





Clergy Corner

Last week we entered into what the Church calls "Ordinary Time"; in the weeks ahead, the Church liturgy will have us journeying with Jesus and his disciples, reliving their experience of His words and deeds, coming to know and believe in Him as they did.



Yes, brothers and sisters, this ordinary time is for us to learn and listen to the Lord and walk with him as he interacts with his people. And today's liturgy shows us the power of God over everything that He has created, the wind, the sea, and the storms.

In the book of Job, he has protested and maintained his innocence in the face of the intense suffering he endured; but God simply stresses his wisdom and power in creation, who shuts within, doors the sea and waves are stilled! God has power over his masterpiece, his creation; the natural forces are powerless against him. Notice how our psalm provides an outline for today's Gospel. The sailors in their ships were in deep water in the storm and they cried to the Lord in their distress and He rescues them.

In the Gospel Jesus sets out for the east side of the lake of Galilee with his disciples, suddenly a storm with high winds came sweeping down, and Jesus was sleeping on a cushion, which symbolizes His spirit of total trust in the Father, and the disciples' weakness in faith, scared asking Jesus for help; what does Jesus do? Rebuked the wind and said to the sea "Quiet! Be still" The wind ceased and there was a great calm. Jesus asked them, Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?

Sometimes we question God as Job did in today's first reading or we doubt the presence of Jesus in our lives, especially in the storms of our lives. We always claim that Jesus is the center of our life, and yet sometimes when we face a crisis or severe problems, we immediately turn in many different directions and panic looking for answers before we turn to God.

We should always imitate the trust that Jesus shows in the father, with confidence that He will bring us to shore safely from every storm that comes our way.

Brothers and sisters as we continue walking with Jesus, let us always remember that even if He is sleeping, He is taking care of us because He is faithful to His promises and His Church. We are all in this together as a new creation as St Paul tells us today, yes we are a new creation in Christ, old things have passed away, we can't go back to what we were before.

Let us trust with great confidence in the Father of Jesus Christ and our Father. He is not like us, unstable always changing and moving from one attitude to another. God is simply Love; so let us give thanks to the Lord, for His love is everlasting.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

A number of editorials, blog posts, and other commentaries of late have declared "languishing" as the "mood," or dominant emotion, of 2021. This is not depression, but rather a series of emotions that wear away at our sense of purpose and belonging. Those who languish experience apathy and a lack of motivation, all while participating in the daily activities of life. Yes, I said to myself, that's it exactly! After the craziness of these last 15 months ... I think these writers are on to something! Therefore, I am particularly moved by God's providence and grace in providing an antidote to the emptiness of languishing in today's Scriptures. In the second reading, Paul writes with such urgency that "the love of Christ impels us" to live not for ourselves, but for the sake of Christ who died for all. The word "impel" differs from "compel," because it implies a strong moral force from within. And in the Gospel, we see that for Christians, that inner force springs from faith, a faith that can endure both the violent squalls of life and the sense of being adrift that we can't always put our finger on. Like Paul, our faith impels us to refocus our lives on our love of Christ and others.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It occurs to me that we Catholics have myriad opportunities to avail ourselves of those graces, and to strengthen our faith. Languishing can be replaced with flourishing, and a recapturing of the knowledge of who we belong to: the Lord. Praying for others during Mass, reading and discussing a spiritual book with a friend, volunteering at a soup kitchen or shelter, offering to help drive refugees or senior citizens to medical appointments, or participating in a young (or older) adult parish activity – these are all actions that empty us of apathy and fill us with gratitude. The pandemic has been tragic, and terrifying, and life-altering. But God remains steadfast. We will face our share of storms, but we can rest assured that Jesus is our anchor as we move forward in faith.

PRAY Feeling blah? Re-read Paul's letter (2 Cor 5:14-17) and ask God to help you remember that you are God's beloved - with dignity, value, and purpose. Trust that "whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come."

INTERESTING FACTS ON NATURE MIRACLES

In today's Gospel Reading as we see the storm calmed by Jesus, we are given an account of His authority over nature. So let us have a glance at the miracles which fall into this category of miracles.



Changing of the water into wine at the wedding in Cana (John 2). When the wedding party runs out of wine, the water filled in the vessels at Jesus' command, is turned to the best wine of the banquet.

First miraculous catch of fishes (Luke 5).

After this incident Jesus called Saint Peter, James and John, sons of Zebedee to be fishers of men.



Calming the storm (Matthew 8; Mark 4; Luke 8).

Jesus rebuked the storm and calmed it.



Jesus's walking on the water (Matthew 14; Mark 6; John 6).

One of the most widely told narratives and key miracles of Jesus.

First multiplication of loaves (Matthew 14; Mark 6; Luke 9; John 6).

Recorded in all four Gospels.

Fed 5000 with 5 loaves and 2 fish, with 12 full baskets of left over.



Second multiplication of loaves (Matthew 15; Mark 8).

Fed 4000 with 7 loaves and a few fish, with 7 full baskets of left over.

Peter found coin to pay the temple taxes, in the fish's mouth just as Jesus said. (Matthew 17).





