

I remember the first time I moved: A suitcase or two fit in the back of my dad's lime-green Delta 88 as my parents dropped me off at college. Four years later, it took that plus a large black chest. The next move required a U-Haul; then came marriage, a family, and a moving van. I may not store my treasure in barns like the man in last week's readings, but at times it feels that way. It's natural to accumulate more "stuff" as we grow older. But in today's Gospel, Jesus reminds us that we won't take any of it with us when we make the move to our final destination. Rather than focus on our possessions, he encourages us to be vigilant, remain faithful, and live in service to others. In doing so, we will store up "an inexhaustible treasure in heaven that no thief can reach nor moth destroy. For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Few things throw me into a panic like unexpected company. I have taken to at least cleaning the kitchen counter and bathrooms before going on a trip so the house will look presentable should something befall me and others have to come in with food or aid! We truly do not know the day or the hour, and the Gospel today encourages us to apply a little of that spring cleaning to our souls. Each day presents a new opportunity to prepare for the day we meet Jesus. If we've been out of touch, we can get reacquainted through prayer. If we feel weighed down by things we've done or said, we can bring them to the Lord through the sacrament of reconciliation. We can witness to our belief in God's promise of eternal life by putting people above possessions and supporting one another as we seek to live as Jesus taught us.



use your time, talent, or treasure. Catholics are meant to make a difference.

Run, don't walk

If you think you don't sin and don't need the Sacrament of Reconciliation, run – don't walk – to the nearest confessional. "If we say, 'We are without sin,' we deceive ourselves" (1 John 1:8). Unconfessed sin, especially when it goes unnoticed, forms a barrier between us and God. Penance, absolution, and life amendment helps to break it down.

A Novena

Do you have a particular concern or an upcoming challenge? A novena – a prayer offered over nine consecutive days in preparation for a feast day or a special need – is a great way to ask for God's particular help.

Jesus, I trust in you!

We fully trust in someone when we have a firm belief in his or her reliability, truth, ability, and strength. Do you trust God? He really is "faithful and true" (Revelation 19:11). You can trust Him ...

When you are overwhelmed: Can you imagine being responsible for every soul in the world? One night, Pope St. John XXIII, feeling overwhelmed by the problems in the Church, prayed, "Lord, it's Your Church; You take care of it. I'm going to bed." That's the perfect model for us. Surrender concerns to God, trust Him to handle them, and relax.

With the future: St. Padre Pio said, "You say you are anxious about the

future, but don't you know that the Lord is with you always and that our

When we
understand the
infinite love of
God, we won't worry
about a thing.

With the past: It's never too late to receive God's mercy. Mother Teresa assures us: "Only open your heart to be loved by Him as you are. He will do the rest." Pope Francis has said that God is never tired of dispensing His mercy. We are the ones who tire of asking. Never tire of asking. Absolution is as close as your nearest Catholic church.

Why Do Catholics Do That

Why do Catholics bury loved ones' remains?

Everything the Church teaches about care for the dying, funeral rites, and burial is out of respect for the body. For Catholics, the body has the added dignity of participating in the Sacraments during life: "your body is a temple of

the Holy Spirit" (1 Corinthians 6:19). In the Creed, we profess belief in the resurrection of the body. Therefore, the Church permits cremation as long as the cremains are buried in sanctified ground. Scattering ashes is prohibited.

Discerning God's will

Do you have a big decision to make? It can be difficult to hear God's voice just when you need it most. Asking the right questions and looking for signs you are on track can help you make the right choice.

"Will it help me get to Heaven?" Answering this question first will weed out extraneous options quickly. Then, when deciding between two good choices, consider which one makes best use of your strengths, gifts, and your state in life.

Deep peace. In heartfelt prayer, you'll likely

experience a deep peace for one of your options. Only God gives this kind of peace (John 14:27). It's a good sign when that peace lasts throughout the decision process. Lack of peace is usually God saying, "no."

