GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

As I began reading the Gospel for today, I initially thought, "Here we go - those hypocritical Pharisees are at it again! They are always questioning Jesus, always judging others, and always looking for ways to make themselves look 'holier' than everyone else." Uh oh; then I realized that I was feeling pretty smug as I judged the Pharisees! Sadly, it can be easy for me to fall into a "Pharisee attitude," thinking I "walk blamelessly and do justice" when really I am just deluding myself. While Jesus uses this encounter to point out the hypocrisy of the Pharisees, he also calls the crowd to a greater understanding of the source of evil in their lives, "From within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts." Maybe I need to hear these words, too, and examine my own thoughts and actions before judging others.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

St. James provides an answer to combating the evil we discover in our hearts: "Humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you and is able to save your souls." The Word, Jesus, came to us and has given us the way to free ourselves from the evil within. Our relationship with him is the key. We know we are to "be doers of the word and not hearers only." We have the Holy Spirit to help us stay close to him and access his saving power that transforms our hearts to reflect his goodness and truth. It requires us to humbly assess and own the things we need to change; and to turn to him for guidance so that we may have nothing within us — no evil thoughts, greed, malice, envy or arrogance (etc.) — to defile us. Only then are we most free in Christ — truly free to "care for orphans and widows in their affliction and to keep oneself unstained by the world."

The Daily Examen, created by St. Ignatius of Loyola, is an ideal way for growing closer to Jesus and seeking his guidance. Suggested for the day's end, this prayerful reflection helps you recognize God's presence in the day's events, assess your thoughts and behavior, ask for his help in growing in goodness, and discern his plans for you.

ST. IGNATIAN YEAR CORNER

Early days in Paris

Though many people, dissuaded Ignatius from going to Paris, because of the war between Spain and France, Ignatius took leave with his few books upon a little ass. He reached Paris on February 2, 1528, and remained there as a student until 1535. He lived on alms - in 1528 and 1529, from Spanish merchants in Flanders, and in 1530, from England.

Ignatian Spirituality of detachment or "indifference"

Ignatius, in his First Principle and Foundation, talks about "making use of those things that help to bring us closer to God and leaving aside those things that don't." He urges us to seek this freedom of detachment or indifference. By "indifference", Ignatius meant enough detachment from things, people, or experiences, to be able either to take them up or to leave them aside, depending on whether they help us to praise, reverence, and serve God" (Spiritual Exercises 23). In other words, it's the ability to keep a balance in life and to let go of what doesn't help to love God or love others—while staying engaged with what does. The grace of detachment is in fact a fruit of prayer, which helps us to overcome our fears and worries, and trust God no matter what happens. It is the thought that "God's grace will be enough for me." This grace-filled detachment brings deep peace and trust in God, despite the fear that can accompany a situation. For Ignatius, irrespective of richness or poverty, health or sickness, in an assignment of enjoyment or not, comfortable or not, etc., one should be in a state of spiritual indifference, which enables one to continue to live the Gospel life without anxiety or possessiveness, and irrespective of circumstances should have a sense of spiritual joy by seeking only God's will.

JANE'S GARDEN

What is Jane's Garden? It is a volunteer organization that strives to beautify the ground around Saint Ignatius. To be a volunteers do not need to have any special skills. If you can plant, water or weed, you can adopt a garden.

OUR HISTORY

Established in 1990, originally called "Adopt-a-Garden", it was founded by Jane Schreiber, who was a lifelong Hicksville resident and parishioner at St. Ignatius, who volunteered as the Religious Coordinator and member of the Martha Group. During the 1990's the gardens received some recognition in newsprint:

- •May 1992 Article in Hicksville Illustrated
- •April 1995 Article in LI Catholic
- •October 1995 Gardens receive national recognition in the U.S. Parish newsletter

In Nov. of 1997, the ministry was changed to "Jane's Garden Family" to honor Jane after her death. Soon thereafter Roberta Ruggio headed the ministry, She headed for a short time until Judy and Gene Sebastiano took over the ministry. The gardens were In Judy's words:

"I feel that the exterior grounds give a sign of the feeling of welcome that is inside. To beautify the outside of our place of worship, a small portion of this world that God has given us, brings joy to all of us. I guess you'd say we have bloomed where we have been planted."

In 2008, Msgr. Bittermann Garden (later called the Prayer Garden) was pretty barren; The Boys Scouts as part of an Eagle Scout Project, beautified the area and statues of the Holy Family, St. Ignatius Loyola, the Crucifix, and the benches were added so people would be able to sit and pray. Over the years, there have been many Eagle Scout projects that have beautified the grounds around our parish.

In 2009, the Hispanic community joined together, dubbed the "7:15 Mass Worshippers", to adopt and beautify the large garden behind the convent, bordering the back of the church parking lot.

In 2011, the Stations of the Cross were newly erected. Judy and Gene put out a request for gardeners to beautify the areas around the Stations of the Cross; the Boy Scouts and three families planted in the gardens around the Stations

By the Spring of 2014, thirty families were involved in Jane's Garden Family. The Prayer Garden (Msgr Bitterman Garden) was beautified by Michael Crayne as an Eagle Scout Project. This garden was subsequently adopted by the Crayne family.

As a ministry we are grateful for the support we have received from Terry Meyer of Meyer's Farms in Woodbury, who for many years has been generous with donations of annuals and perennials In 2018, I was asked to assist Judy and Gene with the ministry as they were finding it difficult to continue being the coordinator. But as many of you may know, the Sebastianos continued to be active in Jane's Garden. Judy was very talented and created all of the wood signs that adore our gardens.

In March of 2021, I last walked with Judy through the gardens and she pointed to the many varieties of plants and flowers that adored the grounds. I did not know it at the time, but it was July's way to say "Goodbye". Sadly, Judy is no longer with us and she will be missed.

Please take a moment to walk the gardens after mass or when you need a few minutes to reflect.







Lectura del santo evangelio según san Marcos

(7,1-8.14-15.21-23):
