




CHRISTMAS MESSAGE



My dear St. Ignatius Family,

We are in the last week of Advent, and Christmas is around the corner. Today's Gospel scene is that of the Annunciation to our Blessed Mother. Over the years we have heard, and read, many reflections on this passage, but I would like you to reflect on some questions in the context of the present situation we are facing.

Whose message was it? It was a message from God. When we hear anything, be it good news or bad news we have to check the credibility of the source. Who delivered the message? It was Angel Gabriel who delivered the message. We know that whenever someone does something good to us, we think, he/ she is an angel. Yes, my dear brothers and sisters, let us become angels to others delivering happy news to others, and console others in their sadness, not agents that cause drifts. To whom was the message delivered? It was to a virgin Mary who remained sinless in her time. To have the desire to be in purity one needs to be in awe of the holiness of God. It needs constant connection with God. We too should always try to be pure in whatever way possible. In this stressful time, instead of depending on unhealthy harmful addictions for relief, find comfort in God. Where was the message given? In her home. Some are discouraged as church activities are not so lively as earlier, because of the pandemic. There are still so many ways we can be good stewards of Christ even from our homes. We have to use our various talents of time, wealth and health, for the greater glory of God. What type of message was delivered? It was of course the good news for the entire humanity, as it offered salvation. But for Mary, an unmarried woman, pregnancy out of wedlock, would mean adultery and would lead to death by stoning. But we can see how she trusted God. Nowadays, most of the times we are hearing lots of news regarding the counts of deaths, infected ones, warnings, precautions to be taken, alerts etc. Many are confused, depressed, lonely and scared in this situation. In spite of all that happened, let us not panic.



This Sunday the fourth purple candle is lit. It symbolizes **Peace**. It is also called the **Angel's Candle**. It reminds us of the message of the angels to the shepherds: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom His favor rests." (Lk.2:14). More than ever we need His peace now . His peace means not the absence of problems, but to be able to be still have calm in our hearts, amidst turmoil, and seeing His presence in our lives. In order to enjoy complete peace, we have to be free of any malice in our hearts. We have to forgive others from the heart. Though we may get irritated at the behavior of others and react, or maybe even over react, we should never hold any grudges in our hearts. Sometimes it may be extremely difficult, and may be almost near to impossible but forgive, for our loving God has forgiven our innumerable mistakes.

So as we light this candle of peace we pray:

Jesus the light of the world give us Your peace. The world as a whole, is going through a very tough time. Help us to keep our focus on You, even in the midst of our troubles. Let us be peace bearers to all, and forgive all. Help us Lord to persevere till the last moment of our lives. Amen.

The fifth white candle in the center is called the "Christ Candle". It means Jesus is the light of the world. It is white in color to represent the purity of Christ, the spotless Lamb. It is lit on the Christmas Eve or Christmas Day

As we continue our preparation for Christmas, I would like you to make a good confession, and prepare the room for Him in Your hearts. In addition to the regular confession on Saturday(3:30 PM to 4:30 PM), there will be confession on Monday, December 21st, from 5 PM to 8 PM. Confession will be in the old school building. I encourage you to create a nativity scene at your home. Please do not put everything in it on the 24th, but let us

Monday 21st. Display the manger. Make our hearts and homes ready to receive Jesus.

Tuesday 22nd Place shepherds outside. Wait for Jesus with the humility and simplicity of these poor shepherds.

Wednesday 23rd. Place Mary and Joseph. Let us completely rely on God'd providence and obey His Holy will .

Thursday 24th Place the Infant Jesus .

Receive Jesus in our hearts .Do everything to make Him happy and never do anything to make Him sad.

Before I conclude, I encourage you to read the short story "A Christmas Inspiration" by Canadian writer, Lucy Maud Montgomery. In this touching story, we can see how five young women staying in a boarding house make their grumpy landlady, Miss Allen happy. When they all received gifts, instead of remaining happy in their world, they noticed that Miss. Allen didn't receive a single gift. Though Miss. Allen never smiled, one young woman got an inspiration to give her a gift. All the others agreed. They gave a big surprise to Miss. Allen and made her so happy that she cried out of joy. It is in giving that we receive true joy. The smile on the face of the receiver is the real gift. Let us see Jesus in others, especially in the less fortunate when we celebrate Christmas. Above all, let nothing steal your attention from Christ. God bless you all.

Interesting facts on Nativity Scenes...know the reason for the season.





