



February 11, 2019 Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you..." (Jeremiah 1:5)

At the very heart of our beliefs about who we are and why we exist, is a message of love. God creates us out of love. Out of love, He redeems us by the sacrifice of his Son, Jesus. He calls us to an eternal destiny with Him because He loves each sacred human life, created in His image.

That we are created in God's image is reaffirmed in our nation's Declaration of Independence, reminding us that we "are endowed by [our] Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are **Life**, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." The **right to life** is the foundation and starting point for every other God-given human right. When that right is attacked or denied, all other rights and liberties begin to crumble.

You are probably aware that on January 22, 2019, the 46th anniversary of *Roe v. Wade* (the Supreme Court decision that declared an absolute constitutional right to abortion), Governor Andrew Cuomo of New York signed into law the "Reproductive Health Act", which he himself called "the most aggressive" abortion law in the country. It was then "celebrated" by his lighting up One World Trade Center and the Alfred E. Smith Building in Albany.

It is our obligation as citizens and as Catholics, to be well informed and to make our voices heard in the public square when evil and injustice threaten the sacred gift of life at any stage.

On a human level, this gruesome law should be appalling to people of every faith, or no faith. The Reproductive Health Act allows for abortion on demand with no restrictions throughout all of pregnancy. This means that as a choice, an abortion could be performed on a full-term infant as the mother is going into labor.

This law might also open the door to taking away conscience protections from medical personnel, and could be used to force doctors, nurses and other medical staff to perform or to assist in abortions. Governor Cuomo claims that he is protecting women's rights, when in fact, this law endangers the lives of women by allowing non-physicians to perform abortions, and it removes any objective standard of care due to the patient.

The Act has also removed criminal penalties when an unborn child is deliberately targeted for death in a crime. Two and a half weeks after the bill became law, the Queens District Attorney said he could not prosecute a man for the stabbing death of his unborn child in the womb of his girlfriend, because of the passage of the Reproductive Health Act.

Unimaginably, the law also repeals protections for infants who are accidentally born alive during the course of a failed abortion. This amounts to infanticide, the killing either by direct

means or by neglect of an infant who is alive outside the womb. The law is silent on reducing the pain and suffering of infants, especially those being aborted late term.

Brothers and sisters, this law is an abomination that cries out to Heaven for justice. We cannot be silent in the face of such a blatant attack on the most vulnerable among us. I invite you to do several things:

- 1. **Stay informed and educated** regarding these issues and the battles ahead of us, such as assisted suicide and legalized surrogacy. Two outstanding resources available to you are:

- 2. **Get involved**. Both web pages listed above offer easy links to contacting your elected representatives. Let the Governor and our other elected officials know that this Act violates the dignity of the human person and that you do not support it.
 - Get involved in the efforts already underway at your parish, such as Respect Life Committees. In addition, our Diocesan Respect Life Office can direct you to ways that you can support and promote the sanctity of life locally, on Long Island.
- 3. **Pray**. Pray the Holy Rosary. Ask the intercession of Our Blessed Mother Mary, Protector of Mothers, Defender of Life and the Family, to strengthen us so that we may be compassionate, courageous witnesses to the truth. Ask also for the intercession of Saint Thomas More, patron of statesmen, politicians, lawyers and judges, who lost his life for refusing to renounce his conscience and give in to the tides of political power and privilege.

Pray for our elected officials and for all people and pray that our politicians come to understand their profound obligation to defend the most defenseless among us. Any Catholic who actively supports an attack on the sacredness of life, chooses to place him or herself in grave moral danger and outside of the Communion of the Church. We pray for their souls, for a spirit of repentance, for a return to the truth of the love of God. It is God's love that formed each one of us in our Mother's womb.

A civilization that not only will not protect, but actually celebrates an attack on its most vulnerable members is morally bankrupt and stands on the verge of collapse. We pray for the courage of the martyrs, that an awakened spirit of evangelization and voices raised together will move hearts and minds, and call us back to our God-given senses, to the God who made us, who loves us, and who offers us our eternal destiny in love.

Our Lady of Lourdes, pray for us!

Description

Bishop Michael Burbidge of the Arlington, VA diocese has strongly rebuked pro-infanticide comments made earlier this week by Virginia Democratic Governor Ralph Northam. Bishop Burbidge called Northam's comments a "staggering admission" that reveals just "how far abortion advocates are willing to go in taking the life of a precious child."

