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

OUR NEW ADMINISTRATOR OF ST. IGNATIUS

(Our apologies for the light print in introducing Fr. Shibi Pappan. Here is a reprint of his welcome and biography)

Fr. Shibi Pappan (PRONOUNCED –POPP-IN), will arrive as the Administrator of St. Ignatius Loyola on Wednesday, August 26, 2020. Many of you have asked Fr. Jim what is an Administrator and how does that differ from a Pastor? An Administrator has all of the responsibilities of both temporal and pastoral needs of a parish without carrying the title of Pastor. An Administrator cannot make certain decisions without permission from the Bishop. An Administrator has the potential of becoming a Pastor. For



example, Msgr. Ed Tarrant first served St. Ignatius Loyola as an Administrator before being named Pastor.

Fr. Shibi is a priest of the Bethany Ashram Religious Order, formerly known as the Order of the Imitation of Christ. According to Church Cannon Law, Fr. Shibi cannot be named Pastor until there is an agreement between his Religious Order and the Diocese of Rockville Centre. This is what happens when any priest is assigned as the leader of any parish, no matter the religious order to which he belongs. Once the canonical agreement is reached, Fr. Shibbi will be named Pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola.

Fr. Shibi's Biography

Fr. Shibi Pappan arrived in the United State from India in November of 2014 and one month later was assigned to St. Patrick's Church in Smithtown to serve as Associate Pastor. He is a member of the Bethany Ashram religious order (formerly known as the Order of the Imitation of Christ). Fr. Shibi grew up in Kerala, India as the youngest of three children. His mother, T.C. Saramma, was a homemaker. She died in 1997. His father, G. Pappan, was a government worker. His sister Sheeja and brother Shibu are both married and both have two children.

As a child, Fr. Shibi says he was fascinated by the work of the priests. He says the priests from the Order of the Imitation of Christ were exemplary models for him which inspired him to join them. The Order of the Imitation of Christ (OIC) is indigenous of India. It was founded by Servant of God Archbishop Mar Ivanios, OIC.

Fr. Shibi has a Masters Degree in Sociology and Psychology as well as a BED (Bachelor of Education). He also holds a Bachelors Degree in Philosophy and Theology from JDV Seminary in Pune, India. In 2018, Fr. Shibi graduated from St. John's University, NY with a Masters Degree in Education.

Ordained on November 21, 2005, Fr. Shibi's first several years as a priest has been very busy and productive. He simultaneously served as a parish priest and as principal and boarding master of a senior secondary school. During his tenure, he constructed one church and renovated another. After his four and half years as Associate Pastor at St. Patrick's, Fr. Shibi's plans called for him to return to Kerala, India to assist the victims of the horrific and historic flooding in the region last summer.

However the Diocese of Rockville Centre and Fr. Shibi's religious order decided to keep him in the United States and appointed him at St. Joseph's Church, Garden City. Msgr. Bennett also came from St. Joseph's Garden City to St. Ignatius Loyola. Traditions and connections continue, all in the good Lord's time. Please welcome Fr. Shibi with the same St. Ignatius enthusiasm as you have welcomed Fr. Jim.

One Minute Meditations

St. Benedict of Nursia

Born to a wealthy Italian family, St. Benedict was educated in Rome during the barbarian invasions a time of division, chaos, and failing morals. Dismayed at the rampant immorality of his peers, he fled Rome and lived as a hermit in the mountains. Attracted by his holiness, many people sought him out. St. Benedict went on to found twelve monasteries in Subiaco and the famous Monte Cassino, which became a center of holiness, learning, and culture.

Share your faith

In this time of uncertainty, followers of Jesus know that worry is unnecessary. We know God wants us to experience his peace and share it with others. Try these tips to help others lean on God:

Go deep into God's love. It is ours today, tomorrow, and forever. "... Good indeed is the Lord, His mercy endures forever, his faithfulness lasts through every generation" (Psalm 100:5). Experiencing

Sacraments, reading Scripture, and spending time in prayer are keys to growing in God's love and sharing it.

Share your confidence in God's care. Jesus promised that God will give us all we need, "Therefore I tell you, do

not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on ... your heavenly Father knows that you need them all" (Matthew 6:25, 32). Stress stems from

the absence of certainty and control over our future.

When we put ourselves in God's care, we can feel peace.

Demonstrate trust in God. While we may not be completely free from worry, St. Paul wrote, "Have no anxiety at all, but in

everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).

Why Do Catholics Do That

Why do Catholics have bishops?

In the Catholic Church, a bishop is an ordained minister who holds the fullness of the Sacrament of Holy Orders. Bishops teach doctrine, govern Catholics in their jurisdictions, and represent the Church.

In addition to filling the need for leadership in a family as big as the Church, bishops link us to the Apostles. The Apostles chose

disciples to fill their office after them, and passed on to them the authority and faith they had received from Christ. This spiritual treasure was passed from bishop to bishop by consecration in an unbroken line up to today. This way, the faith would be available in every age to the rest of the Church.

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Where is the real Catholic Church?

The Catholic Church is not just a building or a group of people. Rather, the real Church is a family begun by Jesus, extending all over the world, stretching through time and space.

In Heaven live those members who completed their earthly lives as God intended. They watch over us when we ask.

Members in Purgatory did their best to follow Jesus but died without having made adequate penance for their venial sins. Our prayers help them get to Heaven.

