

Clergy Corner



My dear faith family of St. Ignatius,

This Sunday, we celebrate the feast of Pentecost. It has a long-standing tradition. Among the ancient Jews, this was originally a harvest festival. It was a feast in which God's generous abundance was celebrated with great gratitude and exuberant joy. Later, for the Jews, it became the festival of the Law given on Mount Sinai.

For us Christians, the name Pentecost comes from the Greek word: "Pentecoste." It literally means the fiftieth day—fiftieth day after Easter! It's the birthday of the Christian Church. It's the festival celebration of our New Covenant with God. It's the Feast of the Holy Spirit. It's a celebration of our own particular giftedness. And it's the Last Sunday of Easter, signifying that Easter is one long and glorious time.

In order to convey Pentecost's essential meaning--as an event connected with Easter--the Church chose as today's Gospel reading, a scene from the first Easter night. It tells us how the apostles had locked themselves up out of fear for their lives. That was understandable. It had been a terrible week, in which they had seen their leader's triumph in the beginning of the week turn to betrayal, pain, torment, and death. They had been absent when he needed them most; they had all kinds of regrets for which they needed the solace of one—another; and they knew that their leader's fate could easily befall themselves. It was like some of the times of our own lives when everything goes wrong: the passing away of loved ones, the loss of jobs, terrible—loneliness.

Yet here he was! Instead of berating them for their fear, Jesus wished them "peace." Suddenly, the apostles' fear changed into joy. This kind of intense joy is one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit. It's a joy characteristic of all Jesus' followers, as Jesus had explained at the Last Supper. It's a joy that should be evident in our community.

Jesus then gave them a mission: "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." This was a new kind of mission--a mission to spread the love of God to the world. To all of us who hear the Gospel, that mission is one of Jesus' farewell gifts, along with peace and joy. It puts meaning into our life--a meaning that is beyond superficial, everyday, ordinary experiences.

In giving this mission, Jesus "breathed" on the apostles. This may seem a strange procedure to us, but from the Jewish Scriptures the apostles were familiar with God doing this. The first creation account describes God's breath as a wind hovering over the primeval waters. Again, when God created Adam He breathed on him, giving him life. Isaiah portrays the Spirit as a guide directing the Messiah from within. Elijah recognized the presence of the Spirit in a whispering wind. Ezekiel breathed life into dry bones and they nbecame alive (Ezk. 37:1-14).

The Spirit of God continues to breathe over the universe. Through His Spirit, God continues to create. He vivifies us and stimulates our religious fervor through His gifts. In short, He makes all things new. Let us, therefore, pray: "Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of thy love. Send forth thy Spirit and they shall be created." Amen.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Come, Holy Spirit!" On Pentecost Sunday, which we celebrate 50 days after Easter, Jesus sends the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. The readings use the language of the senses to describe the powerful presence of the Spirit: A breath, a mighty wind, tongues of fire, a cacophony of languages somehow understood by all. Jesus sends the Spirit upon each of us as well. And while we may not experience the Holy Spirit with our physical senses, I bet each one of us has sensed the Spirit's presence at different times in life: a homily that deeply resonated, a sense of awe at God's creation, a "moral compass" that guided us toward what is right, or when we found the words to console a friend in crisis or vice versa. Just as the Spirit transformed the disciples and emboldened them to build up the Church by carrying on Jesus' mission, we, too, can ask the Holy Spirit to guide us and strengthen us to be a force for love and unity in our families, parishes, and communities.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's Gospel, Jesus sends his disciples out to continue his ministry, assuring them of the presence of the Holy Spirit to guide them. We, too, have been given the gifts of the Holy Spirit and commissioned to use them to build up the Church. Well before we learned about concepts such as "emotional intelligence" or skills tests, Saint Paul assured the Corinthians that there are many different gifts and ministries, but the same Spirit. Our gifts may even change as we move from one chapter of life to another. For example, high school and college students may help lead retreats or participate in service projects, young adults may build a parish website or lead a Bible study, those who are homebound may offer to pray for others in their parish. For followers of Christ, the only option not on the table is becoming complacent. As we move from the Easter season to "Ordinary Time," let's invite the Holy Spirit to show us how to be "extra-ordinary" in our discipleship in the coming days and weeks. Then follow through.

