



### Clergy Corner

### My dear faith family of St. Ignatius,

This Sunday's gospel passage (Mark 10:17-30) makes it plainly clear that there is more to Christianity than just keeping the commandments. That is what Jesus is trying to tell us through today's Gospel story.



Jesus reviewed with the rich man the commandments, which are the starting point of Christian life. The man said he had kept them all. Jesus admired him for this. But Jesus also made it clear to the rich man that Christianity is more than just a set of negative commandments—like not stealing or not cheating. Christianity is far more positive.

Jesus said to the rich man in effect: Granted, you've never hurt anyone, but what have you done to help anyone? Have you ever used your wealth to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, or shelter the homeless?

It was at this point that the rich man saw how sadly he was still lacking in perfection. Therefore, Jesus held out to him a challenge. The challenge Jesus held out to the rich man is something like this: How badly do you want eternal life? How badly do you want to follow me? Do you want these badly enough to sacrifice your possessions for them? The rich man was basically saying: Master, I want them—but not that badly.

And so the rich man rejected Jesus' invitation. The thought of using his wealth for anything other than himself and his family was too much for him—too great a sacrifice for him.

This brings us to ourselves today. We are like the rich man in today's gospel. We have kept the commandments too, but we haven't yet been able to reach out as generously as we could to the needy, the naked, and the hungry.

This raises some questions: What do we do if we find ourselves in the situation just described? Do we lower our head and walk away from Jesus, as the rich man did? What do we do?

The gospel suggests the answer to our question. Right after Jesus tells his disciples, "it is much harder for a rich person to enter the Kingdom of God than for a camel to go through the eye of a needle," they ask, "Who, then, can be saved?"

Jesus replies, "This is impossible for man but not for God." In other words, we can do nothing by ourselves, but with God at our side, we can do everything.

How do we enlist God's help? There is an old adage that says, "God helps those who help themselves." And there is another one that says, "If we walk toward God one step, he'll run toward us ten steps."

The answer to our question lies right here. The way to seek God's help is not merely to ask him for it in prayer. We should do this, of course; but we should also do something more. We should take the first step and follow the Lord.

Today's gospel is *not* an invitation to make a great journey all at once. It is merely an invitation to take the first step of that journey. If we take that first step by reaching out to someone in real need, God will come running toward us, take us by the hand, and walk at our side for the entire journey of our life.

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In the Old Testament, wealth was considered a sign of God's favor. So imagine the rich young man's surprise when he approached Jesus, only to find out that he would need to sell what he had and then give to the poor in order to follow Jesus. His face fell and he walked away. His demeanor highlights the fundamental error of equating what we have, and what we do, with salvation - of relying on earthly things, rather than God, for our deepest comfort and security. In contrast, the Book of Wisdom speaks of the richness and worth of divine wisdom over that of any precious gem or gold. We understand that divine wisdom to be manifested in the person of Jesus Christ. Therefore, true wisdom means having faith in Jesus rather than in our own efforts and whatever we might have earned in our lifetime. Otherwise, we are like a camel trying to squeeze through the eye of a needle. Jesus truly offers us the only way. I like to think that the young man came around eventually. After all, as Jesus says, "all things are possible for God." As we reflect, we can ask Jesus what we need to "let go of" to turn our sights, our minds, and our lives over to God, knowing that following his will is the surest path to the Kingdom.

### **GO EVANGELIZE**

### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Just a few days ago, we celebrated the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. The behavior of the rich young man in today's Gospel – daring, enthusiastic, confident – brings the young Francis to mind. Born into wealth, he relished his carefree lifestyle and sought to become a knight. His dreams of glory, however, quickly became a nightmare as his comrades fell and he was imprisoned in a dank cell for a year. After his release, he fell seriously ill, and God spoke to him. Francis cast aside the trappings of wealth, choosing instead to seek God's will in all things. His example invites us to pray about our priorities: What things or attitudes get in the way of our relationship with God and one another? What is the Lord asking of us and how can we respond? How can we give witness to our belief that all things are possible with God?

ACTION Perhaps try a "consumption fast" for the next couple of weeks, purchasing only what you need - food and other necessities.

