Clergy Corner

The word "prayer" comes from the Latin precārius, which means "obtained by begging, to entreat." Prayer is rooted in the belief that there is a power greater than oneself that can influence one's life. It is the act of raising hearts and minds to God or a higher power. Prayer is giving our attention to God in a two-way spiritual relationship where we talk to God and also listen to Him. It is like a child's conversation with their father. It is



natural for a child to ask his father for the things they need, or to ask for advice or guidance. The God to whom we pray is the all-powerful Creator, so He is able to intervene in our lives. He is a loving Father, so He cares about our needs and concerns. And He is the all-knowing Lord of the universe, so trustworthy to say "yes" when it is best and "no" when what we request would cause more harm than good.

Do we get answers to our prayers? Or are we fed up with asking God about our needs? We read in the gospel of Luke two parables which speak about the need for persistent prayer. The first parable speaks about the persistent friend and the second parable speaks about the persistent widow. Through these parables Jesus is trying to teach His disciples about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary. There once was a woman who prayed constantly for her husband and three children. She was the only believer in her family, and she desperately wanted everyone else to embrace the faith. One child in particular gave her more heartache than all the rest. He was very smart, and he knew it. Over time, the woman found a new spiritual advisor who encouraged her to keep on praying. "Surely the son of so many tears will not perish," he told her. He then initiated a friendship with the woman's son. Unlike others who had tried to win him over, this man could compete with him intellectually. Eventually, because of the spiritual advisor's example and his arguments, the young man accepted the Lord and converted to Catholicism. Now, we could say that the wisdom and witness of the spiritual advisor are what finally made the difference, but we should never forget the prayers of his mother. Her persistence finally paid off! In case

you haven't figured it out yet, the persistent mother was St. Monica, the spiritual advisor was St. Ambrose, and the son was the great St. Augustine.

Monica's story tells us that intercessory prayer doesn't depend entirely on the level of our holiness, it depends on our humility and persistence as well. So let's look at two of Jesus' parables: the parable of the persistent friend and the parable of the persistent widow to see what we can learn about being steadfast in prayer (Luke 11:5-8; 18:1-8).

In the parable of the persistent friend, Jesus describes a man knocking on his neighbor's door late at night to ask for some bread. The man keeps pounding, despite his neighbor's protests. Eventually, the neighbor gets up and gives him what he wants—if not for friendship's sake, then in the hopes of getting back to sleep.

Jesus tells a similar story in the parable of the persistent widow. This time, it is a poor widow who is relentless in demanding justice from a corrupt judge. It's not hard to imagine this judge dreading the woman's arrival every morning. He knows what she's going to say, and he knows how he will respond. Eventually, he gives in, thinking, "I've got to get this woman off my back before she drives me crazy!"

We should be clear. Jesus is not saying that our heavenly Father is corrupt or that he is an inhospitable neighbor. The focus of these parables is on the ones making the requests. That's clear when Jesus follows the parable of the persistent neighbor with his famous "ask, seek, knock" saying. It's also clear when he ends the parable of the persistent widow by asking, "Will not God then secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night?" (Luke 18:7). In both parables, Jesus is telling us, "Be Feel free to wear your Father out with your petitions. Go ahead, and nag Him if you have to."

These parables emphasize that our heavenly Father is loving, kind, and merciful. He has the power to help us, and He will help us. Our God does not sleep. He is never disturbed when we approach Him. He welcomes our prayers. He willingly and abundantly gives us what we need. He is a good God!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

We're all familiar with the refrain to pray without ceasing. It starts with Moses, who keeps his hands raised with the staff of God while war waged against Israel. It carries over to the Apostles, and St. Paul gives Timothy the exhortation to "be persistent whether it is convenient or inconvenient." Jesus affirms in the parable of the persistent widow how important it is "to pray always without becoming weary." As Christians, we understand the importance of prayer, but to pray always and constantly? Especially in today's world filled with distractions, this seems like an impossible task. Even Moses grew weary! But persistence is the name of the game in prayer. When prayer becomes difficult and no longer flows, we, like Moses receiving support to keep his hands steady until the battle was won, can receive support from the Holy Spirit. We simply must push forward and ask for help because Christ assures us God will "secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Prayer does not only consist of mental or vocal pleas to God; rather, it includes praise and thanksgiving and petition, all of which can be offered through simply living. We can consecrate our daily actions and offer them up to God as a living prayer: dropping the kids off at school with a special blessing in Christ's name to conquer the day; biting our tongue and inviting the Holy Spirit into a situation when dealing with a difficult person; or sitting at the dinner table filled with thanksgiving for our food and family. Prayer then isn't something we simply do, it is something we *live*.

Choose an action that will serve as a trigger to encourage you to pray. Do you hear sirens as you're heading to work? Say a "Hail Mary" for those who may be in harm's way. Are you scrolling through social media and find a friend sharing their struggle? Offer a quick prayer for their need. Train yourself to pray – something as simple as, "Lord Jesus have mercy on (N.)" or "Lord look graciously upon their need" – and you'll find yourself praying without even thinking about it.





La palabra "oración" proviene del latín precārius, que significa "obtenida por mendicidad, suplicar". La oración tiene sus raíces en la creencia de que hay un poder superior a uno mismo que puede influir en la vida de uno. Es el acto de elevar corazones y mentes a Dios o a un poder superior. La oración es prestar nuestra atención a Dios en una relación espiritual bidireccional en la que hablamos con Dios y también lo escuchamos. Es como la conversación de un niño con su padre. Es natural que un niño



le pida a su padre las cosas que necesita, o que le pida consejo u orientación. El Dios a quien oramos es el Creador todopoderoso, por lo que Él puede intervenir en nuestras vidas. Él es un Padre amoroso, por lo que se preocupa por nuestras necesidades y preocupaciones. Y Él es el Señor omnisciente del universo, tan digno de confianza para decir "sí" cuando es mejor y "no" cuando lo que pedimos causaría más daño que bien.