PRAY Do you sometimes get the Monday blahs? Try starting the day with the Prayer to the Holy Spirit, asking for guidance (and some pep in our step!) as we begin the week: Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.



Anointing (Oil)

Anointing by the Spirit of the Lord is in Lk 4:18, which is originally a passage from the Is.61:1-2. Sacred Chrism is used at Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders, and it imparts the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Dove

The Hoy Spirit descended on Jesus during His baptism Mt:3:16)

Hand

It was by the imposition of the hands of the Apostles that the Holy Spirit was given (Acts 8:17-19).

Fire

Descend of the Holy Spirit on the disciples. (Acts 2:3-4)

Wind

Holy Spirit came down in the room where the disciples were assembled with Mary(Acts 2:2-3)



Cloud

The Holy Spirit is the mysterious and abiding presence of God, and God's presence is described by the presence of clouds throughout both the Old and New Testaments. During the Transfiguration of Our Lord (Mt.17:5)

Seal

Seal indicates the anointing with the Holy Spirit, about which we see in Jn.6:27. in the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders

Water

ST AUGUSTINE'S PRAYER TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

Breathe in me, O Holy Spirit, that my thoughts may all be holy. Act in me, O Holy Spirit, that my work, too, may be holy. Draw my heart, O Holy Spirit, that I love but what is holy. Strengthen me, O Holy Spirit, to defend all that is holy. Guard me, then, O Holy Spirit, that I always may be holy.

<u>SAINT FACTS</u>: Saints inspire us to grow in firm faith. Let us learn from them and seek

their intercession. St. Philip Neri pray for us and guide us.

SAINT PHILIP NERI; Second Apostle of Rome after Peter. FEAST DAY: MAY 26 PATRON SAINT of Rome, US Special Forces, humor, joy

Philip Neri was born in Florence. From a very young age, he was known for being cheerful and obedient and was known as "good little Phil." His early teachings were from the friars at the Dominican monastery in Florence, San Marco. At the age of 18, Philip went off to San Germano, to assist a wealthy family member in business, which he may have later inherited. However, Philip experienced a mystical vision, an

