Clergy Corner

My dear St. Ignatius family,

Last week, on Saturday, 24th we had the Sacrament of Confirmation. May the Holy Spirit enlighten those who received Confirmation, in their faith journey. I thank Bishop Henning for preceding the ceremony. Yesterday was indeed a great day. We started the First Holy Communion of this year. Next Saturday we also have First Holy Communion. These children prepared their hearts and were waiting to receive our Lord. I take this opportunity to congratulate the children, parents and the catechists who guided them. May God reward their dedication. When we were children, we too enthusiastically prepared our hearts to receive Jesus in the Holy Eucharist for the first time. But as time passed by, the enthusiasm diminished, and for many it has become a routine. When we were children, we were innocent, we did most of the things taught by our parents, Catechists, and priests. Let the maturity we attain in our adulthood be not a hindrance, but a guiding force in our spirituality. As adults, it is our responsibility to show these kids that we are still eagerly waiting to receive Him. Otherwise, it would be just a fairy tale experience we give them, with nice dress and food, and celebrations. So I would like to remind each one of us, to set an example for these children by our actions rather than our words, as the readings of this Sunday urges us to do so.

In today's first and second readings, we see that our actions should proclaim our faith louder than our words. When Saul tried to join the disciples, they were afraid of him. But later when they saw the change in him for themselves, and that Saul was speaking boldly about Jesus, they believed his words of conversion. In the second reading also, we are invited to act rather than speak, and in the Gospel reading we see that we can bear fruits only with Jesus. So let us do everything with Him, and come out with flying colors.

This is the month of May, dedicated to our Blessed Mother. She is a good role model for these children as well as ourselves in all aspects. As a devout Jewish girl, she was expecting the Messiah, and was leading a life of prayers. She kept her purity all through her life. She never doubted God's immense love and His plans, and readily said her "yes" without worrying about the consequences that awaited her. Let us allow her to take our hands and lead to Jesus her Son, and our Lord. To honor her in a special way, throughout this month, we will be praying the Rosary at 8:25am. I invite all of you to join us and pray with us. Each day the rosary will be led by a family, or a group of friends. The rosary booklets will be provided in the Church. This is the month of mothers. She is our heavenly mother. Let us offer these rosaries as bouquets to her and honor her, our Mother and the Mother of Jesus.



Two weeks ago, throughout an entire week, we went through the discourse of the bread of life from the Gospel of John, Chapter 6. We saw Jesus, emphatically telling the need to receive His body and blood to attain eternal life. I appreciate the love and faith of those who are coming to receive Him with this intention, even in these trying times of this pandemic. I also encourage all who have received both of the vaccine doses to safely and slowly come back to Church. Hope to see you all in one of the Masses real soon. Till then, I will meet you all in my prayers.



SOME OF THE APPROVED MARIAN APPARITIONS

OUR LADY OF PILLAR, SPAIN



According to traditional Catholic belief, in AD 40, St. James the Greater confronted great difficulties in his missionary efforts evangelizing in Roman Hispania (modern day Spain) and faced severe discouragement. Once when he was praying by the banks of the Ebro at Zaragoza to console and encourage him, Mary bilocated from Jerusalem, where she was living at the time, and

appeared to James accompanied by thousands of angels. Our Lady of the Pillar is considered as the first Marian apparition, and is the only one to have occurred while Mary was still on earth.

OUR LADY OF BANNEUX, BELGIUM



(OUR LADY OF THE POOR AND QUEEN OF NATIONS) The apparition of the Virgin Mary to a 12 1/2 year old Mariette Beco, saying "I come to relieve suffering and Believe in me and I will Believe in you.

OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMIEL AYLESFORD, ENGLAND



According to Carmelite tradition, Mary appeared with a scapular in her hand and promised safety from Hell, to St. Simon Stock, an Englishman of great holiness and devotion, who was Prior General of the Order in the mid-13th century. In answer to his prayers to help his oppressed order, Mary gave the scapular to Simon and

said," This is for you and yours a privilege; the one who dies in it will be saved." This small devotional scapular became very popular as a sacramental in the latter half of the 16th century.

OUR LADY OF MIRACULOUS MEDAL PARIS

Mary appeared to St.Catherine Labouré and asked her to make a specific medal and promised that "all who wear this medal will receive great graces."

Due to the many miracles connected with it, the medal is commonly known as the Miraculous Medal. It is also known as the Medal of Our Lady of Graces. The front of the medal has a picture of Mary as Catherine

described her, and on the back the letter M and a cross.

OUR LADY OF BEAURAING BELGIUM (THE VIRGIN OF THE

GOLDEN HEART)
It is reported that Mary appeared 33times to five children, aged 9 to 15, between November 1932 and January 1933 and asked for prayer and for the construction of a chapel as a place of pilgrimage, promising to convert sinners.



OUR LADY OF LA SALETTE, FRANCE

175 years ago, two shepherd children reported seeing an apparition of Mary, who was weeping because of the disrespect shown to the Lord's Day and to His name. The tears of Mary urges our urgent conversion.





The sacrament of First Holy Communion is an important Sacrament for Catholics. It is usually the third of seven sacraments received by a Catholic; the first two being Baptism, and First Confession (the first sacrament of Penance). It is usually given to children between the ages of seven and thirteen. However, for those entering into the Catholic Church as adults, Confirmation is given immediately before First Communion. Children prepare for receiving First Holy Communion in a two year program, starting in the 1st grade and culminating in the Easter Season of 2nd grade with the celebration of First Holy Communion. The celebrations that follow, usually include large family gatherings and parties. The first communicant wears a special dress, often white to symbolize purity. Often, a girl wears a white fancy dress and a veil attached to a chaplet of flowers or some other hair ornament and occasionally wears white gloves, while boys may wear a suit and tie or a tuxedo.