- The word Christmas came from "Cristes Maesse" meaning "Mass of Christ".
- The word Nativity comes from the Latin word "nativus" and it means "Born".
- . It was in 1224,St.Francis Assisi recreated the nativity scene. In that first display, the manger was also used as an altar for Christmas Mass.
- The most viewed Nativity scene may be the one displayed in St. Peter's Square at the Vatican.
- Nine figures depicting the Holy Family, the Magi and the shepherds were originally donated by St. Vincent Palotti, the founder of Palottines, for the nativity at Rome's church of Sant' Andrea della Valle in 1842. In 1982, the Society of the Catholic Apostolate gave the figures to St. John Paul II for use in the Piazza San Pietro.
- Astronomers say that you will likely be able to witness what is known to some as the Bethlehem star or Christmas star this year, when both Jupiter and Saturn will
- appear almost like one from earth's view on December 21st.

There is a Mexican legend behind the use of Poinsettias for Christmas. The story goes like this. A poor Mexican girl, who had no present to give the baby Jesus, made a small bouquet with a small handful of weeds from the roadside. Though she felt embarrassed, remembering the words of her cousin, Pedro "Pepita, I'm sure that even the smallest gift, given by someone who loves Him will make Jesus happy." She knelt down and put the bouquet at the bottom of the nativity scene. Suddenly, the bouquet became bright red flowers. All who saw it understood that it was a miracle. From that day, those flowers were known as the 'Flores de Noche Buena' or 'Flowers of the Holy Night'. The shape of the flower and leaves of Poinsettia are sometimes thought as the symbol of the Star of Bethlehem. The white colored




Christmas Novena

Christmas 2020

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

When he was elected as a Successor of St. Peter on March 13, 2013, our Holy Father chose the name *Francis*. It was a weighty decision with a prophetic message. Especially now, seven years later and with the publication of his latest encyclical *Fratelli Tutti* from the tomb of St. Francis of Assisi on October 3, 2020, the significance of the choice is clear: Pope Francis connects his papacy to St. Francis.

Through the ministry of our Holy Father, St. Francis of Assisi is close to the Church in these times. Therefore, as we draw near to Bethlehem at the end of this difficult year, I wish to recall two points Pope Francis highlights from the life of St. Francis. One will help us celebrate the Nativity of Our Lord; the other indicates a grace for which to pray during the holy season.

First, in his 2019 Apostolic Letter Admirabile Signum: On the Meaning and Importance of the Nativity Scene, Pope Francis emphasizes St. Francis of Assisi's foundational role in our celebration of Christmas. The Holy Father recalls the origins of the crèche and the first nativity scene inspired by the holy friar in 1223, by which the saint sought "to bring to life the memory of that babe born in Bethlehem." Importantly, the remembrance of Christ's birth that St. Francis desired to convey was brought alive in Greccio, a small village in Italy, not by statues but by people from the surrounding towns and countryside. Together with St. Francis, his friars, an ox and a donkey, they gathered at a cave to behold a manger full of hay over which the Eucharist was celebrated. That Christmas night, almost 800 years ago, Pope Francis reminds us, "the nativity scene was enacted and experienced by all who were present." That night, there was "no distance between the original event and those sharing in its mystery." (2) Encountering Christ, there was simply joy and hope.

This Christmas, in our world laden with the Crosses of COVID-19, political and economic turmoil, racism, financial hardship, and so many other societal ills and challenges – challenges that impact us on Long Island – let us remember this lesson from Greccio: Christmas is an event to be lived. It demands our participation. Like the women and men who embodied that first crèche, we must be present to Christ who is born for us. We must behold and receive Him.

Second, in *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis shows St. Francis as an icon of Christocentric-listening. With great humility and charity, the saint reverently listened to others. He was present to the various voices in his life – the voice of God, the voice of his neighbor, the voice of the poor, the voice of the sick, the voice of nature – and by truly hearing them, he was an instrument of peace, healing, and understanding. How different it can be for us! The Holy Father says well what we know: "Today's world is largely a deaf world...At times, the frantic pace of the modern world prevents us from listening attentively to what another person is saying." Aware of this fact, the Pope encourages us, in the midst of our hectic and polarized world, to be like St. Francis and "not lose our ability to listen." (48)

This Christmas, when we approach the crib, let us ask for the grace to be attentive listeners. Let us ask for the grace to be like St. Francis, so that we may hear the voice of God and the voice of our neighbor and respond with the radical charity he exhibited.¹

Like Pope Francis, may we be moved by the example of St. Francis, and may St. Francis of Assisi's love for the Mystery of the Nativity, his ecstatic mysticism, his love for the poor, and his spirit of universal fraternity animate our celebration of Christmas this year.