Diocese of Arlington, January 31, 2019

Since the beginning of the Virginia General Assembly session on January 9, we have witnessed the introduction of extreme abortion legislation culminating in an attempt to pass a law similar to what New York recently passed. This bill rightfully failed—but I am, along with so many people of good will, distraught that this bill was introduced in the first place. It could have paved the way for babies to suffer a violent and gruesome death moments before birth and could have been harmful to women.

My hope is that this bill failed because the elected officials of the state legislature recognized that it was an evil and impermissible offense to human life and our collective decency. Abortion of a baby in the final stage of pregnancy borders on infanticide. Our governor, however, may be willing to cross that border and go even farther. In a staggering admission, Governor Northam stated that after an infant is delivered, the mother and the family should keep the baby comfortable, resuscitate the child "if that's what the mother and the family desired," and "a discussion would ensue." This attitude—and the bill that was defeated this week—reflects a new level of deep-rooted animus against the inherent goodness of every child. The governor's statement and this bill demonstrate how far abortion advocates are willing to go in taking the life of a precious child.

This is a critical moment in the life of our Church and our society. I call on the faithful and people of good will to advocate for the right to life of all people, including the unborn and those children whose lives are at risk even during the process of birth. In Virginia, with the assistance of the Virginia Catholic Conference, we must make our views known to our elected officials on all issues where the right to life is at stake.

Through the Diocese of Arlington, we continue to offer assistance to expectant families in need and those who are suffering after an abortion. Families who need help should contact the diocesan Office of Marriage, Family and Respect Life: arlingtondiocese.org

Sunday the Lord's Day:


Schedule chores. It's not very restful to stand in line at the grocery store or change the oil in your car. Try to

accomplish chores and errands another day so you can spend time relaxing on Sunday.

> Alternate entertainment. Instead of turning on the TV or zoning on the smartphone, take a nice long drive, curl up with a good book, or visit friends or family. Do whatever it takes to recharge your spirit.

Create a unique prayer habit. Offer prayers that you only say on Sundays. Read Scripture. Listen to sacred music. Take time to thank God for your blessings.

Protect the day. Make Sunday a priority. Don't let anything interfere with your rest, peace, or worship. Let the Holy Spirit guide



Why do Catholics believe the pope is infallible?

As visible head of the Church on earth, the pope has the gift of infallibility. This means that by gift of the Holy Spirit, the pope can't err in teaching the faith.

That's not to say that a pope is a perfect person. This gift of the Holy Spirit helps the pope, and the bishops with him, guide the Church in staying faithful to Christ. The pope is only infallible when he solemnly declares a teaching on faith and morals as St. Peter's successor (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #890-891).

"Please forgive me!"

Throughout history, there has been only one person who never made mistakes. The rest of us make plenty but few of us are comfortable with asking for forgiveness for them. Yet owning up to our mistakes is a big step toward preventing their recurrence. Try this:

Start by looking at the other person when you apologize. This communicates that you know you have caused harm and are ready to accept the consequences of your behavior.

Name the actions for which you are sorry. Be specific.

Assure the other person that the actions won't happen again and detail the steps you will take to rectify any harm you caused. Remember – true contrition involves making amends for your sin.

Give some visible sign that you are sincerely sorry. Shake hands or give a touch on the shoulder. Such an action will help start the healing of your relationship.

Taking steps to achieve sincere contrition and forgiveness will help you grow in holiness as you work to eliminate an occasion of sin.



Luke 6:27-38; Being merciful as God is merciful

In this Gospel passage, Jesus tells us to "love your enemies...lend and expect nothing back...and forgive." All of these go against our human ideas of fairness. In the Old Testament, the "eye for an eye" rule was meant to make sure the punishment wasn't excessive. Likewise, the idea of getting favors was meant to show gratitude for a favor already given.

The problem is that "an eye for an eye" can result in a vicious cycle of violence and destroyed relationships. The "favor for favor" idea reduces the value of giving gifts out of kindness and

appreciation to simply owing favors. How would you know if the good someone did you was because he or she loved you or because they wanted something from you? Jesus "updates" the old understanding of justice to God's justice, which is infinitely wiser and more perfect. God doesn't dole out his love to the most deserving, but freely to everyone. His goodness includes mercy as well as justice. His love is generous, selfless, simple, and compassionate. The surest sign of being God's children is if we

Feb. 11 – Our Lady of Lourdes (1858). A heavenly "lady" appeared to St. Bernadette Soubirous, a poor and sickly girl from a small village in France. Soon after the first vision, a spring with miraculous, healing waters emerged from a nearby cave. The "lady" revealed herself as the "Immaculate Conception" – the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Feb. 22 – St. Peter's Chair (1st century). We celebrate the establishment of the Holy See and pray for the preservation of God's Church. The "Chair of Peter" refers to the relic of an actual chair of St. Peter and to the

spiritual authority of the Church, symbolized by the chair.