Sacrament of Confirmation

The Sacrament of Confirmation is usually administered by the Bishop to the faithful after reaching the age of discretion. It includes the laying on of hands and the anointing with the holy oil, Chrism. In preparation to receive this Sacrament, the baptized person attends special religious classes and is "sealed with the 12 fruits and 7 gifts of the Holy Spirit". A sponsor who plays the role of a spiritual parent, places his or her hand on the confirmand's shoulder and is to be there for life long spiritual support.



In both these events, gifts of a religious nature such as Bibles, daily devotional books, rosaries, prayer books, religious statues and holy cards are usually given and photographs are taken to commemorate the events.



"The Secret of Freedom - Courage" -Thucydides (Greek historian - 5th century BC) **Some With Courage Are Defending Religious Freedom**



"Get out! Get out! ... Don't come back without a warrant!," (1) yelled Pastor Artur Pawlowski to police and a public health officer as they "entered the church building uninvited on its holiest, most anticipated day for parishioners," during their church's Passover service in Alberta, Canada. "If they want to inspect the building, they can call me and we can arrange that... I asked them to get out and they would not move," said the Polish Pastor. (2)

"I grew up under communist dictatorship behind the Iron Curtain, under the brute of the Soviets... It was like a ... flashback when those police showed up at my church.... And the only thing I could do is to fend off the wolves as a shepherd, and I used my voice to get rid of them."(3)

In a "Huge Win!" (4) California lifts capacity limits on churches and in home religious gatherings following five rebukes from the U.S. Supreme Court in five separate cases citing the First Amendment's right to religious freedom. "This is the fifth time the Court has summarily rejected the Ninth Circuit's analysis of California's COVID restrictions on religious exercise," the opinion said. (5)

"For over a year, the state of CA has targeted the faith community for discriminatory treatment depriving them of their fundamental right to worship. It shouldn't take a decision from the Supreme Court, much less five decisions, for Gov. Newsom to realize that what he has been doing is unconstitutional," said Center for American Liberty founder and CEO Harmeet Dhillon. (6)

Colorado cake artist Jack Phillips is again defending his freedom to practice his Christian faith in his refusal to create a cake celebrating a gender transition. COMUNIDAD HISPANA



La primera lectura hoy nos enseña una comunidad en proceso de hacer una decisión difícil- aceptar a San Pablo o protegerse de alguien que había perseguido a los nuevos seguidores de Jesús. La comunidad cristiana en Jerusalén sabía que Pablo había hecho todo lo posible para eliminar a esta pequeña secta y tuvo bien difícil creer que él es había convertido en discípulo. Era solamente con el testimonio de Bernabé que le aceptaron. Poco después, al ver que Pablo estaba en peligro por causa de su predicación, ellos trabajaron para sacarle de Jerusalén and le mandaron a Tarso.

Esta comunidad es algo extraordinaria. Este pequeño grupo no solamente era listo a perdonar a Pablo, sino de aceptarle como una parte integral, haciendo sacrificios por su bien. Es una comunidad que había aprendido una lección importante de las enseñanzas de Jesús. Para seguir a Cristo, ellos tendrían que perdonar y recibir a los hijos pródigos. Como dice la segunda lectura, "No amemos solamente de palabra; amemos de verdad y con las obras".

No es una cosa fácil perdonar. A pesar de la parábola del hijo prodigo, muchos encuentran casi imposible perdonar a los que han pecado públicamente o han hecho algo contra su misma persona. Muchas familias quedan divididas por causa de un insulto o una acción que tal vez ocurrió hace años. Muchos cristianos proclaman que no hay justicia sin la pena de muerte por crímenes crueles. Parece que hay algo en nuestra naturaleza que quiere ver sufrir a alguien que nos ha hecho mal.

Pero aquí en la lectura vemos la presencia de Cristo Resucitado. Es una comunidad que hizo esta decisión difícil porque se dieron cuenta de la Resurrección. Como se explica en la parábola de la vid, la vida de Jesús surge en la vida de los cristianos. Ellos son capaces de actuar como Jesús, que siempre reflejó el amor de su Padre. Si el Padre pudo perdonar, entonces los cristianos pueden perdonar. Si el Padre demuestra su amor sin límites a los pecadores, entonces los cristianos pueden demostrar esta misma clase de amor. Si el Padre reconoce a todos como sus hijos e hijas, entonces, los cristianos pueden reconocer a todos como hermanos y hermanas.

Creo que somos todavía una comunidad en proceso de hacer decisiones difíciles. Con cada época vienen nuevas situaciones y circunstancias. Pensamos en la inmigración, los refugiados, los criminales que salen de la cárcel, los que sufren de enfermedades mentales, y mil otros casos. En nuestros días, enfrentamos casos bien difíciles incluyendo los de la policía. Como respondemos a los desafíos de estos grupos depende de cómo entendemos la Resurrección. La pregunta clave es si la vida de Jesús está evidenciada por nuestras acciones hoy en día.

Las ultimas palabras del Evangelio suenen en nuestro corazón. "La gloria de mi Padre consiste en que den mucho fruto y se manifiesten así como discípulos míos".