¿Obtenemos respuestas a nuestras oraciones? ¿O estamos hartos de preguntarle a Dios sobre nuestras necesidades? Leemos en el evangelio de Lucas dos parábolas que hablan de la necesidad de la oración persistente. La primera parábola habla del amigo persistente y la segunda parabola habla de la viuda persistente. A través de estas parábolas, Jesús está tratando de enseñar a sus discípulos sobre la necesidad de orar siempre sin cansarse. Había una vez una mujer que oraba constantemente por su esposo y sus tres hijos. Era la única creyente en su familia y deseaba desesperadamente que todos los demás abrazaran la fe. Un niño en particular le dio más angustia que a todos los demás. Era muy inteligente, y lo sabía. Con el tiempo, la mujer encontró un nuevo consejero espiritual que la animó a seguir orando. "Ciertamente el hijo de tantas lágrimas no perecerá", le dijo. Luego inició una amistad con el hijo de la mujer. A diferencia de otros que habían tratado de ganárselo, este hombre podía competir con él intelectualmente. Finalmente, por el ejemplo del consejero espiritual y sus argumentos, el joven aceptó al Señor y se convirtió al catolicismo. Ahora bien, podríamos decir que la sabiduría y el testimonio del consejero spiritual son los que finalmente marcaron la diferencia, pero nunca debemos olvidar las oraciones de su madre. ¡Su persistencia finalmente valió la pena! En caso de que aún no te hayas dado cuenta, la madre persistente fue Santa Mónica, el consejero espiritual fue San Ambrosio y el hijo fue el gran San Agustín.

La historia de Mónica nos dice que la oración intercesora no depende enteramente del nivel de nuestra santidad, depende también de nuestra humildad y persistencia. Así que veamos dos de las parábolas de Jesús: la parábola del amigo persistente y la parábola de la viuda persistente para ver qué podemos aprender acerca de ser constantes en la oración (Lucas 11:5-8; 18:1-8). En la parábola del amigo persistente, Jesús describe a un hombre que llama a la puerta de su vecino a altas horas de la noche para pedir pan. El hombre sigue golpeando, a pesar de las protestas de su vecino. Eventualmente, el vecino se levanta y le da lo que quiere, si no por el bien de la amistad, entonces con la esperanza de volver a dormir.

Jesús cuenta una historia similar en la parábola de la viuda persistente. Esta vez, se trata de una viuda pobre que no cesa de exigir justicia a un juez corrupto. No es difícil imaginar a este juez temiendo la llegada de la mujer todas las mañanas. Él sabe lo que ella va a decir y sabe cómo responderá. Finalmente, se rinde y piensa: "¡Tengo que quitarme a esta mujer de encima antes de que me vuelva loco!".

Deberíamos ser claros. Jesús no está diciendo que nuestro Padre celestial sea corrupto o que sea un prójimo inhóspito. El enfoque de estas parábolas está en los que hacen las peticiones. Eso queda claro cuando Jesús sigue la parábola del prójimo persistente con su famoso dicho "pide, busca, llama". También queda claro cuando termina la parábola de la viuda persistente preguntando: "¿No asegurará Dios entonces los derechos de sus escogidos que claman a él día y noche?" (Lucas 18:7). En ambas parábolas, Jesús nos dice: "¡Sé persistente! Siéntete libre de agotar a tu Padre con tus peticiones. Adelante, y regañarlo si es necesario.


Estas parábolas enfatizan que nuestro Padre celestial es amoroso, bondadoso y misericordioso. Él tiene el poder de ayudarnos, y nos ayudará. Nuestro Dios no duerme. Él nunca se molesta cuando nos acercamos a él. Él acoge nuestras oraciones. Él voluntariamente y abundantemente nos da lo que necesitamos. ¡Él es un buen Dios!

Evangelio según San Lucas (Lc. 18, 1—8)



En aquel tiempo, Jesús decía a sus discípulos una parábola para enseñarles que es necesario orar siempre, sin desfallecer.

«Había un juez en una ciudad que ni temía a Dios ni le importaban los hombres. En aquella ciudad había una viuda que solía ir a decirle: "Hazme justicia frente a mi adversario".

Por algún tiempo se estuvo negando, pero después se dijo a sí mismo: "Aunque ni temo a Dios ni me importan los hombres, como esta viuda

me está molestando, le voy a hacer justicia, no sea que siga viniendo a cada momento a importunarme"». Y el Señor añadió: «Fijaos en lo que dice el juez injusto; pues Dios, ¿no hará justicia a sus elegidos que claman ante él día y noche?; ¿o les dará largas? Os digo que les hará justicia sin tardar. Pero, cuando venga el Hijo del hombre, ¿encontrará esta fe en la tierra?».

Palabra del Señor/ Gloria a ti Señor Jesús.

La perseverancia expresa una confianza que no se rinde ni se apaga. Como Jesús en Getsemaní-, tenemos que orar confiándolo todo al corazón del Padre, sin pretender que Dios se amolde a nuestras exigencias, modos o tiempos, esto provoca cansancio o desánimo, porque nos parece que nuestras plegarias no son escuchadas. Si, como Jesús, confiamos todo a la voluntad del Padre, el objeto de nuestra oración pasa a un segundo plano, y se manifiesta lo verdaderamente importante: nuestra relación él. Este es el efecto de la oración, transformar el deseo y modelarlo según la voluntad de Dios, aspirando sobre todo a la unión con él, que sale al encuentro de sus hijos lleno de amor misericordioso.
