido el pueblo? Posiblemente sus conciudadanos se hacían también estas preguntas. Por eso, cuando entra en la sinagoga, le invitan a hacer una lectura de los profetas y a que les hable.

Sorprendentemente, Jesús escoge un texto que no habla de normas ni de leyes. Habla más bien de él mismo y de su misión. Jesús se sirve de un texto del profeta Isaías para explicar a sus conciudadanos, y de paso también a nosotros, cuál es el contenido de su misión, por qué está predicando por los pueblos y los caminos de Galilea.