Use time and energy you may have spent shopping to deepen your relationship with God and others by participating in Eucharistic adoration, going to confession, visiting an elderly relative, or contacting an old friend.

### "Lead us not into temptation ...'

No one is exempt from temptation. Being enticed by the attractions of this world is part of our human condition, but successfully fighting it makes us stronger and holier.

Watch for it.
Temptation
strikes when we are least able to fight it.
Identify what tempts you most and try to anticipate when you are weakest. Then devise a plan of action – not just a resolution – to help you resist

Pray through it. When Jesus caught His disciples sleeping in the garden instead of praying, He said, "Watch and pray that you may not undergo the test" (Matthew 26:41). Overcome

temptation by being alert to it and praying instead of indulging in it.

Run from it.

Sometimes fleeing temptation is the best way to resist it. "God is faithful, and He will not let you be tempted beyond your strength, but with the temptation will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it" (1 Corinthians 10:13). Avoid people, places or situations that give you trouble.

Don't start it. It is easier to resist temptation if you stop it when it starts. Then it won't have the force of habit. Though it is never too late to ask for God's help, the longer you live with the temptation, the harder it will be to turn to Him.



## Why do Catholics turn to Mary?

In Old Testament kingdoms, the queen mother played a significant role in her son's governance of His kingdom. Her power and authority flowed from her position as it related to her son.

His subjects often petitioned her to speak for them. As Queen Mother of Heaven, Mary's purpose is to further her Son's kingdom. When we turn to her, she acts with her authority to bring our concerns to her Son, and He is always inclined to fulfill her wishes.



### God's love never changes

It's only human to want to be loved.
Unfortunately, even the best friend or lover will
let us down once in a while. That can leave us
lonely or searching for the wrong kind of
love. Fortunately, God will never let us down.
His love is the right kind of love to have.

His love never changes. Standards set by humans change over time. Something considered "in" today, can be "out" in no time. God's love is unchanging and unending.

Friends come and go. Sooner or later, you have

to leave your friends or they leave you. But Jesus said, "... behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20). God never leaves.

He loves us for who we really are.

There's nothing God doesn't know about us, and He adores us anyway. If God likes you, others will, too. To please God we have to fill ourselves with love for Him and other people, and that makes us even nicer to be around. Pass it on.

### Mark 12:28-34 – The first Commandment

In fact, one of the scribes was so impressed by Jesus' response to a challenge by the Sadducees that he posed a question of his own. He sincerely wanted to learn from Jesus' answer.

The scribe asked which of the commandments was most important. Jesus said everything starts and ends with love – love of God and love of each other. To love God is to

love one another. They are as inseparable as the beams of the cross. While it is easy to love

God, loving others is more difficult.

But true love of neighbor is measured by how we treat those who are neither family nor friends. It means including people when the natural inclination is to exclude or avoid them. Jesus loved prostitutes, thieves, lepers, even His political

enemies. This is how God loves and He calls us to do no less.



In October we celebrate the Rosary especially on the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7th. The Rosary helps us to meditate on Jesus' birth, life, death, and resurrection.

October 6 – St. Bruno (1101). Bruno was born in Germany, studied in France and became a theology professor. With six other companions, Bruno founded the Carthusian Order in 1084 and helped reform the clergy in Rome.

October 14 – St. Callistus I (222). A Roman slave. Callistus obtained his freedom and was ordained a deacon by Pope Zephyrinius, whom he later succeeded. Callistus's election caused an eighteen-year schism, spawning the first anti-pope. In a time of trial and confusion, he reopened the Church to all. He was martyred in Rome.

October 20 – St. Paul of the Cross (1775). Paul was inspired by a vision to start a religious order dedicated to the Passion of Christ.

He founded the Passionists in 1720, lived a penitential life, worked miracles, and cared for the poor and sick.





# Why is a Catholic Funeral important?

Although no one enjoys dwelling on death, most of us will mourn and bury loved ones in our lifetimes. Friends may counsel us to skip the church funeral and just "get it over with," but our faith

provides the strength we need to deal with death.
The Church has created Rites to help us face the difficulties and reality of death.