And those of us who are members on Earth are still living within the family, trying to make it to Heaven.

All three groups make up the Church and we are all connected forever. So not only can we ask our friends on Earth to pray for us, we can appeal for prayers to those who are face-to-face with God.

The Church began with Christ but is populated by humans. Still, we are all called to live fully in Christ's image. That means the Church is anywhere we are.

Matthew 13:44-52, The kingdom is worth everything

Jesus used the parables in this Gospel passage to emphasize the life-changing value of the Kingdom. In the first

parable, a man discovers - seemingly by accident - a treasure buried in a field. He sells everything he has to purchase the field. In the second scenario, a merchant finds a valuable pearl after

diligent searching. He also sells everything he has to possess the pearl.

By these parables, Jesus taught that being part of God's Kingdom - accepting his love for us and loving others as he

loves - is the only thing that really feeds our souls. God's unconditional love is the only thing that is worthy of everything we have. If we accept his invitation (he won't force us), our lives may change as our hearts change.

> Finally, Jesus compared the separation between the evil and righteous to the sifting that happens when a large catch is brought ashore.

Similarly, when we put our whole life in service to our love for God, then the individual pieces fall into place around that love. Whatever is contrary to this love falls away.



July 3 - St. Thomas (1st Century). Known as "doubting Thomas" for requesting proof of the Resurrection, he made a beautiful profession of faith when he received proof, "My Lord and My God" (John 20:28). Tradition says that Thomas traveled to India and was martyred near Mylapore.

July 14 - St. Kateri Tekakwitha (1680). A smallpox epidemic in her Native American village left Kateri orphaned, disfigured, and half-blind. Introduced to Catholicism by missionaries, she was baptized at the age of 19 and moved to a Christian village where she lived in holiness.

July 22 - St. Mary Magdalene (1st century). Mary Magdalene, from whom Jesus expelled seven demons, helped to financially support Jesus' ministry (Luke 8:2) and stood by the cross of Jesus with his mother (John 19:25). She first informed the Apostles of Jesus' Resurrection.

July 24 - St. Charbel Makhlouf (d. 1898). A Maronite hermit, St. Charbel lived a life of solitude and holiness. He had a reputation as a wonder worker, even among his Muslim neighbors.



"There's a saint for that!"

Down the ages, Catholics have invoked the saints for their prayers, even for



everyday things. It was a way of offering everything to God, through the saints' prayers, even little things like losing your keys! Here

are some "holy helpers":

Airplane travelers, astronauts: St. Joseph of Cupertino miraculously levitated while at prayer.

Accountants, bankers: St. Matthew the Apostle was a dishonest tax collector until Christ called him to be an Apostle (Matthew 9:9).

Battle, soldiers, doctors, police: St. Michael the Archangel led the angels to victory against the Devil and his forces (Revelation 12:7-9).

Finding lost things: St. Anthony of Padua prayed and recovered his stolen prayer book.

Plagues, pestilence, sick people: St. Roch cared for victims of the plague in Italy.

Students, teachers, schools: St. Thomas Aguinas, once teased as "the Dumb Ox," was actually one of the most brilliant scholars in the Church.

As a reminder, we can always pray "straight to God" with our prayers. The saints, our companions, are only meant to guide us to God.

Después de todo lo que Dios ha hecho y sigue haciendo por mí, cabe ahora preguntarme: ¿Cómo respondo yo? ¿Qué semillas acojo yo en mi corazón? ¿Las que siembra Cristo o las que esparce el Maligno? ¿Me esfuerzo por vencer el mal con el bien? ¿O contribuyo al mal del mundo consintiendo el mal en mi mente, en mi corazón y en mi acción?

Para poder abstenernos del mal y obrar el bien lo primero que debemos hacer es examinar, identificar y distinguir entre lo que es bueno y lo que es malo: «Examinadlo todo y

quedaos con lo bueno». ¡Tarea tan difícil hoy en día, cuando tantos sumidos en un mar de relativismo «llaman al mal bien, y al bien mal»! La cizaña, para quien no tiene el ojo entrenado, se confunde fácilmente con el trigo, y así sucede con el mal: se presenta siempre con apariencia de bien, como algo que "es bueno para ti". Más detrás de la apetecible carnada, se encuentra siempre el anzuelo que lleva a la muerte.

Para no dejarnos engañar por quien es el padre de la mentira, es necesario habituarnos a examinar todo pensamiento que viene a nuestra mente y todo sentimiento que surge del corazón a la luz de las enseñanzas divinas.

No es un criterio llevado por las modas de pensamiento, por las propias opiniones, por las democracias, por los caprichos, por los sentimientos o sensaciones del momento lo que te ayudará a distinguir entre el bien y el mal. Sólo un criterio objetivo puede liberarnos del relativismo y del subjetivismo, del engaño en el que fácilmente podemos ser envueltos. Ese criterio objetivo lo encontramos en lo que Dios, profundo conocedor del corazón humano, nos enseña. Cuando el mal se te presente con apariencia de bien, aférrate a la enseñanza divina. Cristo mismo utiliza ese modo de discernimiento cuando se encuentra ante las tentaciones en el desierto.

Para saber discernir acertadamente es necesario adentrarte cada día en el conocimiento de la Escritura. De ese modo te irás nutriendo de los criterios divinos, para que discerniendo correctamente, puedas también con la gracia divina obrar correctamente.
