Dear St. Ignatius Family,

Thank you all for such a friendly welcome during my first weekend at Saint Ignatius. I was able to meet and greet many parishioners and share the word of God with them during the homily at all five Masses. I shared the joy of being a priest and requested your blessings and prayers as I begin my responsibilities of preaching, teaching, and administering the sacraments, especially the Eucharist. I introduced the ABC's of my ministry here. A stands for Attentive and Available. Attentive to the Word of God and available for His sacred duties. B stands for Believe and Belong. Believe in God and His promises and belong to this faith community. C stands for Carrying and Caring. Carrying my responsibilities faithfully and caring for the needs of His people.

As Catholics, one of our special benefits is the maternal care of the Blessed Mother in our faith journey. There are several Marian Feasts that we celebrate throughout the liturgical year. 

The Face of Poverty in a Time of Adversity

Newsday publishes a daily listing of Coronavirus cases in both Nassau and Suffolk counties. If you look at the numbers across Long Island, it should come as no surprise that the poorest areas have the highest number of cases. More often they are also communities with Latino and African American populations. It reveals in a striking way the disparity that exists from one community to another. The median household income in Nassau and Suffolk counties is higher than many other parts of the country, but again that does not negate the reality that poverty still exists in specific areas of the Island. In light of the recent Newsday expose of racial bias in the real estate industry, we must also acknowledge that forms of racism still exist. The passing of Georgia Congressman John Lewis, an icon in the struggle for racial justice, reminds us that the struggle goes on.

When we see others around us wearing masks that does not mask the fact that the poor are still among us and depend on the work of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Vincentians see the face of poverty first hand with or without a mask and take concrete steps to alleviate that poverty. Such a calling becomes more difficult when we must contend with effects of the pandemic and the restrictions and limitations it imposes. When government financial assistance begins to come to an end in coming months, more people will rely upon the local conferences for assistance not merely for food but for rent and mortgage payments, utility bills, medical expenses, etc.

As needs become more pressing, this may be an occasion to look for new members, even though the practical aspects of that are obvious. The media has brought to our attention the disparity of wealth distribution, especially for people of color. But this new reality can also stir the conscience of those who want to assist in some way, particularly younger people who have been so prominent in peaceful demonstrations. Any conference could benefit from new, young blood. And it is clear that walking with a placard is one thing; becoming an active member of a local conference is another. Perhaps this is an opportune time to present the challenge in the parish setting to anyone who wants to fulfill the command of Jesus to feed the hungry and shelter the homeless. The time is right.

Do Children Have First Amendment Rights in Public School? Part 1

Soon children in grades K-12 will return to school either in-person or remotely, and the misunderstanding about prayer in public schools will return also. Is it legal for your child to pray in public school?

Yes! The Supreme Court <u>never</u> outlawed student prayer in public schools. Multiple court decisions and Dept. of Education regulations confirm that students are free to pray alone or in groups, as long as such prayers are not disruptive and take place during non-instructional time.

During those times, students may also read their Bible or other scriptures, say grace before meals, study religious materials with fellow students and meet in after school religious based clubs.

So - why and how did this exercise of First Amendment Freedom of Religion become controversial? Before the 1960s there was little resistance to teaching religious principles, Bible readings, or prayer in school - in fact, it was the norm. The landmark case, Engel v. Vitale, brought before the Supreme Court in 1962, asserted that any state mandated prayer offended the Constitution's prohibition against an establishment of religion and violated "separation of church and state." The majority opinion resulted in an end to the practice of students voluntarily reciting a school-composed, non-denominational prayer such as: "Almighty God, we acknowledge our dependence upon Thee, and we beg Thy blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers and our country. Amen."

However, invoking the phrase "separation of church and state" to silence religious expression is to perpetuate the lie that this phrase is in the Constitution - <u>it is not!</u> In fact, it is derived from President Thomas Jefferson's letter in 1802 to the Danbury Baptist Association of Connecticut to reassure them that their religious freedoms were safe from government interference and protected by the First Amendment.

To clarify students' rights, in 1995, President Bill Clinton said, "The First Amendment does not require students to leave their religion at the schoolhouse door." ⁽He then instructed the Dept. of Education to write guidelines for religious expression in school.

On Jan.10, 2020, President Trump issued updated guidelines for religious expression in public schools and added a reporting mechanism for students experiencing denial of their religious expression.