encounter with the Lord, which he referred to as his Christian conversion, after which his life changed dramatically. From then onward, he no longer cared for things of the world, lost interest in owning property or participating in business and decided to go to Rome to live for Lord Jesus Christ and to serve His Church. During his first two years in Rome, Philip spent his time in prayer and led a solitary life. He practiced an ascetical life, eating very small meals of bread, water and a few vegetables. Philip became a tutor for a Florentine's sons. Then he pursued his own studies in theology and philosophy under the guidance of the Augustinians for a period of three years. Although he was good at his studies, he gave up the thought of ordination, and for the next seventeen years set out to help the poor people of Rome and to re-evangelize the city, as a layman. He talked to people on street corners, in public squares, and in places where people commonly gathered. He easily caught their attention with his warm personality and incredible sense of humor. According to him, "A joyful heart is more easily made perfect than a downcast one." He encouraged groups of people to gather for discussions, studies, prayer, share the Gospel and the enjoyment of music, and converted these good conversations to good actions, by leading them to hospitals to take care of the sick or to the Church, to pray. During day time he helped others, and in the nights he prayed. In 1544, on the eve of Pentecost, Philip saw what appeared to be a globe of fire. It is said that the fire entered his mouth, causing Philip to feel a swelling over his heart, though it never caused him pain. When his body was examined after death, it was found that two of his ribs had been broken, because of this incident. With the help of his confessor, Father Persiano Rossa, Philip founded the Confraternity of the Most Holy Trinity for poor laymen to meet for spiritual exercises and service of the poor. The Congregation of the Oratory of Saint Philip Neri, is a pontifical society of apostolic life of Catholic priests and lay-brothers who live together in a community bound together but without formal vows. It had no rules and gave considerable freedom of action compared to the traditional religious foundations. He combined popular venerations with intensely individual piety and introduced Forty Hours Devotion once a month, in which continuous prayer is made for forty hours before the Blessed Sacrament exposed. The members of the society preached sermons in different churches every evening. He tried to reform a corrupt Rome and an indifferent clergy. He had friendship with Ignatius of Loyola, Pius V and Charles Borromeo. Philip's confessor convinced him that his work would be more effective as a priest. He was ordained to the diaconate and then to the priesthood on May 23, 1551. After that, he spent much of his time hearing confessions leading to many conversions. In the words of one of his biographers, Philip was "all things to all men.... When he was called upon to be merry, he was so; if there was a demand upon his sympathy, he was equally ready..." . He gave advice to Popes, Kings and the poor, and was respected and loved throughout Rome. In 1553, Neri started the tradition of "Seven Churches Walk" .He and a few friends would gather before dawn and set out on their one-day pilgrimage to seven churches, starting from St. Peter's Basilica and ending at the Basilica di Santa Maria Maggiore. On 15 May, 1595, he predicted that he had only ten more days to live. On the Feast of Corpus Christi, May 25, of that year, Philip went to celebrate Mass in his little chapel, near his room where he had been given permission to celebrate Mass privately. At the beginning of his Mass, he remained for some time looking fixedly just as if he saw some great vision. He celebrated the Mass with great exultation. He was healthy throughout the day. After his usual night prayer; when in bed, he predicted the hour of the night at which he would die . About an hour after midnight, he suffered from a hemorrhage and passed away at the age of 80 years.

The Ignatian year (May 20, 2021 to July 31, 2022)



FOCUS ON RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

Religious liberty is increasingly under attack by those who believe it cannot and should not coexist with our other freedoms. However, religious freedom is a God given, fundamental human right and American value enshrined in our Constitution and protected by the Bill of Rights. Freedom of religion protects the conscience of all people since it allows us to think, express and act upon what we deeply believe. This freedom of conscience is critical to the health of a diverse society by allowing different faiths and beliefs to flourish. "We claim the privilege of worshipping Almighty God according to the dictates of our own conscience, and allow all men the same privilege; let them worship (or not) how, where, or what they may," said Church of Latter-day Saints leaders.(1) The American Founders understood the importance of religion for human, social, and political flourishing. That's why they styled religious freedom as the First Freedom and the foundation upon which all other freedoms are guaranteed and protected and without which the new Republic would fail. "The propitious smiles of Heaven can never be expected on a nation that disregards the eternal rules of order and right which Heaven itself has ordained." - George Washington, 1789 Americans supported the Founders' understanding of religious liberty when they overwhelmingly endorsed the Religious Freedom Restoration Act and the International Religious Freedom Act that were signed by President Bill Clinton in the 1990s.

However, a direct denial of conscience rights occurred on Sept. 8, 2016, when the chairman of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights issued this statement: "(t)he phrases 'religious liberty' and 'religious freedom' (are) code words for discrimination, intolerance, racism, sexism, homophobia, Islamophobia (and) Christian supremacy ..." (2) "If we lose freedom here, there is no place to escape to. This is the last stand on earth." - President Ronald Reagan

Rincón de Clero



Mi querida familia de fe de San Ignacio,

Este domingo celebramos la fiesta de Pentecostés. Tiene una larga tradición. Entre los judíos antiguos, originalmente se trataba de una fiesta de la cosecha. Fue una fiesta en la que la generosidad de Dios se celebró con gran gratitud y exuberante alegría. Más tarde, para los judíos, se convirtió en la fiesta de la Ley dada en el monte Sinaí.