Every baptized Catholic has a right to a Catholic funeral. The Rites of a Catholic Funeral include Prayers after Death, Prayers in the Presence of the Body, the Scripture Prayer Service at the Wake, the Funeral at Church (with or without Mass), and the Internment Prayer Service at the cemetery. Together these services not only make up the total Catholic Funeral Service, but also provide the Church's special prayers for the deceased. The Rites also support families and friends who are grieving for their loved one.

Catholics are entitled to a Catholic Funeral whether they are frequent or infrequent Mass attendees. (For specific questions, check with your local parish.)

### Mi querida familia de fe de San Ignacio,

El pasaje del evangelio de este domingo (Marcos 10: 17-30) deja claramente en claro que hay más en el cristianismo que simplemente mantener los mandamientos. Eso es lo que Jesús está tratando de decirnos a través de la historia del Evangelio de hoy.

Jesús repasó con el rico los mandamientos, que son el punto de partida de la vida cristiana. El hombre dijo que los había guardado todos. Jesús lo admiró por esto. Pero Jesús también le dejó en claro al hombre rico que el cristianismo es más que un conjunto de mandamientos negativos, como no robar ni hacer trampa. El cristianismo es mucho más positivo.

En efecto, Jesús le dijo al hombre rico: De acuerdo, nunca has lastimado a nadie, pero ¿qué has hecho para ayudar a alguien? ¿Alguna vez ha utilizado su riqueza para alimentar a los hambrientos, vestir a los desnudos o albergar a los desamparados?

Fue en este punto que el hombre rico vio con qué tristeza todavía le faltaba perfección. Por tanto, Jesús le lanzó un desafío. El desafío que Jesús le presentó al hombre rico es algo como esto: ¿Cuánto deseas la vida eterna? ¿Qué tanto quieres seguirme? ¿Los quieres lo suficiente como para sacrificar tus posesiones por ellos? El hombre rico básicamente estaba diciendo: Maestro, los quiero, pero no tanto.

Y entonces el rico rechazó la invitación de Jesús. La idea de usar su riqueza para cualquier otra cosa que no fuera para él y su familia era demasiado para él, un sacrificio demasiado grande para él.

Esto nos trae a nosotros mismos hoy. Somos como el hombre rico del evangelio de hoy. También hemos guardado los mandamientos, pero todavía no hemos podido tender la mano tan generosamente como pudimos a los necesitados, los desnudos y los hambrientos.

Esto plantea algunas preguntas: ¿Qué hacemos si nos encontramos en la situación que acabamos de describir? ¿Bajamos la cabeza y nos alejamos de Jesús, como lo hizo el hombre rico? qué hacemos?

El evangelio sugiere la respuesta a nuestra pregunta. Inmediatamente después de que Jesús les dice a sus discípulos, "es mucho más dificil para un rico entrar en el Reino de Dios que para un camello pasar por el ojo de una aguja", preguntan, "¿Quién, entonces, puede ser salvo?"

Jesús responde: "Esto es imposible para el hombre, pero no para Dios". En otras palabras, no podemos hacer nada por nosotros mismos, pero con Dios a nuestro lado, podemos hacer todo.

¿Cómo conseguimos la ayuda de Dios? Hay un viejo adagio que dice: "Dios ayuda a los que se ayudan a sí mismos". Y hay otro que dice: "Si caminamos hacia Dios un paso, él correrá hacia nosotros diez pasos".

La respuesta a nuestra pregunta está aquí. La forma de buscar la ayuda de Dios no es simplemente pedírsela en oración. Deberíamos hacer esto, por supuesto; pero también deberíamos hacer algo más. Debemos dar el primer paso y seguir al Señor.

El evangelio de hoy no es una invitación a hacer un gran viaje de una vez. Es simplemente una invitación a dar el primer paso de ese viaje. Si damos ese primer paso al acercarnos a alguien que realmente lo necesita, Dios vendrá corriendo hacia nosotros, nos tomará de la mano y caminará a nuestro lado durante todo el viaje de nuestra vida.