Gaza.

Feb. 26 - St. Porphyry (420). Born to a wealthy Greek family in Macedonia, St. Porphyry lived as a hermit. His quiet life was interrupted when he inherited a fortune, which he quickly gave to the poor. He worked as a shoemaker before becoming a priest, then the Bishop of Gaza (against his will). Despite initial resistance, St. Porphyry successfully evangelized

Q & A

What is the difference between a basilica, a cathedral, and a shrine?

Different church buildings serve different purposes. Basilicas are traditionally large, rectangular churches that have a historical and spiritual

importance, such as St.
Peter's Basilica in Rome.
The ancient Romans
originally used them to
house kings or judges.
Later, Christians used
the style for places to

worship God, the King of Kings.

The pope can raise important church buildings of historical and spiritual significance, for example a cathedral, to the status of "minor basilica." When you visit, you'll know you're in a minor basilica if the conopaeum (a red-and-yellow umbrella), a special bell, and the Vatican seal (papal crown and crossed keys) are on display.

A cathedral is the chief church in a diocese and is where the bishop presides. The name "cathedral" comes from the word cathedra, which is Latin for "the chair." This refers to the bishop's chair, which represents his authority. A shrine is a sacred place where a saint's relic is preserved, an apparition took place, or a place to encourage a specific belief or devotion.

A veces conviene exagerar para que se entienda bien lo que se quiere decir. Así hace la primera lectura. Plantea dos formas de vida muy opuestas. Son tan opuestas las dos que en realidad no se dan en la vida real. Es de dudar que existen los que confian sólo y exclusivamente en sí mismos. Y también es de dudar que nosotros seamos de los que confiamos única y exclusivamente en Dios. Pero la oposición nos sírve para comprender por donde deberíamos orientar nuestra vida. Porque con cada uno de los extremos se relacionan en la lectura unas ideas. Los que "confían en el hom-

bre" se parecen a un "desierto", que es lugar de muerte, estéril y vacío de Dios. Los que "confían en el Señor" son como árboles plantados en agua que siempre dan fruto. Es como si vivieran en un oasis, lugar de vida en medio de la muerte que es el desierto.

Algo parecido nos plantea Jesús en el evangelio de Lucas. En esta versión de las bienaventuranzas, diferente de la de Mateo, las bendiciones se presentan en paralelo con unas maldiciones. Las maldiciones recogen prácticamente las mismas ideas que hemos comentado de la primera lectura. Los que confían en sí mismos, en el hombre, no tienen mucho futuro. Parece que están condenados al sufrimiento y a la muerte. Confían en sí mismos porque son ricos, porque comen en abundancia, porque gozan y porque todos hablan bien de ellos. En el lado opuesto están los que son declarados "bienaventurados" o "felices" por Jesús.

Pero hay un hecho importante a resaltar en este lado de la oposición. Si en la primera lectura se declaraba "bendito" al que confiaba en el Señor, en el Evangelio se declara "bienaventurado" no al que confía en el Señor sino simplemente a los que en este mundo les ha tocado la peor parte. Jesús no dice "dichos los pobres que confían en Dios". Dice simplemente "Dichosos los pobres" y "los que tienen hambre" y "los que lloran". Sin más. No es necesario ningún título más para merecer ser declarados "bienaventurados" por Jesús y recibir la promesa de reino. Sólo la última de las bienaventuranzas se refiere a los discípulos de Jesús, a los que serán perseguidos por causa de su nombre. Esos también son "bienaventurados".

El amor y la misericordía de Dios son para todos los hombres y mujeres. Precisamente por eso se manifiesta, en primer lugar, a aquellos que no tienen nada, a los que les ha tocado la peor parte en este mundo. A ellos se dirige preferentemente el amor Dios. A ellos les tenemos que amar preferentemente los cristianos porque son los "bienaventurados" de Dios. Porque son nuestros hermanos pobres y abandonados. Nosotros confiamos en que en el reino nos encontraremos todos, ellos y nosotros, compartiendo la mesa de la "bienaventuranza".

¿Quiénes son, cerca de nosotros, los pobres, los que pasan hambre, los que lloran? ¿Qué hacemos en nuestra comunidad para que se sientan los amados y preferidos de Dios? ¿O preferimos mirar sólo por nuestro bien y confiar en nosotros mismos? ¿Qué podríamos hacer?