> Good fruits. These are easiest to see after you have taken steps toward your decision. If you see spiritual fruits like generosity, joy, patience, and self-control growing in your soul, you're on the right track. Anxiety, turmoil, anger, tension are signs that you made a misstep.

Luke 14:1, 7-14, Unreciprocated kindness

Jesus was under close and careful "networking" - entertaining people who can further our personal or

professional goals. There is usually an exchange of favors implied in this kind of a relationship, "you scratch my back and I'll scratch yours."

In this parable, however, Jesus urged us to forget about obtaining benefit or admiration and instead serve people in need. He said that doing favors

for and being kind to the disadvantaged can be very rewarding and will bring blessings to the host. The guests won't be able to reciprocate, but God will certainly repay the kindness.

August 2 – St. Peter Julian Eymard (1868). Born in France, Peter was ordained in 1834 and earned a reputation as a preacher. He was friends with St. John Vianney. He founded the Congregation of the Priests of the Blessed Sacrament to increase devotion to the Holy Eucharist.

August 9 – St. Edith Stein (1942). Born Jewish, she was a brilliant atheist intellectual in Germany. Edith converted to Catholicism after studying St. Teresa of Avila, and became a Carmelite nun. Although her order tried to shelter her

from the Nazis, she was arrested and executed at Auschwitz.

August 15 – Solemnity of the Assumption. Declared a dogma of faith in 1950 by Pope Pius XII, the Assumption celebrates Mary's being taken up into Heaven body and soul at the end of her life.

Aug. 24 - St. Bartholomew the Apostle (1st Century). Bartholomew is thought by some scholars to be the apostle, Nathanael (John 1:46). After Jesus's Ascension, Nathanael spread Christianity to India and Armenia, where he was martyred.



Q What does Mary's & Assumption mean

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII infallibly declared that, "having completed the course of her earthly life," the Blessed Virgin Mary was taken up, body and soul, into heavenly glory.



Although this doctrine was declared relatively recently, the Church's belief in it isn't new. Sacred Scripture and Tradition repeatedly emphasize Mary's

sinlessness and holiness (Luke 1:28), and her deep involvement in the mysteries of Christ's life. Given this, we believe Jesus preserved her body from decay and raised her to heavenly glory.

For us, the Assumption, is a "sneak preview" of what our ultimate destiny can be if we are faithful to Christ, as Mary was - having our glorified bodies, sinless and perfectly happy. What she is now, we hope someday to be. Moreover, the Assumption reveals the value of our bodies in God's plan. When God created us in His image, He created us body and soul and said it was "very good" (Genesis 1:31). It's so good, that He intends to raise us, bodily, into His glory.





Honoring the "Spirit of St Ignatius" though my encounters with some of his incredible works in the Church.