May God bless you and your families this Christmas.



Navidad 2020

Al Pueblo de Dios de la Diócesis de Rockville Centre:

Cuando fue elegido Sucesor de San Pedro el 13 de marzo del 2013, nuestro Santo Padre eligió el nombre de Francisco. Fue una decisión de peso con un mensaje profético. Especialmente ahora, siete años después y con la publicación de su última encíclica Fratelli Tutti desde la tumba de San Francisco de Asís el 3 de octubre del 2020, el significado de la elección es claro: el Papa Francisco conecta su papado con San Francisco.

A través del ministerio de nuestro Santo Padre, San Francisco de Asís está cerca de la Iglesia en estos tiempos. Por lo tanto, al acercarnos a Belén al final de este año difícil, deseo recordar dos puntos que el Papa Francisco destaca de la vida de San Francisco. Uno nos ayudará a celebrar el nacimiento de Nuestro Señor; el otro indica una gracia por la cual orar durante la temporada santa.

Primero, en su Carta Apostólica de 2019 Admirabile Signum: Sobre el significado y la importancia de la escena del nacimiento, el Papa Francisco hace énfasis en el papel fundamental de San Francisco de Asís en nuestra celebración de la Navidad. El Santo Padre recuerda los orígenes de la representación del nacimiento y la primera natividad inspirada por el santo fraile en 1223, con el que el santo buscaba "dar vida a la memoria del niño nacido en Belén". Es importante destacar que el recuerdo del nacimiento de Cristo que San Francisco deseaba transmitir cobró vida en Greccio, un pequeño pueblo en Italia, no por estatuas sino por personas del campo y los pueblos vecinos. Junto a San Francisco, sus frailes, un buey y un burro, se reunieron en una cueva para contemplar un pesebre lleno de heno sobre el que se celebró la Eucaristía. Esa noche de Navidad, hace casi 800 años, nos recuerda el Papa Francisco, "el nacimiento fue representado y experimentado por todos los que estaban allí presentes". Esa noche, "no había distancia entre el evento original y los que compartían su misterio". (2) Al encuentro con Cristo, hubo simplemente gozo y esperanza.

Esta Navidad, en nuestro mundo cargado con las Cruces del COVID-19, la agitación política y económica, el racismo, las dificultades financieras y tantos otros males y desafíos sociales, desafíos que nos impactan en Long Island, recordemos esta lección de Greccio: La Navidad es un acontecimiento para ser vivido. Exige nuestra participación. Como las mujeres y los hombres que encarnaron esa primera representación, debemos estar presentes para Cristo que nació por nosotros. Debemos contemplarlo y recibirlo.

En segundo lugar, en Fratelli Tutti, el Papa Francisco muestra a San Francisco como un ícono de la escucha Cristocéntrica. Con gran humildad y caridad, el santo escuchó con reverencia a los demás. Estuvo presente en las diversas voces de su vida - la voz de Dios, la voz del prójimo, la voz de los pobres, la voz de los enfermos, la voz de la naturaleza - y al escucharlas verdaderamente, fue un instrumento de paz, sanación y entendimiento. ¡Qué tan diferente puede ser para nosotros! El Santo Padre bien dice lo que sabemos: "El mundo de hoy es en gran parte un mundo sordo ... A veces, el ritmo frenético del mundo moderno nos impide escuchar atentamente lo que dice otra persona". Consciente de este hecho, el Papa nos anima, en medio de nuestro mundo agitado y polarizado, a ser como San Francisco y "no perder la capacidad de escuchar". (48)

Esta Navidad, cuando nos acerquemos al pesebre, pidamos la gracia de ser oyentes atentos. Pidamos la gracia de ser como San Francisco, para que podamos escuchar la voz de Dios y la voz del prójimo y responder con la caridad radical que él mostró. 1

Como el Papa Francisco, que seamos conmovidos por el ejemplo de San Francisco, y que el amor de San Francisco de Asís por el Misterio de la Natividad, su misticismo extático, su amor por los pobres y su espíritu de fraternidad universal animen nuestra celebración de Navidad este año.

Que Dios los bendiga a ustedes y a sus familias en esta Navidad.


