Clergy Corner

My dear faith family of St. Ignatius,

Lately, we feel like we are living through our own "desert experience" as the coronavirus pandemic is spreading in our country. It is sowing a terrible distress, terrorizing cities and suburbs; it is spreading all over the world like a wild fire. It does not discriminate among rich or poor, black or white, young or old, religious or secular, and sinner or saint. This pestilence can be looked at as a metaphor for sin and as an opportunity for grace.

When we sin, we think it affects only us. In fact, it creates a rupture in our relationships with our God, family, community and the world. Since we are profoundly interconnected, inextricably dependent on each other, and more importantly, we are the members of the mystical body of Christ, our sins also affect everybody in some form or another. It has a ripple effect like a pebble thrown into a pond. It has an impact on others, like this virus that is spreading from one person to another; it has an impact on the world. Therefore, we have to take responsibility for how we behave during this pandemic. The other side of this phenomenon is that this also creates an opportunity for us to be more compassionate, more caring, more forgiving and loving. The good we do, the good example we set before others, have a ripple effect; and its impact lasts for ever. Just read the newspapers or watch the digital or other media. They are filled with the stories about Good Samaritans and heroes in our midst who are at the forefront of the service professions, whether it is medical, security, clergy, or other service providers, including our own family caregivers like parents or children.

As we are going through this pandemic, know the hands of God who delivered the Israelites from the slavery of the Egyptians and the terror of pestilence are supporting us. Yes, we may be walking through the desert, but the Lord will provide for us the manna and the water we need. Our strength is the faith that the Lord walks with us as he had with the Israelites as "a pillar of cloud to guide their way and by night as a pillar of fire" (Exodus 13: 21). It is with this firm conviction of the presence of the Lord journeying with us, as he did with the disciples on the turbulent boat, that we enter the New Year. May the words of our Lord to His disciples "why are you terrified?" (Mark. 4:40) comfort us. The Lord is with us. He is with us through His incarnation, which we have celebrated this week. He is with us in the Holy Eucharist, in the tabernacle, in the sacraments, and in the Word of God. He works miraculously through the first responders, medical professionals, scientists, clergy, Good Samaritans and others. He works with us through His amazing grace and infinite providence. We need to have eyes of faith to see it and a spiritual heart to experience it .Jesus is our Eternal Physician. He works mysteriously through our fellow human beings. By the grace of God, now we have vaccines and other medications to fight this pandemic. Let us make use of it; let us protect our loved ones and ourselves. Remember, when we suffer, Christ suffers with us-the mystical body of Christ suffers with us. When we are compassionate and become an instrument of God's love and grace, the mystical body of Christ heals and become whole.

This pandemic also challenges us to reflect on our priorities in life, our relationship with God, family and others. It reminds us of our own fragility and impermanence on this earth; it also invites us to look at fellow human beings and the world with the eyes of God—with compassion and love. It reminds us that we all belong to the family of God. Yes, we belong to the mystical body of Christ; we are brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ!

As we are ringing in the New Year 2021, let us entrust ourselves in the infinite providence of God as the Israelites did, as the apostles and saints did. May the New Year bring us God's abundant grace and a new spring of spiritual renewal.

We wish everyone a healthy, prosperous, and Blessed New Year!

Mi querida familia de fe de la Iglesia de San Ignacio,

Últimamente, sentimos que estamos viviendo nuestra propia "experiencia en el desierto" a medida que la pandemia de coronavirus se está extendiendo en nuestro país. Está sembrando unaangustia terrible, aterrorizando ciudades y suburbios; se está extendiendo por todo el mundo como un incendio forestal. Interesting facts on New Year.

- January 1st is the octave of the Nativity (formerly called the Circumcision of our Lord) and the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. She is our mother as well. So it is quite apt to begin the year seeking her maternal protection. So let us start the New Year with the Lord and celebrate New Year like a Catholic.
- December 31st, the last day of the year is called "Sylvester" in Europe. This word derived from the feast of St. Sylvester, Pope celebrated on that day.
- In many places, a holy hour is kept on New Year Eve or on the New Year day, thanking God for last year and seeking blessings for the New Year.
- The first New Year celebration on January 1 started 4000 years ago.
- The Emperor of Rome ,Julius Caesar, named the first month January after the Roman God Janus, who had two faces one looking forward and another looking back.
- The Gregorian Calendar which is used in most parts of the world was introduced by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582.
- The most popular tradition in the United States is that of dropping the New Years Eve ball in Time Square,New York ,so that the ball hits the ground at the stroke of midnight.
- In Korea, at the time of your birth, you are one year old, because they consider the time spent in the womb before being born as an year. On January 1st, Korean age of all will change. That means a baby born on December.31st 2020 will be two years on January1st.2021.

We are familiar with the word resolution, especially in the context of a New Year. I strongly recommend you to add reading the Bible as one of your resolutions. Bible is God's words. In this world full of noises, let us tune to His words on a daily basis. In my priestly ministry, many have expressed their desire to read the entire Bible every year. I am sharing my personal Bible reading plan, in the hope that this will be helpful for at least some of you. However, I understand, for some it won't be possible to read the whole thing. They can try reading the New Testament and Psalms, and when time permits, Acts of the Apostles and other letters from the New Testament. Consider this Scripture Reading Plan as a guideline. 





We are not simply swept up in the good will God has toward all his creations. He loves each of us as individuals and that love is never-ending and unconditional. "Can



Dec. 14 – St. John of the Cross (1591). As a Carmelite, St. John led a reform in the Order to encourage more prayer and simplicity. Briefly jailed over a misunderstanding, some of his best spiritual writing came from this experience.

Dec. 21 – St. Peter Canisius (1597). Born in Holland, he was ordained into the Society of Jesus and vigorously safeguarded the Catholic faith through writings and teaching. His work, The Catechism of the Catholic Church, is still used today.



Dec. 26 – St. Stephen (first century). A deacon of the early Church, St. Stephen preached that God can be found everywhere, not just in one place like the temple. He angered the Jewish authorities and became the first martyr of the Catholic Church.

Dec. 27 – The Holy Family (1st century). On the feast of the Holy Family, we celebrate the family life of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. By their love and support of one another the Holy Family is a model for all Christian families.



The Rosary is a simple prayer adapted from the complex prayers of medieval monks. It's a powerful prayer because in it, we ask Mary—whose prayers are never refused—to pray for us. In addition, the



mysteries of the Rosary introduce us to the lives of Jesus and Mary. Each mystery is associated with a fruit. For example, the fruit of the mystery of the Annunciation is humility. Praying the

Rosary opens us to the graces to be more Christ-like.

A prayer with roots in Scripture, the Rosary begins with the Apostles' Creed, which summarizes the great mysteries of the Catholic Faith. The Our Father that introduces each mystery is from the Gospels. The first part of the Hail Mary that follows is from the angel's words announcing Christ's birth and Elizabeth's greeting to Mary. St. Pius V officially added the second part of the Hail Mary.

The repetition in the Rosary is meant to lead one into restful and contemplative prayer related to each Mystery. The gentle repetition of the words helps us to enter into the silence of our hearts, where Christ's spirit dwells. The Rosary can be said privately or with a group.