- 1) As a young Idente Missionary, my first mission out of my home country Spain was Bolivia. This was my first love! I arrived in Bolivia in 1986, the same year the famous movie "The Mission" was released. As many of you may know, this movie is an amazing synthesis of the about 150 years that the Jesuits had their missions in the Hispanic America. The Jesuits missions would represent the highest dream of the universality of our faith within the different cultures, and the pursue of a society based on the Gospel. Pope Francis has just been in Canada asking for forgiveness to the indigenous nations there because of the support of the Church to the Residential Schools of the Government, aimed in the cultural assimilation of the indigenous children to the western culture. This cultural colonization, with dramatic consequences that has been highlighted recently in Canada, was exactly the contrary of the evangelization of the Jesuits in Paraguay, Bolivia and other countries of America in the 18th Century. E.G. In the Guaranies Indian missions in Paraguay and Bolivia, the official language was "guarani", the political organization was their own, and the Jesuits were only dedicated to "inspire" - never "impose" - our faith and the European science and culture. Only four decades ago, ten thousands of baroque music partitures have been discovered in rural parishes of the Bolivian Amazon region, composed there, in the jungle, and one of the most important baroque festivals in the world is celebrated every two years in the restored churches of the jungle. The indigenous people there consider the Jesuits as an important part of their Indian roots. In 1767 the Jesuits were pushed out from the Spanish territories by the Spanish King Charles III, opposed to the mysticism of the Hispanic tradition in the early evangelization of America, this was the beginning of the Spanish decay, with dramatic consequences for America and Europe. A little later, other European countries would expel the Jesuits as well, based on the political and economical interests of their oligarchies, who also influenced in Rome, and the order was even suppressed from the Church by Pope Clement XIV in 1773. The order however did not disappear, and was restored by Pope Pius VII in 1815. St. Ignatius was playing a very strong role in the church from the very beginning. His spirit was facing the world of the 18th century with nothing less than the dream and the enterprise of the conquest of the whole world in global spiritual
- 2) In Ecuador I was the President of the Catholic University of Loja for 12 years, and we had there strong relationships with the Pontifical University of Ecuador, led by the Jesuits, and many other Jesuit universities in Latin America. There are more than 200 Jesuit universities around the world, most of them among the most prestigious in their context. In addition, there are more than 2.000 other Jesuit educational institutions in more than 90 countries and about 100 millions of alumni that passed through the spirit of St Ignatius. Here in USA, some of the leading universities of the country are Jesuits: Fordham, Scranton, Georgetown, Boston College... just quoting some of them near us. The order itself started at the University of Paris, and the Jesuit scholars were in the center of the theological debates at the Counter-Reformation and the Council of Trento, against the Lutheran Reformation. The vision of St. Ignatius was incredible, also in the intellectual arena. If we would have followed this spirit, in the church in general, we would not have the Marxism controlling today the University world and the current anthropology. The vow of obedience to the Pope of the Jesuits was also facing boldly the Lutheran spirit. With a very clear vision, our Bishop, John Barres, states: << The obedience of St Ignatius to Jesus Christ and to the Church was so fine-tuned mystically that the Jesuit charism includes a special fourth vow of obedience to the Pope, the Successor of Peter. We pray today for the holiness of Jesuits around the world and for their radical fidelity to the objective truths of Church teaching and a radical fidelity to that fourth vow of obedience to the Holy Father that all Jesuits commit themselves to and are bound by. >> And about the Jesuits Universities, our Bishop also states: << We pray for their fidelity to the Splendor of Truth expressed in Catholic anthropology, dogmatic, sacramental and moral theology.>> 3) When I was in India - the home land of Fr. Shibi - I was deeply impressed by the strength of the Catholic faith there, in spite of the dominion of the Hindu and Muslim religions. There are two sources of this strong spirit: the early evangelization of St Thomas the Apostle, with a strong tradition and deep fruits in the history of India, and the evangelization of the Jesuits in the 16th Century. St Francis Xavier, the great apostle of India, arrived in Goa in 1542 and evangelized with a great success the east and west southern coastal regions of India. In India, he addressed the lower castes, but later in Japan he changed the methodology influencing first the leaders of the Society. He was a missionary of fine sensitivity, and he perceived the best strategy according to the idiosyncrasy of the different cultures. He didn't have time to learn their complex languages, so he used interpreters in a very effective way. After his missionary work in Japan and Malacca Islands, he dreamed to evangelize China, in whose coasts he rendered

his life to the Lord. He was called the "divine impatient man" because of his apostolic zeal. My successor as a

Pastor of Our Lady of Loretto Church, in Hempstead, and also Idente Missionary Fr. Felipe Rufes, was five years living in China. I learned from him about the fine apostolic strategy of the Jesuits Matteo Ricci and Diego de Pantoja, trying to reach the upper classes, adjusting to the feudal structure of that society. Initially they were very well accepted at the Emperor's court, but later because the controversies generated by other missionaries not Jesuits who insisted in going to the poor very plainly, the Emperor casted all the missionaries out from China. This is a very hard lesson to learn from the history of the church. Still China is impenetrable to the Catholic faith. It could have been different.