Cursing of the fig tree (Matthew 21; Mark 11).

Resulting in the withering of the fig tree.



Second miraculous catch of fishes (John 21).

SAINT ST. ALOYSIUS GONZAGA; FEAST DAY: JUNE 21



PATRON SAINT of young students, Christian youth,
plague victims, AIDS sufferers and their caregivers.

Depicted in art with a lily, referring to innocence; a cross, referring to piety and sacrifice; a skull, referring to his early death; and a rosary, referring to his devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Aloysius was born the eldest of seven children, to Ferrante de Gonzaga Marquis of Castiglione, and Marta Tana di Santena, daughter of a baron, in Castiglione, Italy. The first spoken words of St. Aloysius were the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary. As the first-born son, he was destined for a military career as a nobleman, and so was given military training at an early age, and was educated at the ducal courts of Florence and Mantua and later at the royal court of Madrid, where he was page to King Philip II's son Diego. While he fell ill in Florence with a disease of the kidneys, which troubled him throughout his life, he read about the saints and spent much of his time in prayer. He took a private vow of chastity at the age of 9. He was shocked by the violent lifestyle in Mantua, and returned to Castiglione where he met Cardinal Charles Borromeo, from whom He received First Communion on 22 July 1580. After reading a book about Jesuit missionaries in India, Aloysius strongly desired to become a missionary, and started to teach catechism classes to young boys in Castiglione in the summers. He also adopted an ascetic lifestyle. When in Madrid, Aloysius seriously started thinking about joining a religious order. Though he had considered joining the Capuchins, as he had a Jesuit confessor in Madrid, he decided to join that order. His mother agreed to his request, but his father was furious and opposed him from doing so. If he were to become a Jesuit, he had to renounce any right to his inheritance or status in society. When his family's attempts to dissuade him failed, they tried to persuade him to become a secular priest and offered to arrange for a bishopric for him. But Aloysius was determined to become a missionary. On 25 November 1585, he was accepted into the Society of Jesus in Rome, and two years later, he took the three religious vows of chastity, poverty and obedience. Though he was sent to Milan for studies, he was sent back to Rome because of his health issues. In addition to the kidney disease, he also suffered from a skin disease, chronic headaches and sleeplessness. Later in 1590, he had a vision in which the Archangel Gabriel told him that he would die within a year. In 1591, the Jesuits opened a hospital for the plague stricken, when a plague broke out in Rome, and Aloysius volunteered to work there. When many young Jesuits had become infected with the disease, Aloysius was allowed to care for the sick, at another hospital, called Our Lady of Consolation, where those with contagious diseases were not admitted. But the man Aloysius took care of was infected with the plague, and Aloysius was bedridden by 3rd March 1591, a few days before his 23rd birthday. Aloysius told several people about another vision he had, and that he would die on the Octave of the feast of Corpus Christi. On 21 June 1591, though he seemed very well in the morning, he insisted that he would die before the day was over. As he began to grow weak, his confessor, the cardinal and later saint, Robert Bellarmine gave him the last rites and recited the prayers for the dying. He died just before midnight fixing his eyes on the crucifix he held in his hands, as he tried to pronounce the name of Jesus. Aloysius was buried in the Church of the Most Holy Annunciation, Rome, which later became the church of Saint Ignatius of Loyola (Sant'Ignazio). On his feast day in 1608, the three daughters of his brother, Rodolfo, established a community of women dedicated to education, under the formal name of the Noble Virgins of Jesus, which still exists, and is trying to spread The Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.



ST.IGNATIAN YEAR CORNER Spiritual awakening of St. Ignatius

The book "De Vita Christi" (The life of Christ) which suggested a spiritual exercise that required visualizing oneself in the presence of Christ, influenced St. Ignatius and later his own spiritual exercises, very much. The author of the book, Ludolph proposes that the reader place himself mentally at the scene of the Gospel story, visualizing the crib at the Nativity, the Calvary etc. St. Ignatius made this type of meditation known as Simple Contemplation, as the basis for the method that would promote in his *Spiritual Exercises*.

Ignatian Spirituality

In the Ignatian Spiritual Exercises, contemplation is a very active way of praying with the imagination, a way of praying that engages the mind and heart, and stirs up thoughts and emotions. Ignatius was convinced that God can speak to us as surely through our imagination as through our thoughts and memories. We accompany Jesus through His life by visualizing the events of the life of Jesus as if they are happening before us right now, and pay attention to the details like sights, sounds, tastes, smells, and feelings of the event. By contemplating a Gospel scene in this way, we are not simply remembering it or going back in time, but the Holy Spirit makes present a mystery of Jesus' life in a way that is meaningful for us now.

Prayer of St. Aloysius to the Blessed Mother

O holy Mary, my Mistress into thy blessed trust and special keeping, into the bosom of thy tender mercy, this day, every day of my life and at the hour of my death, I commend my soul and body; to thee I entrust all my hopes and consolations, all my trials and miseries, my life and the end of my life, that through thy most holy intercession and thy merits, all my actions may be ordered and disposed according to thy will and that of thy divine Son. Amen.


Different Ways to connect to our Parish
