SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINTY John 3:16-18

THE HOLY TRINITY—A COMMUNITY OF LOVE

The Holy Trinity is indeed a mystery. However, this does not mean that we should be intimidated or to think that the Trinity has nothing to do with our lives. The Holy Trinity, God who is Father, Son and Spirit all relate to one another as a community where there is no division. We see this love expressed in our readings today where God's love and mercy is for us, despite our own sinfulness. The God who heard the cries of his people in Egypt, witnessed their affliction and came down to save them (Ex 3:7-10) now sends his Son, the Word- made- flesh (Jn 1:14) so that "the world", that is everyone who believes in him, will not be condemned but may be saved. Each of us is invited into this life of love where we are to live in union and communion with God and one another.

We are also called to be living examples of the Holy Trinity in our relationships each day. We are **EXCITED TO INVITE ALL OF OUR** First Holy Communion children for a Blessing with Jesus Drive-by on **SUNDAY**, **JUNE 14 from 12:30pm-1:30pm**. This day is a special day because we as Church celebrate the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist.



Children may wear their communion dresses and suits. Please drive to the en-

trance in the back on West Nicholai Street by the train tracks. You will be directed to drive in between the two school buildings to receive the blessing from Fr. Jim who will be holding Jesus as the Blessed Sacrament in what is called a Monstrance. Then you may drive to the Blessed Mother Statue near the Human Service building. ONE person may get out of the car and take a picture of their child. That person MUST wear a mask and social distancing must be adhered to. We ask that if your windows are open, to wear a mask as well.

OPEN TIMES FOR THE CHURCH- A CORRECTION

The Church will continue to be open daily for private prayer Monday-Saturday from 12:00 noon to 5:00pm. My apologies for the earlier error in stating that it was open every day. Only one entrance will be open, which will be the door closest to the priest's garage, located on the north side of the church. At this time, we are able to allow Funerals and Baptisms for up to 10 people only. The priests have been celebrating each of our Mass intentions since March 20, 2020. I thank you for your patience and understanding during these unprecedented times.

As a means of continuing to support you and provide resources in your efforts to reach out to the youth of your community, the DRVC Office of Youth Ministry is excited to announce the launching of an online video series, Long Island Catholic Youth Live.

LI Catholic Youth Live will be a simple weekly, live-streamed video offered through our official Diocese of Rockville Centre Youth Ministry Facebook page, which can be found at <u>www.facebook.com/DRVCYouthMinistry/</u>, as well as a new YouTube Channel. The videos will feature myself and a guest, from our talented pool of Diocesan priests and youth ministers, as well as some guests from neighboring Dioceses with connections to our own. The videos will be about 5-7 minutes in length and will offer both prayer and an inspirational/catechetical presentation, in the form of a dialogue between the 2 hosts. Topics will include prayer, the virtues, and spiritual growth, as well seasonal topics and their application to our own lives. As long as we are in this time of social distancing and quarantine, sustaining faith and hopefulness in light of the circumstances will be a common theme. It is also our intention to make many of these videos bilingual.


All videos will be available to watch after the livestream concludes for those who cannot view them live. Though the series is presented specifically to teenagers, our intention is to offer something of substance and value for people of all ages. Families are encouraged to watch together, and youth ministries may elect to watch along live or at a separate time to generate their own follow up. We're all in this together, and so this series hopes to reflect that call to remain unified as a Church and with our communities throughout the current crisis.

Our hope in this endeavor is to provide some simple, faith-based content specifically for the youth of Long Island and their families. We are "going live" with the video as a means of creating the feel of an event each week, which many Catholic teens are currently missing in not having regular youth ministry gatherings and experiences at this time. Our Office and a simple venture like this could never take the place of consistent, localized parish ministry, but we hope it offers you a positive tool to enhance your outreach to the youth and their families, in the spirit of the New Evangelization.