Para nosotros los cristianos, el nombre Pentecostés proviene de la palabra griega: "Pentecostés". Literalmente significa el quincuagésimo día, el quincuagésimo día después de Pascua. Es el cumpleaños de la Iglesia Cristiana. Es la celebración festiva de nuestro Nuevo Pacto con Dios. Es la Fiesta del Espíritu Santo. Es una celebración de nuestro propio talento particular. Y es el último domingo de Pascua, lo que significa que la Pascua es un tiempo largo y glorioso.

Para transmitir el significado esencial de Pentecostés, como evento relacionado con la Pascua, la Iglesia eligió como lectura del Evangelio de hoy, una escena de la primera noche de Pascua. Nos dice cómo los apóstoles se encerraron por temor a perder la vida. Eso fue comprensible. Había sido una semana terrible, en la que habían visto cómo el triunfo de su líder al comienzo de la semana se convirtió en traición, dolor, tormento y muerte. Habían estado ausentes cuando más los necesitaba; ellos tenían todo tipo de arrepentimientos por los que necesitaban el consuelo el uno del otro; y sabían que el destino del líder fácilmente podría sucederles a ellos mismos. Fue como algunos de los momentos de nuestra propia vida en los que todo sale mal: la muerte de seres queridos, la pérdida de trabajos, una soledad terrible.

¡Sin embargo, aquí estaba! En lugar de reprenderlos por su miedo, Jesús les deseó "paz". De repente, el miedo de los apóstoles se transformó en gozo. Este tipo de gozo intenso es uno de los frutos del Espíritu Santo. Es un gozo característico de todos los seguidores de Jesús, como Jesús lo explicó en la Última Cena. Es una alegría que debería ser evidente en nuestra comunidad.

Entonces Jesús les dio una misión: "Como el Padre me envió, así también yo los envío a ustedes". Este fue un nuevo tipo de misión: una misión para difundir el amor de Dios en el mundo. Para todos los que escuchamos el Evangelio, esa misión es uno de los dones de despedida de Jesús, junto con la paz y la alegría. Nuestra vida - un significado que va más allá de las experiencias superficiales, cotidianas y ordinarias.

Al dar esta misión, Jesús "sopló" sobre los apóstoles. Esto puede parecer un procedimiento extraño para nosotros, pero de las Escrituras judías los apóstoles estaban familiarizados con Dios haciendo esto. El primer relato de la creación describe el aliento de Dios como un viento que se cierne sobre las aguas primigenias. Una vez más, cuando Dios creó a Adán, sopló sobre él, dándole vida. Isaías describe al Espíritu como una guía que dirige al Mesías desde adentro. Elías reconoció la presencia del Espíritu en un viento susurrante. Ezequiel sopló vida a los huesos secos y ellos cobraron vida (Ez. 37: 1-14).

El Espíritu de Dios continúa soplando sobre el universo. A través de Su Espíritu, Dios continúa creando. Él vivifica nos estimula y estimula nuestro fervor religioso a través de sus dones. En resumen, Él hace todas las cosas nuevas. Por tanto, oremos: "Ven Espíritu Santo, llena los corazones de tus fieles y enciende en ellos el fuego de tu amor. Envía tu Espíritu y serán creados".



Sí, ¡con ese Fuego es que se encienden y arden los corazones en el amor a Dios y a los hermanos humanos con el mismo amor de Cristo!

En Pentecostés los discípulos recibieron en forma de lenguas de fuego este Don e inmediatamente, inflamados por el ardor apostólico, se pusieron a predicar con 'parresía', con ardor y coraje, la Buena Nueva que había de encender el mundo entero.

¡A nosotros nos toca hoy implorar y acoger ese Don divino! ¡A nosotros nos toca hoy dejarnos inflamar con ese Amor que es derramado cada día en nuestros corazones por el Espíritu Santo, para que ardiendo de celo por el Evangelio nos dispongamos a transformar los corazones humanos con sólo tocarlos con esas como "llamas en forma de lenguas de fuego"!

Si el fuego del Espíritu no arde en mi corazón primero, cada día y con ardor incontenible, ¿cómo voy a comunicar ese fuego y encender otros corazones?