4) Finally, we cannot skip that all these apostolic enterprises of the Jesuits come from a deep experience of penance of St Ignatius, in the sense of "Metanoia" (changing the mindset, what is the origin of the word "penance"). His conversion was so deep and radical that he - a military pursuing the human glory - became the conqueror of Christ himself as a saint, and many leaders who followed him and helped him to conquest the world "at the greater glory of God". His fine insight in the human soul through his own experience, wonderfully expressed in the spiritual masterpiece of the "Spiritual Exercises", has guided thousand of millions of Catholics for centuries. We are celebrating also this year the 400 anniversary of his beatification, joint with St. Francis Xavier, St. Teresa of Avila, St. Isidore the Farmer and St. Philip Neri. Most of them in the context of the so called Golden Age of the Spanish Mysticism, which had two main consequences - both related with St Ignatius: The evangelization of America, named by St. John Paul II "The continent of the hope of the Church", and the development of the Christendom in Europe through the Way of St. James (Camino de Santiago). There is a strong tradition supported by very old documents, such as the Magna Moralia of Gregory the Great, which was written at the end of the 6th century, referring that the Apostol Saint James, after the Ascension of the Lord, would have gone to evangelize the Roman lands of Hispania (current Spain). Afflicted by the hardness of heart of those people, he laid to rest with some followers on the banks of the Ebro River, in the current city of Zaragoza, where I was as a missionary for about 9 years. There the Blessed Virgin appeared to him, who was still in this world, to confirm him in his faith. According to that tradition, she appeared on a pillar, and ordered the construction of a Church there in her honor, in which she would remain in a special way "so that the virtue of God may work marvels and wonders through my intercession with those who in their needs implore my patronage". This would be the first apparition of the Blessed Virgin. The Apostle James would later return to Jerusalem, where he would be the first apostle to suffer martyrdom. His body would have been brought to the north of Spain and his burial place was lost for a time. The apostolic faith grew strongly in the lands of Spain, with "innumerable martyrs" in Zaragoza in the 4th Century. The later invasions of the barbarian peoples of the north, under the final rule of the Visigoths, would have the presence of great saints, mainly Saint Isidore of Seville, giving to the Visigoth Spain a deep mystical heart and Marian devotion. This mystical tradition would be consolidated with the resistance to the Muslim invasions. In 823 the news of the discovery of the tomb of the Apostle St. James in the North of Spain, in Compostela, spread quickly. A great pilgrimage begun from various places throughout Europe to the tomb of the Apostle, which was called the "Camino de Santiago" (The Way of Saint James), a pilgrimage that lasted almost eight centuries, with tens of millions of pilgrims who would forge Christendom in Europe along the way. Those same Christian roots that were recently eliminated in the Constitution of the European Community. And that fertile spirituality, nourished by the mysticism of the Way of St. James, would have forge the Spain of the 15th and 16th centuries, with the highest concentration of mystical saints and major founders in the entire history of the Church: St. Ignatius of Loyola, St. Francis Xavier, St. Therese of Jesus, St. John of the Cross, St. John of Avila, St. Beatriz of Silva, St. John of God and many more. It was the so-called Spanish "Golden Age", not because of the physical gold, but because of the richness of its contribution to the Church and to the world of culture. It is the time when Don Quixote was written as an incredible metaphor of the spiritual life and in which Queen Elizabeth, called "The Catholic", sponsored the enterprise of Christopher Columbus with the intention of expanding the faith all over the world. In only 50 years after the arrival of Columbus, there were already Universities in America, and the so-called "Law of Peoples" was established as the basis of modern international legislation, where indigenous people were given the same dignity as the Spaniards. A race and culture mixed world is created, a deeply Mystic and Marian world. This was the context of St Ignatius mysticism, comparable with the depth of St. John of the Cross or St. Teresa of Avila, who - by the way - may have been educated also in the spirit of the spiritual exercises. St Ignatius also deserve the title of Doctor of the Church, even more as his mysticism expresses very well the "contemplation in action" of Christ himself, and transmits the finest Christian anthropology: actively open to God and the neighbor. Lord, protect our Jesuit Pope and give him the strength of guiding the Church with the spirit of St Ignatius. St Ignatius, pray for us.
